

BRILLIANT ARTISTS WILL BE HEARD IN MUSICAL FESTIVAL CONCERTS



Franz Wagner, Famous Cellist, Who Will Be Heard with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at Musical Festival.

Portland's second annual musical festival will be given at the Armory, it being planned to give five concerts, three evenings, April 30, May 1 and 2, and two afternoons, May 3 and 4. The festival will be given by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra of 60 musicians and the Portland Festival Chorus of 80 voices. The orchestra will be under the direction of the talented and favorite conductor, Adolph Rosenbeck, who did such splendid work last year with this same orchestra. The chorus, which has been in rehearsal since last November, will be directed by Professor W. H. Boyer of this city. Coming from the east with the orchestra, will be the following quartet of well-known vocal soloists: Aida Kemm, soprano; Miss Frahm, contralto; David B. Dugan, tenor; Frank Arthur Preisch, basso.

Besides this array of brilliant artists, the orchestra will include 10 instrumental soloists of whom the most prominent are Franz Wagner, cellist,

and Guy Woodard, violinist. The world famous pianist, Myrtle Elynn, will be heard in conjunction with the big orchestra. The following cantatas and choruses will be sung by the combined chorus and orchestra: Sullivan's "Golden Legend"; "Hail Bright Abode," from Wagner's "Tannhauser"; "Sanctus," from Gounod's St. Cecilia Mass; Gail's "Holy City" and "Stabat Mater" by Rosini. The chorus will be heard in one of these grand works at each concert. At each concert, outside of Saturday night, when "The Golden Legend" will be given, the orchestra and soloists will be heard in classical popular numbers.

The entire program will be announced in the very near future. The advance seat sale for the five concerts will open at Ellers Piano House on Monday morning, April 19, at 10 o'clock. Mail orders from both in and out of town will be received. Advance letters and make money orders and checks payable to W. T. Fangle, at Ellers Piano House.

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COSTS \$37.90 TO PAY 20 CENTS
