Reagor responded in a short but happy address thanking the speakers for the welcome given him and his family.

Water Rights Cause Suit—Suit was filed in federal court this morning by the Hood River Irrigation district, a corporation, against the Oregon Lumber company. The contesting parties are located in Wasco county. The litigation arises out of a suit brought by the irrigation company against the lumber company. The irrigation company has dug a ditch over the property of the defendant, but will not agree to pay the damages which the lumber company claims. The plaintiff claims to be ready to pay damages in the sum of \$100, but no more.

Abbott Found Guilty—Charles Abbott, accused of inducing a girl 13 years of age to go with him to his home in Monteville, where he compelled her to remain all night, was found guilty by Judge Gantenbein in the juvenile court yesterday afternoon. He was sentenced to the reform school and placed on parole. He is 17 years old and over six feet tall. Abbott is alleged to have been assisted in the affair by Dick Millon, not yet apprehended. Abbott was placed on probation in the juvenile court by Judge Frazer in the juvenile court about two years ago.

Steamer Sues Bark—Suit of the steamer Anna Cummings against the French bark Europe is being heard today in federal court. December 30, 1927, the Anna Cummings collided with the Europe in the Willamette near St. Johns. The bark was damaged, the Cummings badly injured. The plaintiff alleges that the Europe was anchored in the channel on a dark night without show of lights.

Workmen were not properly protected, says the attorney, and therefore the city should see that they get their money.

SAYS CHILDREN NEED PERMANENT HOMES

In her report as president of the Ladies' Relief society, given yesterday at the annual meeting, Mrs. P. J. Mann stated as her opinion that as soon as possible responsible homes should be found for the children for whom the institution can be only a temporary home. She urged that children be placed in proper homes while they are young, so they will grow into the affections of their foster parents, and said that they will have a much happier life than if they are kept in an institution until they are older and obliged to go out to work. At the same time she said great care must be taken to see that only the right kind of homes and foster parents are found, those who will not seek to exploit the children's wage earning capacity while avoiding paying wages. Mrs. Mann said that the children's home has never been in better condition than it is today, both inside and outside.

A similar report was given by Mrs. Cyrus Delp, who was the visitor for the past month. Mrs. Ellis G. Hughes was appointed visitor for the present month. An assistant housekeeper has been employed at the home in order to give the matron, Mrs. Ella Matlack, more opportunity to give personal and individual attention to the children and to "mother" them.
