

UNWILLING TO MAKE FIGURES AGREE

Justices Say Courts Make Money, the County Sees Only Big Deficit.

The old sub-adjudge that figures don't lie, but sometimes tell a different story, finds new illustration in correspondence that has passed between the county commissioners and Justices Bell and Chase.

The justices found, on inspecting the figures of income and expenditures for the month of March, that the justice court was \$187.73 ahead of the game.

But the commissioners carefully adjusted their spectacles, looked over figures submitted by County Auditor Brandy, and found that the justice court netted a loss of \$457.73 for the same month.

The letter of the justices, also signed by the clerk of the justice court, came under date of April 6. It says:

"We desire to respectfully call your attention to the report of the clerk of the justice court for the month of March, 1909:

Fines \$ 755.15
Fines (adulterated food) 200.00

Total \$1,027.65
Disbursements, salary and rentals \$ 840.00

Over expense for the month of March, \$187.73.

"Taking into consideration the small fees charged to litigants in the justice court, we feel that this is certainly a very satisfactory showing, and will appeal to you as very substantial proof of the great volume of work handled by the justice court."

The remainder of the letter tells how much the justices appreciate what the county court has done for them. To this epistle the commissioners sent the following reply the following day:

"We are in receipt of your communication of April 8, 1909, with reference to the earnings and expenses of the justice court for the month of March. On the face of the same it would appear to be a very good showing, but on looking up the record of the expenses of the justice court, in the office of the county auditor, we find the items to be as follows:

Salary of justices \$ 750.00
Salary of constables 432.33
Witnesses 268.39
Rent and stationery 275.40
Constable expenses 19.75

Total \$1,485.38

"This, according to your statement of fees would show a loss to the county of \$457.73. The expenses for February are:

REAL ESTATE MEN BANQUET

Responding to an invitation from the St. Johns realty board, between 25 and 30 members of the Portland board went to the lower peninsula city last night and were entertained by the home organization with a collation served in the rooms of the St. Johns Commercial club. President Wolcott of the St. Johns board delivered the address of welcome to the Portland visitors and was responded to by President H. W. Piles of the Portland board. Secretary J. O. Rountree, C. E. Fields and E. P. Mall had something to say by way of explaining the object, aims and methods of the Portland organization of realty men.

The object of the meeting was to promote harmony of action between the two organizations in working for the development and upbuilding of the entire Portland district.

The St. Johns realty board, a recent organization of the real estate brokers of that city, has about 30 members, all of whom are working as a unit for the development of St. Johns and other lower peninsula towns. Both hosts and guests expressed the opinion that last night's joint meeting of the two boards will result in inaugurating many needed reforms in the methods of the real estate brokers in the entire Portland district.

Out of all this discussion as to whether or not trains will be run from the different cities Portland is getting an invaluable amount of advertising. Along with Portland, the Rose Festival, the Seattle Fair, Oregon and the whole northwest are being given thousands of dollars' worth of free advertising, invaluable to the country.

DR. WILSON TALKS ON WORLD PEACE

The world's peace movement was the subject of a most interesting address given by Dr. J. R. Wilson, president of Portland academy, before the woman's alliance of the United Church yesterday afternoon. Dr. Wilson reviewed the growth of the peace sentiment and the conditions which have favored it, naming as main factors the growth of international commerce, the rise of democracy in England, France and Germany, the advance of civilization and the great growth of armaments. The increased estimate of the value of the individual, the distinction of intelligence and the greater comfort of living were mentioned as important results of the advance of civilization.

In naming the important events of the past three quarters of a century which have contributed to the world's peace, Dr. Wilson selected the rise of America as a world power through the civil war; second, the Geneva arbitration in 1872, with its settlement of the Alabama claims; third, the Hay diplomacy in connection with the Boxer rising in China; fourth, The Hague conference in 1899; fifth, the Algeiras compromise; and sixth, the conclusion of peace between Russia and Japan through the mediation of President Roosevelt.

PORTLAND HAS SENT DELEGATE

Chamber of Commerce Represented at New York Traffic Meeting.

The chambers of commerce of the Pacific Northwest will meet, through delegates, with the representatives of the transcontinental railway lines in New York on April 12. L. Gerlinger left last week especially to represent the Portland Chamber of Commerce at this meeting in New York. Mr. Gerlinger is a personal friend of Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific and of several others of the executives of the transcontinental lines and is regarded as being a most efficient delegate.

A Seattle newspaper in an effort to belittle Portland in its account of the meeting, said that Portland would have no delegate present. Its Portland fellow took up the unfounded story and repeated it as fact without endeavoring to ascertain its truth, according to the officers of the Portland Chamber.

The invitations to the Japanese chambers of commerce to visit this country next summer were received by the Portland organization for the signature of President MacMaster this morning. They are engraved on heavy unfolded paper and read:

"To the Tokio Chamber of Commerce, Osaka Chamber of Commerce, Kyoto Chamber of Commerce, Yokohama Chamber of Commerce, Kobe Chamber of Commerce,

"Gentlemen: Desiring to give expression to our feelings of friendship and good will towards Japan and the Japanese people, and in an effort to bring about a better understanding between the two nations, which, in our opinion, must inevitably result in increased prosperity to the maturing and commercial interests of both countries, the undersigned chambers of commerce extend to the Tokio, Osaka, Kyoto, Yokohama and Kobe chambers of commerce an invitation to have thirty of their leading business men and trade experts visit the United States in September next.

"In the event we are honored by the acceptance of this invitation, you may rest assured that the chambers of commerce of Spokane, Tacoma, Portland and Seattle will take advantage of every opportunity to make your stay in this country both pleasant and profitable, and to reciprocate, in some measure, the hospitality and attention extended to our representatives, while your guests, during their recent visit to Japan.

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LIQUOR LICENSES ARE NOT PAID

Only 50 Per Cent of Total Due City for Quarter Received.

Only 50 per cent of the liquor license fees for the second quarter have been collected as yet, the amount paid into the city treasury being about \$50,000. Two days yet remain in which delinquents may pay without becoming delinquent.

Councilman Rushlight is busy trying to revise the liquor ordinance with a view to codifying them. He said this morning, however, that the task is large one and he does not think it will be completed until after the election in June, when the commission plan of government may be adopted, and in that case the task may devolve upon the new council.

Meanwhile the city is getting no revenue whatever from restaurants that sell liquor. The council refuses to accept the application of the restaurant men for licenses and the circuit court says that the city cannot stop the sale of liquor in the cafes as long as the present law governing the issuance of licenses remains in effect.

The council may amend this law so that the city may either collect fees from the restaurants or prohibit the
