Buying of potatoes at country shipping points has ceased in this territory. The market, while not extremely weak here, is softer and lower for buying price because of the huge arrivals in San Francisco during the past 45 hours. So far as known no buyers are offering over \$1.55 at local shipping points for even the fanciest quality—in fact, the trade does not care to buy even at that figure. While the glut and decline is believed to be merely temporary and was engineered by the "wise" San Francisco firms, buyers of this territory are not inclined to load up.

With California cheese quoted at 17 hc a pound the local product should today he quoted at 20c, for that is the differential generally ruling between the two products even in California markets. Present arrivals of southern cheese are said, however, to be of better quality than usual.

Candidates for mayor are scarce. Rumors of candidates on the other hand are plentiful. Up to this time A. A. Balley is the only man who has made his official appearance. The rest seem to be hanging back, waiting for the action of the so-called "assembly" of the Union Republican club, presumably with the intention of falling upon the nomines of that body and plucking him.

Rumor has it that either T. C. Devilin, David M. Dunne or R. L. Sabin will be the nominee of the assembly. Dunne, however, has stated repeatedly that he does not intend to be a candidate. Devlin admits that he is being urged. Sabin maintains a silence unbroken.

There is little doubt that Charles E. McDonnei will be a candidate, as many of his friends are now, and have for some time, been busy booming his candidacy. Street rumor has it that other well known men of the city are feeling out the prospects and may come into the fight should they decide that they would have a chance at the primary election.

Many Would Be Solons. Candidates for councilmen are springing up on every hand however. Yesterday five new men made their appearance officially as candidates by filing their declarations with the city

auditor.

Ferdinand E. Reed wants to be councilman from the Ninth ward to succeed Councilman Menefee. He filed his declaration yesterday afternoon, after having circulated a petition for signatures recommending his candidacy. It is not known how many signatures he finally received.

C. H. Beard is a candidate from the Tenth ward. He pledges himself to work for the best interests of the public and for greater economy in public expenses.

M. F. Donahoe also seeks place from the Tenth ward. He wants better car service, more street lights, cheaper and better gas, a high bridge across the river and an equitable distribution of the city tax.

Walter Won't Quarrel. J. J. Walter is also from the Tenth ward. He pledges himself to be a friend of social and civic righteousness and a foe to all iniquity. He also promises, if elected, to pay more attention to the city's business than to quarreiing with his follow councilmen. Joseph T. Ellis is another from the Tenth ward. He pledges himself to work for street improvements, bridges and a reduction in taxes.

Until one of them speaks it is probable the secret reason for her death will not be fully revealed. An envelope was found in Mrs. Lorillard's room on which was written. "Bury this with me, unopened." Inside were found the two missives one was in her handwriting and was signed "C. H. L." (Caroline Hamilton Lorilla d). The other was in the handwriting another person. In the envelope were also a few trinkets.

After the notes were read they were replaced in the envelope. It was then resealed and will be placed in Mrs. Lorillard's casket.
