JURY'S VERDICT MANSLAUGHTER

Hans Goodager Escapes Maximum Penalty for Killing Antone Moe.

Manslaughter was the verdict returned last night by the jury in the case of Hans Goodager, the North Third street saloonkeeper, who shot and killed Antone Moe, a logger, in his saloon in the early part of January. Goodager was charged with murder in the first degree. The case was tried before the jury in Judge Cleland's department of the circuit court.

Seneca Pouts, attorney for Goodager, was present when the verdict was announced and gave notice that an appeal would be taken if allowed.

The jury deliberated five hours. It was 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon, when the counsel having finished their pleas, Judge Cleland gave final instructions to the 12 men. They returned to the courtroom with the verdict at 5:35 o'clock.

Supported by his crutches, Hans Goodager, who has but one leg, stood to hear the verdict as it was read by Deputy County Clerk Wells. After the jury had been discharged he was taken back to the county jail.

Moe, known among his associates as "the bull of the woods," with a companion, William Benson, one of the witnesses, appeared at Goodager's saloon late one evening. The prosecution held that following an altercation which arose over Goodager's refusal to sell the men more liquor, Goodager without justification killed Moe. The defense contended that Moe threatened Goodager and that the saloonkeeper shot in self-defense.

STRIKE DEMORALIZES FRENCH POST SERVICE

JOSEF LHEVINNE SCORES TRIUMPH IN RECITAL AT HEILIG THEATRE

Josef Lhevinne settled once for all last night for Portland the question of his greatness. For so long echoes of his astonishing successes have been creeping over the mountains, first from Europe, then from New York and then from Mexico. When he reached California his greatness began to seem more real and graspable and when he struck Portland last night all doubts were dispelled.

Seldom is Portland so warmed up and so utterly forgetful of its cold dignity as last night, and then it is usually for some singer whose art is more easily understood by the public. But last night Mr. Lhevinne's personality and almost childish simplicity won his way readily. Master of the art of tonal expression, he conveyed as easily the meaning of the masters and touched it so judiciously with his own personality that he was recalled time and time again to bow his appreciation to his enthusiastic audience.

Mr. Lhevinne is one of the most subtle tone painters heard in Portland in many moons. With infinite delicacy of touch and yet with all the precision and firmness of a master artist, he lent a light stroke here, a heavy stroke there, till the picture was complete with all its nuances and its meaning must have been plain to the simplest minded. It would be hard to imagine a more delicate picturing of Mozart's quaint pastorale with its delicate variations. The shepherd's pipe sang plaintively and tenderly the changes in its air. And Schumann's "Carnaval"—a grand and overmastering canvas was that with the varying moods it pictured—the dignified preamble, the merry measures of the quadrille, the fitting step of the coquette, the faint touch of the butterfly movement, the inspiring reconnaissance, the measured tread of the waltz and the stately rhythm of the martial march that closes this kaleidoscopic picture of 30 phases.

And he followed it immediately with a picture hardly less brilliant, the favorite "Solre'e d'Vienne" (Schubert-Liszt). The Busoni setting of the Bach Chaconne that opened the program was an interesting technical study. Anyone can play Bach's notes, but not everyone can play them with a feeling that represents something. The old fashioned dance measures were played with much beauty of thought by Mr. Lhevinne. The Scarlatti-Tausig sonata that followed represented a difficult finger study, but it was played with

much grace. The Mozart pastorale and a brilliant Momento Capriccioso by Weber completed the first group. By this time Mr. Lhevinne had established with the audience the sincerity and seriousness of his work and the sanity of himself. His clear, forceful manner of picking out his chords—not of pounding them in—commanded respect from the first. In fact that is one point in which Mr. Lhevinne excels—he secures splendid, big volume and strikes his chords forcefully, and yet there is never the slightest suspicion of pounding or of "elopiness" in sound.

He followed the first group with the Gluck-Brahms gavotte as encore, the number which he popularized on his last American trip. The second group was the "Carnaval" with its Schuber-Liszt encore. The third group was a delightful mixture, with three well known Chopin numbers beautifully interpreted, a d'Albert scherzo which was new and presented some interesting phases, and the Schuiz-Eyler composition written about the famous "Blue Danube" waltz of Strauss.

The G major nocturne showed the pianist in his tenderest mood and that nocturne, perhaps the best known and certainly the best loved, was heard with wrapt attention. The beautiful melody was charmingly sung with a clear, ringing tone. The B minor study—such an unpretentious name which may cover almost anything in the whole gamut of composition—was one of the most brilliant achievements of the entire evening.

The Blue Danube waltz were enveloped in such an involved mesh of trills and runs, arpeggios and chords, that whenever the air disentangled itself from its amazingly intricate surroundings, the audience began to beat time with feet and head in joyous greeting. Though the work was not less a conservatory piece, calculated to show one's technical powers, yet it is endowed with a great deal of beauty and the song of the waters was so gracefully and delicately given that the audience went into raptures of delight. The pianist responded with that dainty "Marche Mignon" of Poldini. And even then he had to bow his thanks many times before the audience was content to go home.

A great pianist is this Russian, fit to reign among the greatest—and a great success was this he had in Portland, one of the most distinctive ever granted a pianist here. Miss Steers and Miss Coman will tour through the northwest before his return east.

DEAD TIMBER SELLS FOR A GOOD PRICE

A sale of 2000 cords of dead timber has just been made to a mining company on the Whitman national forest. The timber is located in township 8 south, ranges 36 and 37 east, W. M., on the Fruit creek watershed. The timber, consisting of western larch, Engelmann spruce, lodgepole pine and alpine fir, on this area is estimated to be 6000 cords, and this amount was advertised for sale by a general notice published for not less than 30 days in which bids for all or any part of the timber at not less than 50 cents per cord were invited.

No bid in response to this advertisement was received up to the date mentioned in the notice of sale, but an application for the purchase of 2000 cords of this timber at 50 cents per cord was subsequently received and approved with slight modifications in the conditions of the sale.

The removal of the dead and down timber is a protective measure and will result in a very decided advantage to the forest, since it will greatly reduce the danger threatened by fire to the

remaining live timber and ground cover which is very much needed for the protection of the Fruit creek watershed, of vast importance as a source of water supply to mining operations in the vicinity.
