Falls Four Stories.—The broken bones of a man who fell from the top of a building at 104 Church street, were picked up yesterday afternoon. The man, who was named as John Smith, was found lying on the ground, his head on the sidewalk and his legs hanging over the edge of the building. He was taken to the hospital, where he is now recovering.

Court Lectures Children.—Just kids, seven in number, badly frightened and shivering with cold, were taken before Judge G. H. Smith yesterday afternoon. The children, who were found in the streets, were taken to the court, where they were lectured on the dangers of playing in the streets. The judge said that the children were lucky to be alive, and that they should be more careful in the future.

Debate of Charles Grant.—Papers were filed in probate today in the matter of the estate of Charles Grant, who died at the age of 70. The papers show that Grant was a successful businessman, and that he left a large estate. The probate court is now handling the matter, and is expected to complete its work in a few days.

Drayload of Gold.—It took six men to lift a chest of \$20 gold pieces off a dray at the entrance to the city hall this morning. The chest, which was brought in by a man named John Smith, was found to contain a large amount of gold. The gold was taken to the city hall, where it is now being stored.

He alleges that the plaintiffs conspired to swindle him out of 67 1/2 acres of land near Sheridan, in Yamhill county.

County Buys Jail Site.—Yesterday the county court closed the deal acquiring five acres of land near Lincoln street for a rock quarry and sub-jail. The deed was filed in the county clerk's office yesterday, signed by Mrs. Anna M. Mann. Four thousand dollars was the consideration. A deed for two and a half acres adjoining the property will probably be signed today.

Cows Trample Lawns.—Householders on Holladay street, looking for their lawns this morning, then raised a roar that crossed the river and reached police headquarters. Several lawns were trampled. It appears that the trampling of 100 cows driven up Holladay avenue at 6 o'clock this morning. Their owner is said to have been John Zola, who was moving to Columbia slough.

Protests Against Road.—Protests against a county road petitioned for by A. D. Merz and 24 other property owners to run across the Fechtelmeier tract have been filed in the county court by W. B. Fechtelmeier and other heirs of M. W. Fechtelmeier. Fechtelmeier declares that property owned by himself and the other heirs would be damaged to the extent of \$2295 by the road.

Eddy Out on Bail.—A. G. Eddy, formerly an employee of the Oregon Electric Railway company, indicted by the county grand jury of charge of having defrauded \$145 from the corporation, put up \$500 bail yesterday. Eddy is alleged to have "knocked down" \$145 in fares March 4.

To Clean Straw Matting.

Before applying water to straw matting, it should be thoroughly swept and then gone over with a dry cloth to remove as much dust as possible. MORSE GOT SQUARE DEAL IN MEXICO

Ensenada, Lower California, March 17.—William G. Morse, the New York broker, who has been held a prisoner here for 84 days awaiting trial on a charge of murder for having killed an Indian at Villa la Trinidad, Mexico, is at liberty, having been honorably discharged by the court late last night.

F. B. Morse, inventor of the telegraph, was exonerated of all blame by the court, who stated that the American proved beyond the possibility of a doubt that he killed the Indian in self defense.
