The Kansas City is of about the same dimensions as the Rose City, being 327 feet long, with a beam of 45 feet and a depth of 18 feet. Her net registered tonnage is 2163 and the engines are credited 4000 indicated horsepower. She was built in Chester, Pa., in 1889, and has been plying in the passenger and freight traffic between New York and Savannah for several years. She was freight traffic between New York and Savannah for several years. She was recently given a thorough overhauling and is said to be in first class condition. She carries a crew of 64.—It is believed that Captain Kidston, formerly master of the Rose City, will be given permanent command after bringing her out from the Atlantic coast. Her name will probably be changed to the Bay City.

The Kansas City exceeds the net tonnage of the Rose City by about 10 tons, the latter's net register being 2154, but the Rose City is longer, her length being 336.2 feet. She has less beam, however, but has deeper draft, the beam being 43.2 feet and the depth being 22.3 feet. The Rose City's engines are credited with only 2506 indicated horsepower. She carries a crew of 75. The Rose City was launched at Chester, Pa., the same year as the Kansas City under the name of the Yumuri. She later became the United States tender Badger and transport Lawton. When known as the Yumuri she plied between New York

Oil-Vapor Burners to Replace Old Style Wick Lamps.


