

ORE CAPITOL **GRAZING EXPERT** **REED ESTATE**
GRAFT TRIALS **IS IN PORTLAND** **DISTRIBUTED**

Paves Way for Establishment of School Planned by Pioneer Woman.

In ordering the distribution of the Amanda W. Reed estate to the residuary legatees, the trustees for the Reed Institute, County Judge Webster has approved the plan suggested by the trustees to establish that institution, which will begin its work with about \$1,700,000.

Judge Webster also approved the final account of the executor of the will, Martin Winick, and granted him \$25,000 for his fees and commissions in settling the estate. This is more than the statutory allowance, additional compensation being granted for the extraordinary and extraordinary services required through the contest begun by the collateral heirs.

The present time are Rev. T. L. Elliot, C. A. Dolph, Martin Winch, W. P. Olds and Judge C. E. Wolverton. To this inheritance will be given all the estate of the decedent. The specific bequests and expenses are paid. The specific bequests amounted to \$329,000, aside from over \$3000 worth of jewelry and furs. The balance of the estate was paid over to the heirs, \$229,000, consisting of large tracts of real estate and valuable stocks and bonds.

The heirs to whom the jewelry and furs were bequeathed have been unable to agree upon their division, and Judge Webster has directed the executor to retain them in his possession until such time as an agreement is reached or until the court makes an order disposing of them.

The trustees of the estate met today, organized and elected officers as follows: Rev. T. L. Elliot, president; C. A. Dolph, vice president, and Martin Winch secretary and treasurer.
