Trying Old Confidence Game—One of the oldest confidence games in existence, that of demanding pay in advance for advertisements, is apparently being worked in Portland once more, according to a police report. W. S. Angel, who conducts a grocery at 737 Taylor street, has reported that yesterday a gentleman of smooth tongue and persuasive manner obtained an order from him for an advertisement on the bill of fare of a neighboring restaurant. Pay in advance was demanded but refused, and the solicitor indignantly took his departure. Angel was later informed by the restaurant man that he had heard nothing of any new bill of fare. The solicitor is described as about 35 years old, five feet eight inches in height, dressed in gray and weighing about 150 pounds.

Ordered Out of Town—Portland's population was set back a peg this morning by the order of Judge Van Dine, D. District Court, who has been rooming at 400 1/2 Clay street, was placed on the list of undesirable persons. According to the testimony of Officer Sims he had been in his own way in the Clay street house last evening, and frightened the landlady so that she dared not let him in the house with him any longer. Two bottles of whiskey found upon his person partially explained his behavior. A sentence of 90 days in jail was today suspended on condition that he be gone when the clock strikes 12 tonight.

St. Johns Plans Driveway—St. Johns will have a 70 foot street from Smith's crossing to the river if the movement started at a mass meeting at property owners along that street Monday evening is carried to a successful conclusion. It was decided to widen the street to 70 feet, thus making a fine driveway through the city. Connecting with Portland boulevard it will make the city of St. Johns to the Swift packing plant. The railway company has agreed to do its part of the work provided the street is widened. Monday evening the meeting was called Monday to accept the offer of the company.

Middle Lecture Series—The after series of Riddell lectures in the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist, 1000 Pine street, are attracting large and enthusiastic audiences. They are more in the line of classwork and instruction, giving practical methods along the line of ways of attainment of the ideal, presented in the previous lectures. The general theme is "The Secret of Happiness." The subject for tonight's discussion is "The Secret of Happiness." Each evening during the week in the same auditorium, except Wednesday night when the lecture will be in the Third Presbyterian church.

Mathison Reception Friday—An informal reception will be given to Honorable F. X. Mathison, a pioneer of 1842 at the rooms of the Oregon Historical society, fourth floor of the city hall, next Friday afternoon, April 2, between 2 and 4 o'clock, that being his birthday. Mr. Mathison is the only survivor of the 102 persons who were present at the birth of the first civil government in American territory west of the Rocky or Oregon mountains on May 2, 1843. His old pioneer friends and the public generally are invited to welcome him once more.

Permitted to Sell Shares—County Judge Webster this morning issued an order allowing Mrs. Edith E. Gonde to sell 306 shares of common stock of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. The price value is \$100, but the sale is authorized at \$60 as the best obtainable figure. This will yield \$18,360 for the estate of the late Mrs. Gonde, who died last year. The sale will settle obligations owing to the United States National bank, the First National bank and Charles Pratt & Co.

Says Affections Are Damaged—Suit for \$10,000 damages for crushed affections has been begun in the circuit court by Ellen M. Davis against Mr. J. Conner, a real estate dealer. She says she has refused offers of marriage from others in the hope that Conner would keep his promise to her, made in June, 1906. She is 38 years old and she has been recently disappointed and grieved because of the fickleness of her admirer.

Compliments Dairy Commissioner—F. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, in receipt of a letter from J. Mortensen, associate professor of dairying at the university of Iowa in which the latter compliments Mr. Bailey on having at last shown the legislature of Oregon the need of more inspectors. Professor Mortensen is one of the leading dairy instructors of the east and highly appreciated Oregon's needs in that line.

Complete Charter Revision—The second charter commission met last night and practically completed the work of amending the present city charter. It was decided among other things that councilmen should continue to draw \$5 a month salary. A special session of the council will probably be held April 7, so that the second revision may be placed upon the ballot by resolution.

Mrs. Allwein Is Executrix—Mrs. Lena Allwein, widow of the late Frederick Allwein, has been appointed administratrix of the estate of her late husband. The estimated value of the property is \$3000, which will be inherited by the widow and her three children. A. Boslar, M. Rend and George Wursel have been named as appraisers.

Urges Park Purchase—Purchase of a park, preferably the Corvallis tract, is the subject which will take up the time of the Severn Ward Citizens' Club at its meeting in Nash hall on Willard avenue next Friday evening. E. J. McAllister, H. W. Stone and Ben Reinhold have been asked to speak. A musical program will also be given.

Railroad Sunday Service—The Southern Pacific is gradually extending its daily train service to the branch lines in Oregon that have heretofore been without Sunday train service. Arrangements are now being made to operate Sunday trains on the Woodburn-Silverton branch, possibly next Sunday.

