DR. W. S. HOLT HOME AGAIN

Rev. W. S. Holt, Pacific coast secretary for home missions of the Presbyterian church, returned home this morning, after a three months' trip in eastern cities, during which time he has been actively engaged in an advance movement for home mission work. Dr. Holt was called as a delegate to take part in a campaign of 17 different denominations in a united effort for advance in home mission work, in which special speakers took different topics, and visited the cities of Brooklyn and Buffalo, N. Y.; Hartford, Conn.; Cleveland, Ohio; Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, Pa.; Baltimore, Md.; Atlanta, Ga.;

Memphis, Tenn.; Omaha, Neb., and Minneapolis, Minn. Dr. Holt's part in the campaign was confined to the eastern states. He visited Presbyterianism in New Jersey and New York, visited Auburn seminary and obtained a young minister for work in Oregon, made two addresses at Princeton seminary and spoke in one of the largest churches in Philadelphia. This is the third visit that Dr. Holt has made of three months' duration in eastern cities, in an effort to bring the needs of the home mission field more prominently before the people of the eastern churches. A good time, barring the disagreeable weather that we had back here, said Dr. Holt this morning, "but I am mighty glad to get back home again, and I met a number of our people in the east. The cause of home missions seems to be taking hold of the eastern churches, and definite results are said to be obtained."

and obtained a position in a stock company. She worked hard and continued her studies under the direction of the friendly stage manager. In 1867 the younger Dumas asked her to come to Paris to play the part of Camille, but her French was too imperfect and she did not succeed. While playing an engagement in Poznan, Mme. Modjeska met Count C. Bosenta Chlapowski, the editor of a newspaper in the Polish language. He fell desperately in love with her and married her in September, 1868. That same year she played in Warsaw, where she achieved a remarkable success in her art. For two months her performances were but a series of ovations by her enthusiastic compatriots.

To America in 1874. In the following year her husband settled in Warsaw, where she continued her stage successes, adding seven or eight new parts to her repertory every year. The hard work gradually undermined her physical strength and in 1879 she was compelled to abandon the stage for a long rest. At that time a lady friend recommended to her a sea voyage and in 1878 she and her husband, accompanied by a number of friends, came to the United States. They visited the centennial exposition at Philadelphia and then continued their trip to the western states, where they intended to found a Polish colony.

First American Engagement. The colony plan failed, however, and Mme. Modjeska-Chlapowski decided to return to the stage to earn a livelihood. She went to San Francisco, where she began to study English, with a view of going upon the American stage. In six months she mastered the language, and, with the assistance of McCullough, the actor-manager, she was given the opportunity to make her debut in "Adrienne Lecouvreur." Her success was beyond all expectation and immediately after the performance Dumas engaged her for two years. For previous reasons she changed her former stage name to the simpler form of "Modjeska." Under her new name she became known throughout the United States. After successful engagements Mme. Modjeska returned to her native country.

try, where she met with an enthusiastic reception. No effort was spared to persuade her to settle permanently in America, but she preferred to remain in America, visiting her native country from time to time. Even these occasional visits were made impossible about 15 years ago, when the Russian authorities prohibited her from entering Poland for fear that her presence would lead to anti-Russian demonstrations on the part of the excitable Polish people.

About five years ago her falling health compelled Mme. Modjeska to retire from the stage and seek rest on her beautifully situated and picturesque ranch, known as Arden, in Orange county, California. Her estate is located in the mountains near Los Angeles, at the end of a picturesque canyon and comprises about 400 acres. There she spent the last years of her life with her husband, leaving her charming home only occasionally to take part in charitable performances or patriotic celebrations of her Polish compatriots.

into his belt and produced a big sack. While the other eight revolvers held the crowd motionless, the fifth man moved quickly about the tables and scooped all the money in sight into the sack. Then he ordered half a dozen of the most prosperous looking players to stand while, with the dexterity of an expert, he rifled their pockets, throwing whatever he took into the sack with the other loot. The men who accomplished the robbery stepped back to the four men on guard, drew his revolvers to reinforce the party and all five backed slowly out of the room. At the doorway the four waited a minute or two, while the fifth man rushed out with the bag of loot, prepared the horses for quick action and at a signal all five disappeared disappeared in the darkness. The men who were robbed were pulled down over their eyes, but they did not make much effort to conceal their faces and it is probable they could be identified if captured.
