

PLANNED WILL HAVE NEW DEPOT

Council Grants Concessions and Work Will Start Within 30 Days.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Pendleton, Or., April 1.—Tax Agent Morrow of the O. R. & N. announced at the city council meeting last night that the railroad company would begin work within 30 days on an up-to-date depot at Pendleton. The announcement followed the passage of the council's resolution granting the railroad company the right to construct tracks across Anra and Lillith streets. The announcement on the part of Morrow means the withdrawal of the former ultimatum of the railroad company. The appropriation for the new Pendleton depot had been allowed for over two years by the railroad officials and numerous announcements regarding the commencement of work have been made. About two months ago, however, the O. R. & N. officials stated that they would not build a depot unless the city council would close Anra and Lillith streets so that they have more room for yards. Because of the remonstrances of property holders the council refused to do this. Nothing further was heard of the matter until the announcement last night, that the railroad company had reconsidered and construction work would be begun within 30 days. In appearance the new depot will resemble the handsome structure at Walla Walla.

STABS AGENT OF GOVERNMENT

J. J. Cusack's Motive Revenge Says A. J. Nichols, His Victim.

Desire for revenge because of testimony given against him in land fraud cases is the reason ascribed by A. J. Nichols, government agent, for the assault made upon him last night with a knife by J. J. Cusack, a timber cruiser. The row occurred in a saloon at the corner of Second and Morrison. "Cusack has been following me about for months," said Nichols this morning. "Last night I had taken a friend to find a man Frank Jennings, and was in the saloon when Cusack entered. He asked me first if I wanted to fight. Then Billy Simmons, a candy vendor, came into the saloon. Cusack snatched the knife from Simmons' tray and struck at me. Throwing up my arm to ward off the blow, the knife cut a deep slash in my hand. Cusack was arrested and put under \$1000 bonds for his appearance for trial."

JUDGE AT OAKLAND COLLAPSES IN COURT

Oakland, Cal., April 1.—Judge W. H. Waste collapsed on the bench in the superior court this morning as the result of overwork while in a debilitated condition following a long illness. He was removed from the bench and taken to a hospital. Judge Harris continued the case on trial until April 13. Judge Waste has been occupying the bench during the present week against the advice of his physician. The court calendars are congested, and Judge Waste insisted on conducting his portion of the court work. Last night his physicians urged that he discontinue his work but he insisted on going to court this morning to continue the trial of the case of Herman Wiesenthal against the Imperial Mfg. Co., which was held over before him for two days and was to resume today. His condition is regarded as serious, though not critical, but his physicians will insist on his taking a vacation of several weeks at least. In this instance the other superior judges and attorneys of the county will join.

CHINESE WEDS WHITE WOMAN IN MANITOBA

Heavyweight Johnson Fined.

New York, April 1.—Jack Johnson, the black heavyweight champion prize fighter, was fined \$200 here today on the charge of attempting a statutory offense, on complaint of Amy Douglas, a mulatto woman. The big negro appeared in the courtroom with confidence that bordered on effrontery and paid the fine with a great assumption of gusto, taking the bills from a large roll of currency. There was a marked difference in the attitude of the people in the street and about the courtroom toward the negro, as compared with his reception on his arrival here, but he apparently was oblivious to it.

PLAN CAR LINE OVER HEIGHTS

D. E. Keasey Asks County for Franchise Along Barnes Road.

With a view to the possible granting of a franchise for a streetcar line extension on the Barnes road, past the present terminus at the city park and thence up on the heights, County Commissioner Barnes and Lightner this morning inspected the line of the proposed route. The promoter of the extension is D. E. Keasey, who has extensive real estate interests that he desires to benefit by a new line. As planned, it would hug the creek along the Barnes road for a distance of about half a mile beyond the present terminus, then leaving the road to skirt the hills in the vicinity of what formerly was termed Melinda Heights. There probably will be no objections to a franchise, safeguarded in the usual way. The building of the line will be up to Mr. Keasey and the streetcar company.

JOSSELYN TAKES A BRIEF VACATION

E. S. Josselyn, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, left last night for Los Angeles, from which place he will go to some place in California where no mail or other communication can reach him during a period of at least 10 days. FORCES AGENT TO DISGORGE

Woman's Attachment Suit Brings Trust Funds Out of Safe Deposit.

Fearing that her sailor admirer, to whom she had entrusted her savings of many years, was about to make a "clean-up" and depart for Italy with the coin, Sadie Lavine yesterday brought suit in the circuit court for \$10,000, said to have been received by John Parker as her agent. Information had been received by her attorney, John F. Logan, that Parker had also acted as a confidential agent for other women in Seattle and Vancouver, and his client feared that all were to be left to grieve together. So an attachment was placed on the safety deposit vaults where Parker had cached the money and a keeper from the sheriff's office was placed in charge. Last evening the safety deposit company officials were furious when they learned that a deputy sheriff intended to camp in the vault. As a result, there was some lively scurrying. Parker interviewed the woman who had sued him, and they reached an agreement. Just how much she received she did not tell, but she obtained enough to satisfy her, paid her attorney, and the attachment was released. This morning the suit was dismissed.

BIG STRIKE IN ALBERTA ORDERED

Hill Raises Wages and Operatives of Other Concerns Want Same Concession.

McLeod, Alberta, April 1.—The International Federation of Miners today ordered a strike in all the mines of southern Alberta, in east British Columbia, as a result of its failure to reach an agreement with the employers on the question of a wage scale. Since Hill secured control of the Crown West Pass Coal company, he granted an increase in wages to his men, and the other operators assert that this act of his precipitated the strike. Two years ago a serious fuel famine resulted in the adjacent provinces when these miners struck.

PRINCE GEORGE AS A MARPLOT

Contumacy of One Degenerate Threatens the Peace of All Europe.

Vienna, April 1.—That the popularity of Crown Prince George among the jingoes of Serbia is responsible for his withdrawal of his letter renouncing the succession to the Serbian throne is the view taken of the incident by Austrian diplomats today. King Peter, they say, would gladly have accepted the resignation and named his son Alexander as his heir, had he dared invite the comity of the war party and the young elements of the Serbian people, who are loyal to the crown prince. The supporters of the king are deeply disappointed at the unexpected developments and dark hints are heard in Belgrade that another way will be found to rid the country of the menace of the accession of the degenerate crown prince. His accession to the throne would undoubtedly plunge Serbia into civil war and, for this reason, his enemies are determined to get rid of him.

WILL HAUGHTY VICTOR DEIGN TO THEODORE?

Naples, April 1.—If King Victor can persuade himself that it would not appear undignified on his part to greet a plain American citizen who has been president of 80,000,000 people, he will make the journey to this city in time to meet Colonel Theodore Roosevelt when the ship bearing him to the African hunting fields stops here on its Mediterranean voyage. Victor has expressed to his advisers a wish to welcome Roosevelt but this desire on his part has been frowned down by the court, and an official statement has been issued at the Quirinal announcing flatly that the king and Roosevelt will not meet, at least not until after the latter's return from the dark continent.
