TEACHER Hires HALL AND PUPILS DEFY DIRECTORS

Bakersfield, Cal., April 6.—Resisting half the population of the town, which demands her retirement from the position of teacher at the school in Johannesburg, a little town near here, Miss Katherine P. Coughlin is entrenched in her position more strongly than ever through the action of the other half of the township in coming to her rescue with a petition asking the Kern county supervisors to retain her. Miss Coughlin recently found the school house doors and windows closed against her by the school trustees, who nailed heavy boards across the entrance. Nothing daunted, she hired a hall near by and with the enthusiastic support of several score pupils still remains the official teacher of the town.

Japanese Consul on Tour. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chemsawa, Or., April 6.—The Japanese consul, S. Numami, located at Portland, has been visiting several points of interest in the Willamette valley. The leading educational institutions were visited and inspected, among them being the state university at Eugene, the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis, Willamette university at Salem, and the United States Indian school at Chemsawa. The consul was especially interested in the industrial features of the various institutions.

HAS WIFE BUT WOES ANOTHER

Jennie McKenzie Threatens William Weandt With Breach of Promise.

Los Angeles, April 6.—Following a complete disillusionment brought about by an accidental meeting with the wife of the man whom she says she was engaged to marry, Jennie McKenzie of Yuma, Ariz., is considering whether she will bring suit for breach of promise against William C. Weandt, a well known horseman of this city. Weandt is alleged by Miss McKenzie to have brought her from Yuma to this city, where they were to have been married today, despite the fact that Weandt

has a wife of whose existence Miss McKenzie did not know until yesterday. The Yuma girl by chance met Mrs. Weandt, who is of a prominent family at Santa Monica, at a reception here. When she learned Mrs. Weandt's identity Miss McKenzie told the wife of Weandt's courtship, with the result that they planned to entrap the horseman. Mrs. Weandt was secreted in the apartment of Miss McKenzie when Weandt called and is said to have heard enough to convince her of the truth of Miss McKenzie's charges. When exposed, Weandt became angry and struck Miss McKenzie several times with an umbrella. She had him arrested on a charge of battery, to which he pleaded guilty and paid a fine of \$25. Mrs. Weandt today refused to indicate what steps she would take. Miss McKenzie is the daughter of a college professor at Yuma.
