

# KIDNAPER IS BODY LIES TWO THIS MICHIGAN SEEN NEAR WEEKS IN BED WOMAN'S ADVICE WARREN

Woman Thinks That Willie Whittle Was Drugged—Wealthy Uncle of Lad Will Spend Fortune in Search for Nephew.

Willie Whittle was kidnapped yesterday afternoon at Sharon, Pa., by a man who drove to the school where the 8-year-old son of a wealthy lawyer of that city attended and asked, "Is Willie Whittle here?" He is wanted at once at his father's office. The boy has not been seen since and Mr. Whittle received a letter demanding \$10,000 ransom for the return of the child.

Warren, Ohio, March 10.—Mrs. Mary Walker, who lives on a farm near here, reported to the police today that she saw a rig similar to that driven by the Sharon kidnappers, pass her farm going in the direction of Warren early today. She said there was a man in the buggy, and a boy wrapped in blankets. She said the appearance of the boy indicated he might have been drugged.

Sharon, Pa., March 10.—Frank Buhl, millionaire steel magnate, announced today that he would spend \$100,000 in searching for his nephew, Willie Whittle, son of Attorney James P. Whittle, who was kidnapped from school yesterday. Mrs. Whittle said the kidnappers would be paid the \$10,000 they ask, with no questions, if they would return the boy safe.

"All we want is our boy back," she sobbed. "We will give them the money if they will bring Willie back. I feel certain they will not harm him, but the suspense is awful."

Mrs. Whittle is keeping Salina, her 18-year-old daughter, from school and will not let her get out of her sight. Attorney Whittle, dry-eyed and determined, is at his office today directing the search. Four Pinkerton detectives from Pittsburgh have been employed in the case and 50 deputies were sworn in today to assist Chief of Police Crane in his work.

The whole western section of the state is aroused by the kidnapping, which promises to rival the Cuddey case at Omaha and the Marvin case in Delaware. There is much mystery as to how the kidnappers expected to communicate with Whittle after he inserted an advertisement in newspapers saying he was willing to pay the ransom.

The only clue obtained this morning was a report from Warren, Ohio, that a man answering the description of one of the kidnappers, accompanied by a boy, had been seen near there.

A letter from the kidnappers of Willie Whittle, was delivered at the family residence here today. It was addressed with an indelible pencil in the scrawling handwriting of the missing boy.

The contents of the letter are kept secret, but it was learned that the kidnappers acknowledge having seen the advertisement in which the father agreed to pay the ransom.

Attorney Whittle refused to say where the letter was mailed. It is supposed the letter outlined a plan by which the kidnappers expect to get the money and return the boy.

D. W. Ross, Old-Time Horseman, Dies Alone in Stable Loft.

After having made out his application for entrance to the county poor farm and having received permission from the management to enter that institution within 10 days, D. W. Ross, an old-time horseman, went to his room over a livery stable at 208 Salmon street about two weeks ago and died. His body was found this morning lying on the little bed. From its condition it is thought Ross must have been dead fully two weeks.

Ross was a stepson of L. Goddard, who formerly owned a livery stable here under the firm name of Goddard & Bramer. He had been employed at various stables around the city for over 30 years as a hostler and at one time was considered to be comfortably well off. His savings were all spent on liquor in his later life, however, and he had been almost a pauper for five years. During the last three years he had spent much time in the little room where his body was found this morning, but was in the habit of dropping out of sight for weeks at a time.

When he disappeared the last time J. J. Burgel, the owner of the stable, thought nothing whatever of it, and as the room where Ross slept was never used, his body lay there until it was found this morning.

Ross was about 55 years old. The remains were taken in charge by the coroner.

**POLICEMAN PLAYS HUMAN SPIDER IN FLY POKER GAME**

Word came to Fogarty that certain men were breaking the law by running a poker game at 715 Geary street. Fogarty, with Detectives Galvin and Schomba, went to the place but failed to gain admittance.

The players, at first powerless to move from astonishment, started to run. Fogarty managed to reach his pistol, with which he covered the crowd until his companions, hearing his cries, rushed into the room.

**NEW CENSUS BILL PASSED BY HOUSE**

Washington, March 10.—The house passed the census bill, in amended form at 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The bill was passed at the late session, but was vetoed by President Roosevelt because of his objections to the provision taking from the civil service commission the power of appointing the clerks.

An amendment was agreed to, providing that the appointment shall be made in conformity with the law or appointment among the states under the civil service act.

In order to prevent the spread of tuberculosis among government clerks, the house agreed to an amendment by Bennett of New York, requiring that each census applicant furnish with his application a certificate of good health.

As amended the bill was then passed. The measure gives to the civil service commission jurisdiction over appointments and provides for the printing of the reports by the government printing office. As enacted at the last session, the bill stripped the civil service commission of such authority and there was a provision allowing some of the printing to be done by private firms. President Roosevelt vetoed the bill.
