YOUNG TAKES MINTO'S DESK

New Postmaster Will Work for Larger Quarters for Postoffice.

John C. Young, assuming this morning his duties as postmaster, declared it his greatest ambition to provide the city of Portland at once with postal facilities calculated to serve adequately a population of 500,000 people.

"I believe, as do the members of the 500,000 club, that Portland will have grown to that size by 1912," said Mr. Young. "I will not rest until I have in some way secured the increase in equipment which will enable the postoffice here to take care of mail for that many people. At the present rate of growth Portland may reach the 500,000 mark before 1912."

Mr. Young went on to say that he believed the present postoffice building at least 25 years behind the times. He thinks that much extra room could be provided by excavating under the building, but that ultimately a building at least three times the size of the structure now in use must be provided.

"Definite plans for the new building I will have to make after I have been in office longer," declared the postmaster. "I will also communicate the necessity for additional equipment to the postal authorities at Washington and to Senator Bourne. For the present I have a program in mind. I have an ambition to serve the people in the best way, and to this end I shall give my attention and time until I have become thoroughly familiar with the duties of the office."

The chair used nearly five years by ex-Postmaster John W. Minto, was occupied this morning by Postmaster Young. Mr. Minto was at the office explaining the details of the work to Mr. Young, and his assistant, W. E. Williamson. Mr. Young announced that he had become a member of the Post Office Association and that he was a member of an assistant at present.

Steamboat Men Make Rather Cool Demand on County Commissioners.

The county commissioners have received a letter from a number of captains and river pilots asking that the gatekeepers on the bridges over the Willamette be instructed to open the draw on all the bridges as soon as a boat whistles for passage in either direction. Their plea is that the commerce of the river should be unobstructed and that they should be allowed to go at better speed in the harbor.

This request will no doubt fall on deaf ears. As matters now stand, with the Madison bridge out of commission, the commissioners hear frequent complaints about the way traffic is tied up, and they have been hoping for something that would lessen the time the draws must remain open, rather than tying up all the bridges as soon as a boat starts through one of them.

ADMIRAL EVANS PAINTS CRUISE IN VIVID COLORS

"Fighting Bob" Proves Himself a Master Cartoonist in Words—Advocates Training of Sea Fighters in the Open Ocean—Urges 24 Battleships for Pacific.

"Fighting Bob" Evans was a great admiral. No one denies it. Every one is proud to affirm it. Last night he proved himself nearly as great as a cartoonist in words. His brushes are words; his caricatures carry humor and a sting. "Congress direct that no sea officer shall meddle in politics or make comments on the administration; therefore I can not say what a craglike might congress," he began. But strange enough, every listener knew precisely what "Fighting Bob" was thinking about congress before he quit painting pictures and hobbled away on his crutches, a brave old figure, pathetically regretful that a fellow must get old and have his flag hauled down for the benefit of a younger man.

One first saw silk hats, a great number of silk hats, and under them the senatorial smiles and congressional handshakes—over climbing over the vessel and making learned observations in a way fully as entertaining as it was illuminative to the bona fide sailors.
