PAINTER OF SUN BAKED AMERICA EXHIBITS WORK IN THIS CITY

By way of contrast, step from a typical March day in Portland, with occasional bursts of sunshine through dripping trees, wet greenward, wet pavements, into the desert country of the southwest. Stand under the drooping boughs of a lone scrub oak and look out over the sunny fields of southern California. This you may accomplish not by railway journey, but by stopping in to see Ferdinand Burgdorff's paintings at the rooms of Moore & Co. Mr. Burgdorff has an originality that first of all takes you by surprise and then calls for your warmest admiration. He sees what he himself sees, and paints it as he sees it. He has developed the power of elimination to a marked degree. He knows what not to see as well, and he puts you just where he wants you and shows you what you are meant to see.
His point of view is almost oriental—so simple, unstrained, reserved, is it. One lone tree overhanging a glen of the bay far below—a single great oak overshadowing the old dome houses, a hilltop rising abruptly from the plain and on its top the watchers who await the sun—these are the themes he undertakes.
Aside from his singleness of purpose, his directness and the strength of composition which Mr. Burgdorff demonstrates, his greatest charm is in his mastery of color, for this is thoroughly delightful. It is clear, luminous, transparent, almost. It is that rarified air,

intensely dry, which blends tints of sky and plain into a mellow intensity; a difficult result to show without becoming extravagant.
That Mr. Burgdorff has thoroughly achieved the atmosphere and the features of the dry southwest, is evident. It would be interesting to see what he would do with Oregon's clouds and water, misty distances and blue hills. The difference in scene is absolute. It is to be hoped that Mr. Burgdorff will give us his impressions.

LOCAL GROCERS ASK ASSISTANCE

Solicit Funds to Aid in Entertaining Visiting Convention Delegates.

Impressing upon the people of Portland the immense benefits which will accrue to the city in the way of publicity through the twelfth annual convention of retail grocers to be held here June 3 to 8, inclusive, members of the local organization are out today soliciting funds with which to entertain the visitors.
"In years to come Portland will not have an opportunity for securing such excellent and widespread publicity as through the retail grocers' convention," declared Charles E. Merrick, secretary of the Portland organization today.
More than a thousand delegates are expected to attend the Portland convention, which will be held in the Masonic temple, and probably another thousand and families will come as spectators. Special trains have been arranged to run from Boston, New York, Cincinnati, Toledo and St. Louis and others will carry delegates and visitors from other cities. The itineraries of several of the special trains have been received. By special train the delegates will visit the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition and the majority will go by way of California, Salt Lake and Denver, where they will be entertained.
About \$5000 will be required by the local grocers' organization to furnish the entertainment and to furnish their families and visitors. The most of the amount will be furnished by the organization and commercial bodies. Private individuals will be asked to give little.
Plans for the entertainment of the visitors include trolley and automobile rides, a smoker, a trip down the Columbia river and a banquet. A woman's auxiliary has been formed to furnish a good time for the visitors of their own sex. Arrangements have been made already with the hotels and promises of plentiful accommodations secured.

Portland does not realize the publicity to be gotten out of the convention," reiterated Mr. Merrick. "There are 45 trade papers in the United States devoted to the retail grocery trade and each of them will give Portland the very best kind of advertising."
The New England Grocer, one of the biggest trade papers of its kind in the country, has announced that it will devote a whole page each issue to the Portland convention until the delegation leaves Boston, May 19.
"Grocers are the best kind of people to give publicity to a city. When they return to their homes after having been entertained in Portland they will advertise the city in a way that couldn't be done for many thousands of dollars."

The retail grocers up to this time have only held their annual convention on the Pacific coast once, and that time in San Francisco five years ago.

Linn Crops Good.

DIVIDED OVER BRIDGE REPAIR

Choice of Engineer for the 28th Street Structure Causes Friction.

Dissension in the bridge committee of the executive board resulted yesterday when the question of securing an engineer to superintend the repair of the East Twenty-eighth street cement bridge was brought up. Chairman Esterly presented a resolution which was at last adopted by two votes, John Montag supporting the chairman while W. G. Newell strongly opposed it.
Mayor Lane took sides with Mr. Newell, who thought the engineer should be paid by the city but the mayor would not commit himself to a vote. He said he thought it would be best to leave the whole thing up to the executive board. H. M. Esterly and John Montag believe that the city is "in bad" enough already on rejected concrete and they think that if the expense of hiring an engineer is necessary it should fall upon the Northwest Bridge Works. Mr. Newell was not averse to the company's being put at the expense, but he did not want the engineer to be influenced by the fact that his pay would be coming from the company.

