

NEWS FORECAST OF COMING WEEK

Washington, March 20.—Probably no event of the week will attract so much public attention as the departure of ex-President Roosevelt on his hunting expedition to Africa. The Roosevelt party have engaged passage on the steamer "Hamburg," sailing from New York at noon next Tuesday for Naples. At Naples the party will transfer to the German East Africa steamship "Admiral," which will convey them to Mombassa, from which point they will proceed to the interior.

Congress will continue to wrestle with the tariff bill and the president is expected to give much of his attention to the matter of appointments. Some important changes in the foreign diplomatic service may be announced before the end of the week.

Castro's Return.
The government suit to dissolve the Standard Oil company of New Jersey on the ground that it is a combination in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law will be called for a final hearing in the United States circuit court at St. Louis Tuesday.

Cipriano Castro, the ex-president of Venezuela, has engaged passage to sail for home on the steamer leaving Bordeaux Friday. His arrival in Venezuela will probably result in further troubles in that turbulent South American republic.

Andrew Carnegie will preside at the international peace festival which the Peace Society of the city of New York is to hold in Carnegie hall Wednesday evening in celebration of the attainment of world peace.

Busy in World of Sports.
The week will be an unusually busy one in the world of sport. The baseball clubs of all the leagues, big and little, will engage in exhibition games and in other training work in anticipation of the opening of the season. Other sporting events of the week that will attract more or less attention will be the Ormond-Dayton beach automobile races in Florida, the international tournament in New York to decide the 1822 balking billiard championship, the annual golf tournament at Pinehurst, the annual meeting of the intercollegiate football rules committee in New York, the Gotch-Perillo wrestling match in Omaha, the fight between Pecky McParland and Mack Cross in New York, and the Stanley Ketchel-Jack O'Brien contest, also in New York.

SIMPLIFIERS OFFER MORE CLIP WORDS

New York, March 20.—Some more clip ones, shorter and less handsome, or beautifully brief, according to whether you believe every letter should count, or that it's a good thing to have a few silent ones in the language, have been prepared by the clipping bureau of the simplified spelling board.

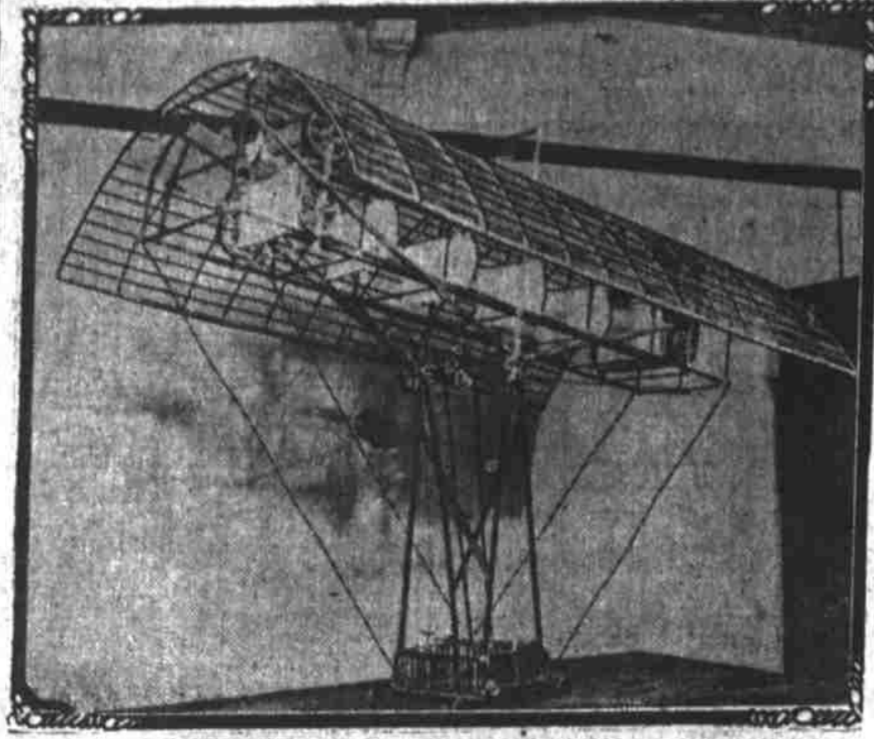
These new ones are to be added to the original 500, and are pushed out into the world under the title, "Alphabetic List of Simplifications in Spelling Recommended by the Simplified Spelling Board Up to January 25, 1909," and no further. The board still retains the "s" in board.

