Woman's Auxiliary Reports.—The woman's auxiliary to the police department reports for the quarter ending March 15th investigations made and 146 young women away from home. The department has visited 39 questionable lodgings houses, reporting same to the police officials. It has held 292 personal interviews with girls in trouble. Twenty-two sick girls were visited and nine were furnished transportation to their homes. Two hundred and ninety-four meals and lodgings were given. The work was accomplished by the superintendent and one assistant, who is a stenographer, for three months for \$177.24.

Pledge. Third of \$65,000.—Splendid progress is being made toward raising funds for the construction of the new Sunnyside Methodist Episcopal church. In five days one third of the \$65,000 necessary for the construction of the church has been pledged by only those members of the congregation who wish to give \$50 or more. Contributions from those who will give less than \$50 are being asked for this week. Three of the large immediate windows have already been sold. Ground will be broken for the new building at the corner of East Tenth and Broadway, near the old site, within the next two weeks. The pastor is Rev. W. P. Boster.

Congregational Pastor Tells of Practical Meaning to Christians.

Luther R. Dyott, pastor of the First Congregational church, spoke on "The Practical Meaning of Christ's Resurrection to Christians of Today" yesterday morning. Following the sermon 23 new members joined the church. These make a total of 250 accessions at the last nine receptions into the membership of this rapidly growing church. The sermon in part was as follows, being preached from the text:

"If then we were raised together with Christ, seek those things that are above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on things that are above, not on things that are upon the earth. For ye died and your life is hid with Christ in God. Col. 3:1, 2."

The idea of the doctrine, and the hope of the resurrection constitute an essential part of the Christian religion. But these things did not have their origin in our Christian religion. Neither did the belief in the immortality of the soul. Some persons have claimed that Job taught the doctrine of the resurrection, and have taken pains to quote his words, saying: "I know that my redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth; and though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God: my redeemer—vindicator, goal—liveth, and at last he will stand upon the earth, and after my skin, though it be destroyed, yet shall I see God. (Not in my flesh) shall I see God. But the resurrection idea does antedate the Christian era.

It is regarded as the first scripture writer in whose works allusion to the resurrection can be found. Sea Isaiah's prophecy, however, gradually evolved until the time of Christ and his teachings: the Jews generally, believed in the resurrection of the physical body. The Sadducees did not so believe, and they presented a hypothetical case, as an intricate argument with Jesus, whereupon the Lord told them that physical relationships upon earth would be transcended by higher relationships in heaven and that marital ties there would be surmounted by relationships there, like unto those held by angels. The rabbis in the times of Jesus believed some of the theories about the resurrection of the body that were theories to threads and ended arguments in absurdities. Our Christian system neither stands nor falls upon the resurrection of our mortal bodies, although the apostle Paul seemed to make everything to depend upon the resurrection of Christ from the dead, advocated a belief in the personal and, it would seem, a bodily resurrection of believers in Christ. And this Paul would give up preaching if he forsook his belief in the resurrection of the body.

There may be infinitely more in that hint which Paul gives of the germ theory of the resurrection of the body than our modern Christianity makes of it. But still the whole matter is deeper and diviner than the theories of any man, even though he may claim the inspiration of Almighty God in his utterances. We touch that which is deeper and diviner when we declare that, primarily, it is a matter of identity with God. Like comes of like. That which is natural and mortal is natural and mortal, and subject to the laws and forces of that which is natural and mortal. That which is spiritual and immortal is spiritual and immortal, and is superior to the laws and forces of that which is natural and mortal. The spiritual and immortal are incapable of corruption and dissolution, as God himself is incapable of these things. The body and the life of Jesus were invested with the mortal and immortal. Now, if that im-

mortal principle which dwelt in his body, there was slain, and in the church at Corinth he said, "If Christ be not raised, then is our preaching in vain and your faith is also vain." We cannot be wrong then when we affirm that upon the fact of the resurrection stands or falls the whole superstructure of Christianity.

"Unless Jesus actually came back from the grave then indeed we have followed, in the language of Peter, 'vainly devised fables,' and have been hopelessly deceived; but standing by the open sepulchre we take courage in the thought that we are not fighting in a conflict where the issues are uncertain. There is no question as to the final issue."

Christ's Resurrection Greatest Event in Human Annals Says Pastor.

"The Waterloo of the World's History," was the subject of Dr. Reager's Easter sermon, delivered at the First Christian church yesterday. The pastor is an earnest and able speaker. His sermon in part was as follows: "Waterloo," says Victor Hugo, 'is the change of the front of the universe.' It is the most definite epoch in human annals, and it divides all history into two great dispensations: the age of the trial, the mocking and the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth make up the blackest page in all the world's history; but at the same time they hold the secret of that divine transaction by virtue of which life and light have come into the world. In consequence of this, all facts of the world's history, we should be as Moses before the burning bush, standing upon holy ground, and hearing the voice of the command, 'Put off thy shoes from off thy feet.'"

The resurrection is faith's firm foundation. Faith must have its Gibraltar, its firm foundation. We must go beyond Bethany, Galilee, Gethsemane, and away to find him who has power to deliver from the guilt and dominion of sin. Paul says, 'If thou shalt confess with thy mouth that Jesus is the Lord, and shall believe in thy heart that God raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved.'"
