Convention of W. C. T. U.—The semi-annual convention and banquet of the County W. C. T. U. will be held tomorrow in the Evangelical church at Lewis under the auspices of the Lewis circle. The business session will occupy the morning and will be followed by a banquet and social hour. At 1:45 a round table will be conducted by the presidents and addresses will be made by Rev. Paul Rader and others. A banquet will be served at 3:30 by Mrs. L. H. Addison as hostess. The evening session will begin at 8 o'clock and will include a medal contest. All of the exercises are open to the public. The Evangelical church is on Main street, Lewis, south of the Mount Scott railway station.

Dog Bite Costs \$125.—Mrs. Olive Partridge yesterday decided that \$125 for a dog bite, without a law suit, would be better than the possibility of \$200 by the jury trial she accepted that amount in settlement of her suit for damages against Miss Emma Cook of Sixteenth and Lexington streets. The case was compromised just before it was set for trial before Judge Cleland in the circuit court. The dog was snapped at the ankle by the Cook fox terrier one day last May when she called to express regard for the child, Miss Cook's father. The canine caught her tender Achilles and she was nervous and lame for several weeks, she alleged.

Explains School Exhibit.—Reuben F. Robinson, superintendent of the Oregon Educational exhibit for the Alaska Yukon-Pacific fair, has sent out a pamphlet to teachers throughout the state explaining what the object of the exhibit is and giving valuable suggestions as to its collection. The pamphlet contains pictures of the exhibits in the schools at the Portland fair in 1908. In a foreword Mr. Robinson says that the value of such an exhibit to the state lies in its power to attract home-seekers. He declares that the first information that a colonist seeks is as to the educational facilities of the new country in which he intends to settle.

Baptized Boy in Milk.—Shower baths of milk that were administered, not in the name of beauty, but because of anger, form part of the objections to Mrs. E. Hillier. Because she does not like the milky way she has brought suit for divorce in the circuit court. Among other things Mrs. Hillier alleges that he once kicked over the table in a frisky moment and that he was a butcher knife at her. She asks the court to give her title to one third of her husband's property in the divorce. They were married in Madras, Wis., in August, 1905.

Asks \$7500 for Life.—Employed by the Pacific Railway & Navigation company to keep a fire burning in a hut, thus prevent a quantity of dynamite from freezing, Alex. Angelos was so unfortunate as to get the place too hot. Therefore Angelos was blown to bits by the dynamite. His administrator, M. Apach, has sued for \$7500 damages in the circuit court. The allegations are that the company was negligent in failing to store the dynamite in a proper place. The explosion took place in Washington street. The defendant company was doing construction work.

MacRae, chief clerk of the Hotel Oregon, who is now at Carson, Wash., where he has been ill for the past month. Showed Marks of Beating.—H. J. Borden was the defendant in a case in the police court yesterday afternoon. He was accused of assault and battery on A. Osburn. Both are salesmen for a land company, and so Osburn swore, Borden accused of taking his wife from him and followed this assertion with several blows upon the head of the smaller man. The altercation took place in the Corbett building. Although Osburn displayed the marks of the blows inflicted Monday, Borden was freed because of lack of corroborative evidence.

Electrical Engineers Meet.—Fifty electrical engineers gathered in convention at the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening. They are the members of the Portland branch of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers. A number of interesting papers were read, one on "Automatic Telephone" being especially interesting. After the meeting the members were escorted through the exchange of the automobile company and the system explained in detail. The next meeting will be held April 20.

Lecture by Bishop Keane.—Bishop J. Keane will lecture on the subject of "Christianity and the Pope" at his special meeting for non-Catholics at St. Mary's cathedral, Fifteenth and Davis streets, this evening. PURCHASE BLOCK ON EAST SIDE

Lewis Fairchild and Will Wurzweller Buy on Hawthorne.

Lewis Fairchild and Will Wurzweller have bought a block of ground bounded by Hawthorne avenue, East Eleventh, East Twelfth and East Clay streets from the Ladd estate. The papers signed today show a consideration of but \$10, but the probable purchase price is between \$25,000 and \$40,000.

Mr. Fairchild is a large property owner in central East Portland and has been operating extensively in that district for some years. He also owns considerable west side property. Mr. Wurzweller is a merchant of Prineville, eastern Oregon, who has great faith in Portland's future. He some time ago purchased property on the west side.

The Hawthorne avenue block will be improved this fall with stores and a garage, the location being considered ideal for this purpose, as it forms the center of the business district that it is predicted will follow there with the development of the vast district which is now in rapid progress. Directly east of it lies the large Ladd tract in which a great number of high class residences are being erected, to the north of it is the Hawthorne tract, now well improved with residences, flats and apartment houses, while on the southern side, bounded by a residence district.

It is figured that the business portion of this entire district will lie between Twelfth street and Grand avenue, as beyond Twelfth street to Thirtieth it is strictly a residence district. Hawthorne avenue will be improved with asphalt pavement from Third street to Forty-first and it is also proposed to similarly improve Twelfth street, from Third to Forty-first. This, it is argued, will throw the bulk of traffic down the country road to Division, cross Ladd avenue to the corner of Twelfth and Hawthorne and down Hawthorne over the Madison bridge.

Mr. Fairchild individually owns the southwest corner at Eleventh street and Hawthorne avenue, which lies opposite the block just purchased by Fairchild and Wurzweller. This corner will be improved with stores and flats above.

JACKSON MINERS RUSH TO SISKIYOU

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Medford, Or., March 18.—The work of sinking the oil well on the property controlled by the Pioneer Oil company is progressing rapidly. The well is down 150 feet. It is expected that the drillers will be able to determine the presence or absence of oil when a depth of 1200 feet has been reached.

A number of miners who have been operating in the local district have left for Siskiyou county to join in the rush to the newly discovered field near Humboldt. The greatest mining excitement in recent years is on in Yreka. The Humboldt district is about four miles west of Yreka. A number of rich veins have been reported within the past few days. A number of miners came out from the Blue Ledge country Tuesday and left at once for Siskiyou.

Over \$200,000 in taxes has been collected by the sheriff of Jackson county this year, which is less than \$97,000 more to be collected. The total tax in Jackson county for 1909 is \$322,000.