The executive board will thresh out the question at its next meeting. Mayor Lane says the bridge will never be worth 10 cents on the dollar to the city, even if it is patched up into a semblance of what the bridge was before the disaster. He declares that he will never sign a warrant in payment for the structure, which can be made absolutely safe for traffic.
Mr. Esterly is disposed to make of the Northwest Bridge company an example to contractors who try to make a profit by omitting items of the contract.

33 DREADNAUGHTS FRIGHTEN ENGLAND

London, March 30.—Foreign Secretary Grey told the house of commons yesterday that when Germany completed her present naval program she would have 33 battleships of the Dreadnaught type, making her supreme in naval affairs among world powers. Grey urged a more liberal policy in connection with naval affairs in Great Britain. The secretary then referred to Anglo-German relations in general terms and grew more amiable, as though fearing his speech would sound warlike. The speaker said only two things could disturb the peaceful conditions of Europe. These would be an attempt by England to isolate Germany or an effort by any one continental power to dominate the policy of Europe.

CHECK FORGER GIVEN LIBERTY ON PAROLE

Pleading guilty to a charge of passing a forged check C. A. Johnson was sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary and then placed on parole by Presiding Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court yesterday afternoon. It was shown that he is 49 years old, has a family, and possessed a previous good record. He is a commercial traveler and passed the bad check on N. K. Clark of the Cornelius hotel.
Sam Dunn pleaded guilty to stealing tools and other property from a shop. He said that others were implicated, and will be given an opportunity to tell the officers all he knows about the affair before he is sentenced at 2 p. m. tomorrow.

CONTRABAND HOP UP AT AUCTION

Bidding Lively in View of the Import Prohibition—Anti-Opium Propaganda.

Seattle, Wash., March 30.—Fifty pounds of opium, representing miscellaneous seizures made by local customs officers during the last year, will be sold at public auction by the government this afternoon under the supervision of Deputy Collector Chesnut. Another seizure of prepared opium amounting to 75 pounds will be sold at the Tacoma custom house at the same time.
In view of the fact that the law prohibiting the importation of opium goes into effect Thursday, it is expected the bidding will be spirited. Chinese merchants are interested in the sale and it is believed the price will be forced up to unusually high figures.
After April 1 it will be illegal to import prepared or smoking opium into the United States or Canada and this sale will be the last to be held by the United States government.

Cleveland, Ohio, March 30.—Rev. A. S. Gregg, corresponding secretary of the International Reform bureau, with headquarters at Washington, has established an office here and is flooding the country with literature decrying the opium traffic. The bureau heretofore has been interested chiefly in anti-gambling, anti-horse racing and anti-saloon campaigns in various states. The bureau has been active in the Pacific coast and in British Columbia. The credit for the recent action of the federal government in regulating the opium traffic is taken to itself by the bureau.

WON'T LIE TO SAVE THIEVING BROTHER

San Francisco, March 30.—Rather than tell a lie, Gladys Bacigalupi has told the police that her brother Charles lied when he explained his alleged theft of a woman's silk garment by saying it was hers. Charles has been detained by the police and will now be tried on a charge of burglary.
Bacigalupi was arrested over a week ago, emerging from a store with a dress and a box of candy. He glibly explained that he was taking his sister's garment home to her and that he had bought the candy. The officers found the sister yesterday and, although she hesitated when asked to corroborate her brother's story, she did not yield to the temptation. Her denial of her brother's explanation satisfies the police that he is guilty.

WHAT ROCKEFELLER THINKS OF PANICS

New York, March 30.—In the April number of the World's Work, to be published today, John D. Rockefeller writes as follows:
"Since 1857 I can remember all the great panics, but I believe the panic of 1907 was the most trying. No one escaped from it, great or small. Important institutions had to be supported and carried through the time of distrust and unreasoning fear."
The question has been asked if I think we shall revive quickly from the panic of October, 1907. I am not a prophet nor the son of a prophet, but, as to the ultimate outcome there is no doubt.
"This temporary setback will lead to safer institutions and more conservative management on the part of everyone,

The map shows a complete projection of the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, North America, Europe, northern Africa, Australasia and most of Asia. Maps of the steamship routes to the orient, Australia, Auckland and Europe are shown. It is the first time that Portland has been shown on the regular Canadian Pacific main line.
Another change in the map is that Chicago is also placed on the main line—the route being over the Wisconsin Central recently acquired by the C. P. R. In addition to the maps the folder contains cuts of the Transatlantic and Transpacific steamships and the C. P. R. Canadian hotels.