This new list contains "almost exactly" 1100 "separate words" in simplified form, such as "rime" (rhyme not given), "gard," "land," "autum," "heilh," "doctrin," etc., and 2300 forms ending in "ed," now simplified to "d" or "t," as "arm'd," "compeld," etc.

The list makes a pamphlet of 32 pages, the first four of which contain an introductory explanation and the rules of the game, and may be obtained on request, the simplifiers assuming all risks, at the address of the board.

ROSEBURG MAN INVENTS FLYING MACHINE OF NOVEL DESIGN



Model of Air Vessel Made by Oregon Inventor.

Louis Wagner, of Roseburg, Or., has invented an aeroplane of the half-cylinder design in which he asserts are embodied elements of safety, speed, practicability and endurance superior to those of any such machines yet manufactured, not excluding the Wright brothers' airships. So confident are friends of the machine in its ability to outdo its thousands of rivals of the air, that work has already been commenced on a full-size craft of the design, and the first flight will be attempted during the Portland Rose Festival. The big machine will be named after this city.

Mr. Wagner, though not an aviator for 10 years has studied aeronautics and declares that as a result he has copied as nearly as possible the means by which birds fly as principles of his invention. Mr. Wagner is a mechanical engineer.

Local engineers who have viewed the 10-foot model have, without exception, declared it to surpass theoretically any other design now before the public eye. Its practicability can only be determined by trial, but there are few who believe it otherwise than as perfect practically as theoretically.

The aeroplane of the full-size machine, now under way, will be forty feet in length. It will be in the shape of a half-cylinder and will probably be constructed of aluminum. Directly beneath the aeroplane canopy will be the propelling power, an entirely new and novel idea. Twelve silk sails, each having a wind surface of 80 square feet, will be run on endless cables lengthwise under the hood. Six sails will be forcing back the air at all times, while the remaining half-dozen run back to the starting point lying perfectly flat under the plane, and offering no back resistance. As one sail having ended its vertical resistive course, is swung up to run back to the starting point in a horizontal position, another will descend chop off its portion of the air, and run forward over the 40-foot stretch at a speed of about 30-miles an hour. Four hundred and eighty square feet of sail surface, being propelled to a 30-mile an hour speed, will be in the air at all times.

Some some distance below the aeroplane and driving device, will be the basket or cage, directly beneath the center of the main machine. This makes

it impossible for the craft to capsize, and also allows the aeroplane to act as a parachute. In the basket will be a 25-horse-power gasoline engine, weighing 86 lbs. and space for three men. The motor will be connected to the sail chains with two belts. From the basket the whole machine can be controlled, the plane and sail mechanism tilted up or down at will, the cage swinging as a pendulum, and the rudders operated.

The plan of tilting the entire upper surface of the machine when it is desired to descend or ascend, does away with a mass of heretofore troublesome steering gear, and is original with Mr. Wagner. Whatever the angle of the aeroplane, the carriage is always in a horizontal position. Its swinging weight prohibits the machine from capsizing.

The new machine will weigh about 500 pounds, or about 3000 pounds less than the Wright brothers' craft, and other inventors' ships. It will have more motive power in comparison with its weight than any other machine patented.

The Wagner Aeroplano Co., with a capital stock of \$100,000, has been incorporated under the laws of the state of Oregon. Mr. Wagner is president, J. A. Randall, treasurer, and H. McCoughy, secretary. Stock is not on sale.

If the machine makes a successful flight in Portland during the Rose Festival it is the intention of the owners to take it to Seattle during the A-Y-P exposition and there enter it in competition with a number of machines.
