

AGITATION

Over 140 Factories and Mills Chinaman Accused of Com- Are Delinquent on In- spection Payments.

Salem, Or., April 12.—More than 140 factories and mills in the state of Oregon have not paid their inspection fees. A complete list of the delinquent manufacturing concerns has been prepared by Labor Commissioner Hoff, grouped by judicial districts. The list has been filed with the secretary of state and the district attorneys in each of these districts will bring actions against each of the concerns for the collection of the fees.

The fees are due for last year and the year before in most of the cases. All kinds of plants are in the list, including a great many sawmills and a number of newspaper plants. Similar actions have been brought before, that have made a test of the validity of the law that authorizes the collection of fees. About May 23 a new law will go into effect, revising the present scale of fees, which is now less than \$100 a year for a mill employing more than five men are employed. Under the new law, as enacted by the late legislature, the maximum fee is \$100 a year, more in detail and the fees run from \$10 to \$40, according to the number of men employed.

Friends Urge Physician to Enter Contest for Mayor- ality and He Will Probably Consent—Convention Can- didate In to Stay.

Dr. Andrew C. Smith will in all probability enter the race as a candidate for the Republican nomination for mayor of Portland, say his friends. Dr. Smith himself is making no statements just at this time, saying that he has not had time to consider the situation under its changed conditions and that until he has given it careful consideration he desires to make no statement for publication.

It is known, however, that Dr. Smith has been giving the question more than passing thought. The anti-Simon and pro-primary law forces have been seeking him, earnestly expecting his return to the city this morning and strong representations have been made to induce him to enter the field.

A delegation of well known business men of the city is scheduled to corner the doctor for a conference this afternoon, and out of that conference may be that some definite understanding will come.

The anti-Simon people are determined to persuade him to enter the race against the convention candidate, and they have set their hearts upon Dr. Smith as being the best qualified man to lead the city to become the Moses. It is believed that Dr. Smith will make some definite decision within the next 24 hours, and that he will return to the city this morning and strong representations have been made to induce him to enter the field.

Dr. Smith's entry into the race, or failure to enter, would not have any effect on his candidacy, but that he will remain a candidate is not considered. "I have had no intention at all of withdrawing," said the ex-senator. "It is something I have not considered."

Dr. Smith was a busy man today. A stream of callers, including several prominent figures in the recent convention, flowed into his office, and he was kept busy for several hours.

It was evident that the activity of the opposition camp had created a flutter among the trusted lieutenants of Simon, and they were watching him with keen eyes.

At Simon headquarters confidence was expressed that Dr. Smith would not become a candidate, as it would mean a severe blow to the city. Dr. Smith, however, had favored Simon prior to the assembly and had declared that he would not consent to run himself.

W. J. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, is said to have a gubernatorial bid, and it is reported that a delegation of his friends and supporters will meet this afternoon to discuss the matter.

There is comparative quiet in the Democratic camp today, but the hunt for a strong man to oppose the Republican nominee is still in progress. Chairman George H. Thompson of the Democratic central committee says that new names are being considered and the leader is not far from making a selection.

Some sort of an understanding is said to exist between Rushlight and Kelleher, two of the early state entrants. Rushlight is said to be in the city, and it is said that Kelleher would not stand in his way after the primaries if he equally strong in the nomination.

Kelleher will have nothing to do with the primary, but says he will be in the city.

POULSEN ARRESTED FOR EAST SIXTH FILL.

President John Poulsen, of the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company, was arrested this morning on a charge of illegal filling in East Sixth street between Caruthers and Union streets. Mr. Poulsen gave himself up at police headquarters and was released on the right of the mill company to fill in streets within the city company has contracted with the Pacific Bridge company to fill in the street with earth. Fire in Cottage Roof.

A fire at Fifth and Main streets last night burned a small home in the east end of the cottage belonging to Joseph H. Meyer. The loss was slight and the cause of the fire was not ascertained.

SAYS CITIZENS' PARADES-PEACE WERE RUINED OUT OF TEXAS

Housewife Brings Suit Against Steam Clean- ing Works.

Lace curtains of a sickly green shade draped tastefully over a table and two chairs formed the principal exhibit during the morning session in Judge Gatens' branch of the circuit court.

The case in which the drapery was used was that of Margaret E. Ideaman against Herman E. Ideaman, proprietor of a steam cleaning and pressing establishment on the east side, for the recovery of \$30 damages.

Testimony was presented to the effect that during the month of September, 1908, Mrs. Ideaman took an amount of lace curtains to Mr. E. Ideaman's establishment to be dry cleaned. She charged the curtains and they were returned the color had been changed and that they were torn, lacerated and blighted with spots—absolutely ruined.

Mrs. Ideaman declared she paid \$33 for the curtains and asked \$30 damages. A. P. Clark and C. M. Ideaman represented the plaintiff and E. and N. L. Monahan the defendant.

In the justice court Mrs. Ideaman was given a verdict of \$30 and a judgment for costs. The case was tried before a jury. The courtroom was crowded.

HOUSE RECALLS THE OLD JOYER

Washington, April 12.—The house today adopted Payne's resolution asking the senate to return the tariff bill, accompanied with the direction that it be sent back to the senate as amended on the engineering clause and altered so as to place petroleum, crude and refined, and all its products, on the free list.

This action was taken to overcome the "joker" in the measure, which, while placing petroleum on the free list, puts a protective tariff on all of its products.

Hundreds of people on Washington street this morning were excited to see the Imperial hotel upon hearing of the explosion. Some serious accident was believed to have occurred. HUSBAND DEMURS TO MRS. MEIER'S CHARGES

Fred Meier, defendant, through John T. Whalley, his attorney, today filed a demurrer to the complaint of Laura Meier, his wife, in a divorce action. He contended that the allegations contained in her complaint are not sufficient to constitute cause for suit.

The case was tried in Portland, December 17, 1908, and for three and a half years past the defendant has treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner, declared the plaintiff. She says he frequently choked her and laid violent hands on her. She asks the custody of the two children, a son and a daughter, aged 2 and 3 years, and a portion of the property.

ELEVEN ORIENTAL GAMBLERS FINED.

Patrolmen Shaffer and Anderson raided a fan game at 43 North Fourth street last evening and arrested eleven Chinamen and Japanese who were fined \$10 and costs each upon a plea of guilty before Municipal Judge Van Zante in police court this morning.

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LENT PUTS CHECK ON MARRIAGE LICENSES.

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EFFORTS ARE MADE TO ESTABLISH IDENTITY OF THE LATE "Prof." KARWIN.

Karwin, the palmist who fell off a boat in Coos Bay, is again destined for burial. Two hundred members attended. Just before the funeral a letter was received from a Portland representative of the body, stating that Karwin's body was that of one Croker, a missing friend. The body was placed in a vault.

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COAL RAILWAY PRESIDENTS AND INDEPENDENTS ARE IN CONFERENCE.