Open Conference Tomorrow—With its first regular session tomorrow morning at 1 o'clock the Oregon conference of the United Evangelical church will open its annual business meeting in the church at St. Johns. The conference will last over three days. Items of interest to Portland will be taken up.

BOOSTERS AND GREAT BANQUET

Progressive Citizens of East Side Discuss 500,000 Club Plans.

Ninety-five east side boosters sat down to a banquet at the Hotel Princess, East Third and Burnside streets, last night, at which good fellowship and local pride were abundant. More than a dozen speakers were on the program for short talks and every one of them was an optimist in vein, boasting the east side, Portland, Or., the northwest and above all the coming Rose Festival. Every one of the dozen speakers was of the opinion that 500,000 was a very conservative estimate of Portland's population in 1912.

Characteristic of the meeting was the singing of the booster songs composed by C. C. Chapman, who led the 100 men present in one big chorus of boosters. All of the booster songs were sung with a vim which spoke well for the booster spirit of the city.

It was at 7:45 that to the strains of lively music, the guests were ushered into the banquet room. At the head of the table sat C. A. Bigelow, president of the East Side Business Men's club, and as the leading spirit in the big east side club, toastmaster for the evening. On his right sat Dr. J. R. Wetherbee, president of the Commercial club, who was the first to speak. Dr. Wetherbee's right sat C. C. Chapman, W. Wynn Johnson and Mr. Bigelow's extreme left. A place was reserved for Tom Richardson of the Commercial club, but he was engaged in providing for the entertainment of the party in charge of the Congrove funeral train.

Around the table were seated, besides the members of the East Side Business Men's club, the presidents of nearly all the push clubs of the east side. In the evening many of these presidents responded to toasts.

It was almost when the chairs were pushed back and toastmaster C. A. Bigelow made his opening speech. He explained the object of the banquet as being to arouse a greater interest in the east side participation in the coming Rose Festival, especially in the big feast of lanterns to be given on the east side. The meeting, he said, was to bring about a closer friendship between the members of the east side push clubs and the Commercial club and Rose Festival association, and above all to discuss ways and means of making Portland the queen of cities.

Following this theme Dr. J. R. Wetherbee, the first speaker introduced, dwelt at length on what he saw in the future for the east side of the river.

"We hardly appreciate what this country has in store for us," he said. "In fact, it surpasses all dreams. We have here 250,000 square miles of territory dependent upon us. We have now about 500,000 people in that territory whereas we can support 20,000,000. We have a territory bigger, richer and more fertile than the whole of the German empire. In this campaign for 500,000 by 1912, the east side will draw more than its share. Let many of us be a booster first, last and all the time."

W. Wynn Johnson, the representative of the Rose Festival association, was the next speaker. He advised the members of the clubs to boost the climate and resources of the country in connection with their Rose Festival advertising. He said that this would attract the class of citizens whom the country most needed, the farmer and dairyman.

C. C. Chapman, Dr. George B. Van Waters, Tom Richardson, W. L. Morgan, Judge M. G. Munly, Dr. William Deveny, J. H. Nolte, Francis Clarno, A. G. Ruhlert, and Ben C. Reinhold, also spoke. A rising vote was taken on the question of the city building a barn on the east side, and Taylor street, or in any other residence district, and it was unanimously decided that such a thing should not be allowed. J. H. Nolte moved that the people of the east side be asked to see that every visitor in the city during the Rose Festival be shown a bouquet or at least a boutonniere of roses.

OREGON MILLS INCREASE CUT

Other Pacific Northwest States Show Decrease in the Lumber Output.

In its thirty-sixth annual statement of the lumber and wood products of the Pacific Northwest, the American Lumberman of Chicago shows that Oregon is the only state west of Mississippi showing an increase in the lumber output during the year 1928 as compared with that for the previous year. Elsewhere in the Pacific coast and Rocky mountain districts, reports show a loss of 12.4 per cent.

The American Lumberman's introduction to its statistical report on lumber says: "The total reported cut of 1111 mills for 1928 was 5,773,171,000 feet. The output of 1210 mills in 1927 was 5,588,203,000 feet, showing a net loss of 815,032,000 feet or 12.4 per cent, as stated. The single product of these five states was 7,330,195,000 pieces. During 1927 the mills turned out 7,380,813 pieces, showing an increase in the cut during 1928 of 140,280,000, a gain of 2.3 per cent.

"Spruce is the only wood of which the 1928 cut exceeded that of the previous year, the gain being 6,255,000 feet.
