FOUR MILE THORNTON. FLYNN WHIPS BILLY STAKE RUN OFF TODAY PAPER IN 10 ROUNDS

San Francisco, Cal., March 20.—The Thornton stake at four miles, which, among California's big racing events, ranks next to the Burns handicap and the California Derby, is to be run at the Emeryville track this afternoon. The Jockey club had added \$5000 to the value of the stake so that the owner of the winning horse will come in for quite a pretty penny. Barring the scratching of any of those entered or the addition of a starter or two, an even half dozen crack distance horses will try conclusions over this Marathon race of the turf. Milford, Nadro, Oregon, Cloyne, Mendon and Benaville are the horses slated to go. All have been especially "prepped" for the long journey. The Thornton has always proved a great drawing card and with weather conditions perfect for racing, one of the largest crowds of the season is expected to be on hand to witness the running of the race.

MONMOUTH CITIZENS OPPOSE REFERENDUM ON STATE COLLEGE

Monmouth, N. J., March 20.—As reflected in resolutions unanimously adopted by the Commercial club, the citizens of Monmouth and the friends of the Oregon State Normal school located at Monmouth are opposed to the referendum on the Oregon Agricultural college. The resolutions declare the referendum to be "unjust and absurd," and insist that the people of the vicinity "to use" are opposed to it. The resolutions are as follows: "Whereas, Through lack of proper information all the schools of this state are charged through the press either directly or by implication, with slacking or aiding the referendum petition against the Oregon Agricultural college appropriation, and inasmuch as the citizens of Monmouth and Polk counties have not given it counsel or aid in any way, and further, as one man, have from the first denounced the proposition for a referendum on the Cornell school as unjust and absurd; "Be it resolved by the Monmouth Commercial club, that public relations be made of this charge against the Monmouth school, and we disclaim the validity of a referendum on the Cornell school against the Oregon Agricultural college, and we denounce this action against any of our state educational institutions."

CALIFORNIA STUMPED BY LOSS OF CAPTAIN

Berkeley, Cal., March 20.—Consternation was created on the University of California campus the other day when it became known that the associated students executive committee had terminated Baseball Coach Causey's contract and that Captain Ralph Myers had resigned during the season. The action of the committee was the crystallization of a long standing feud between the student body and certain members of the team. The trouble started early in the season over the selection of a coach, the committee wanting one man and Captain Myers another. Coach Causey, a graduate of the class of '06 was a compromise. On a recent trip to Los Angeles, according to the reports of some of the alumni, certain members of the team were breaking the strict rules of the committee against drinking on the train. Causey and Myers were asked to appear before the committee and explain. It was during this interview that Causey was dismissed for "unsatisfactory conduct." There have been rumors current on the campus for some time that Causey was favoring certain of the men to the detriment of others, and that he is generally incompetent. This, with the loss of Captain Myers, is giving the college a hard time. The college is going to give Stanford the usual defeat this year.

MISS EMERY TO STUDY ASIATICS

Reported Flight of Japanese Lover Is Not Confirmed.

Corte Madera, Cal., March 20.—While the town of Corte Madera is bubbling over with gossip about the engagement of Archdeacon Emery of the Episcopal diocese of California, to Gungiro Aoki, there is a growing belief that the Japanese has fled from the ken of his fiancée and her mother. When interviewed regarding the rumor Mrs. Emery at first insisted on the edge of the whereabouts of Aoki, but under questioning admitted she knew, but refused to reveal it. She added that requests for information concerning Aoki must be made to Aoki's brother. While admitting her engagement and disclaiming the rumor that she is a social bannister will not deter her from marrying, Miss Emery has declared she will not wed until she has had the opportunity to decide whether it is right for the Caucasian and oriental races to mix. Miss Emery said she would study the problem for herself away from publicity. It is said she intends to visit Japan to study her prospective husband's people on their native heath. As the affair stands now Miss Emery is being supported by her mother, but is opposed by her father and shunned by her former acquaintances. There is no prospect of immediate marriage, according to the young woman, who says they originally intended to wait five years before marrying and will not do so that late in life. Mrs. Emery and her daughter profess indignation over the interference of neighbors and friends with their family affairs. Mrs. Emery declared that America had "license, not liberty," and that the California law against the intermarriage of a white with an oriental "was unjust and an outrage."

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CITY DADS ARE CALLED CRAFTERS Dr. C. H. Chapman Creates Sensation in Sunnyside Push Club Meeting.

Judge M. G. Munly, Elected President of the United East Side Push Club.
Judge M. G. Munly, for the past two years the president of the North East Side Improvement club, and one of the most prominent workers in the city, was last night elected president of the United East Side Push club, the strongest organization of its kind in the city. Judge Munly had practically no opposition, as Whitney L. Bolse, the retiring president, declined the office. Dr. C. H. Chapman, a member of the charter, revision committee, was invited to deliver an address to the club on the new charter, and remarks which he made occasioned no little discussion. When discussing the council as it is to be made up should the charter be adopted, he made the remark that practically every councilman in the present body was tied up with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, and that they were a "set of grafters."

An effort was made by J. T. Wilson of the Sunnyside Push club to have his proposition indorsed by the club, but owing to a ruling of the chair it was not allowed to go before the meeting. This will probably prove a hard blow to the Sunnyside club's movement, as it can hardly expect to go it alone. The recall suggestion received a severe rebuke from both Councilman Rushlight and Menefee during their talks, and when it came before the club later in the evening received but scant encouragement.
