

Y. M. C. A. MUST MOVE JULY 1

Privilege of Remaining in Old Quarters Expires Inconveniently Soon.

Owing to the expiration of their term of ownership of the present association quarters at Fourth and Yamhill, the Portland Y. M. C. A. will move into their new building at Sixth and Taylor streets about July 1, and possibly time before the latter quarters are really ready for occupancy. The association when it sold the present quarters gave July 1 as the date for turning over the ownership and must now either move or pay the interest on the money paid for the old building.

The new quarters of the association are far from complete and in fact the concrete and steel frame work is all that is standing now. Within a few days, however, the work of putting in the woodwork will commence. It will probably be the first of September before the whole building is ready.

Temporarily it is planned to partly finance the first move by possibly the basement of the building by July 1. This will give space for the offices of the association, while the locker room, swimming pool and baths will also be finished at once. This will leave the association without its gymnasium for almost three months.

It will take much planning and labor by the officers to keep the interest in the association up this summer. They are already at work on plans calling for several hikes and picnic for the members and propose to take all the advantage of the out-door exercises that they can, and hope to be able to forget the loss of their "gym" in doing this.

Joseph M. Slocum, secretary of the Board of Trade building is the purchaser of the old quarters of the association. He plans remodeling the interior of the building so as to make it an office building and will probably begin work soon after the first of July.

LIGHT VOTE IN CITY ELECTION, LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles, Cal., March 26.—Although no official recognition is given by the city to the Socialist candidate for mayor, by the Republican machine, a small army of machine politicians is in the field urging voters to vote for the Socialist to defeat George Alexander, Roosevelt Roosevelt and candidate of the machine. LOCAL OPTION IS NOT FOR ST. JOHNS

Judge Thomas O'Day Says Charter Exempts Little City From Dry Law.

If the contention of former Judge Thomas O'Day is correct, the county local option law does not apply within the corporate limits of St. Johns, and that municipality has the right to license saloons men if it desires, notwithstanding the adoption of local option in the precincts comprised in the city.

This position was outlined this morning in an argument before Judge Morvay in the trial of Sam Cochran, convicted in the lower court on the charge of selling liquor in a dry precinct. The case was submitted on an agreed statement of facts, the defendant admitting that the liquor was sold. The only question is the legal one as to whether the local option law is in effect. O'Day bases his contention on a provision of the charter of St. Johns that gives it exclusive control of various licenses, without regard to the general law. Deputy District Attorney Page and O. A. Neal, representing the state, argued that this question was passed on in the Sunday closing case, when it was held that the provisions of the Portland charter regarding certain amusements were inferior to the state law.

FOUR CHILDREN LEFT ALONE; INCINERATED

(United Press Leased Wire.) West Shefford, Quebec, Mar. 26.—Four children were burned to death late yesterday afternoon near Iron Hill, when the farm house of Henry Everett was destroyed by fire. The mother had left the children, two girls and two boys, ranging in age from three to seven years, alone in the house while she visited a neighbor. When she returned she found the bodies of her children burned to a crisp in the ruins.

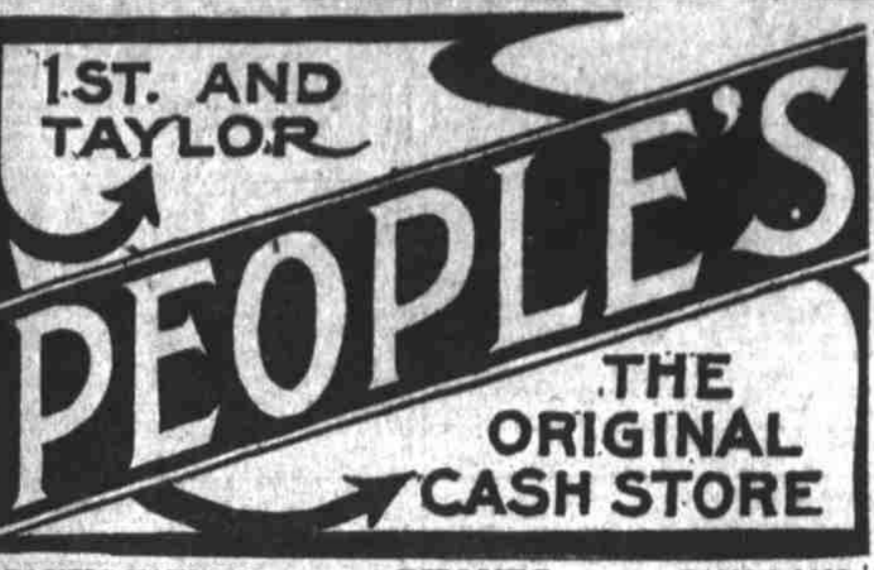
