

## ORPHEUM WILL BE CHANGED

Sullivan & Considine Plan to Add to Seating Capacity of Theatre.

A substantial enlargement of the seating capacity of the Orpheum theatre has been decided upon by the lessees, Sullivan & Considine. The plans as prepared by the local architect contemplate the cutting down of the stage and the building in of 12 rows more of orchestra seats. While this improvement will not be made immediately, it will not be delayed any great length of time, but will be taken up as soon as the big \$500,000 majestic theatre under construction by this firm in Seattle, as well as others at Kansas City and St. Joe, Mo., and at Cincinnati, are completed.

John Considine, of Sullivan & Considine, was in Portland a few weeks ago, but his visit was of such short duration that the master of the Orpheum improvement was not considered, but in instructions sufficiently definite have been given to the local management to warrant them in having the plans prepared. The improvement will cost about \$45,000.

**Water Situation.**

Of these colonists 355 came to Portland, 233 went to southern Oregon, 12 to Hood River, 14 to Pendleton, 25 to La Grande, 30 to Baker City, 18 to Walla Walla and 14 to Lewiston. The remainder were scattering.

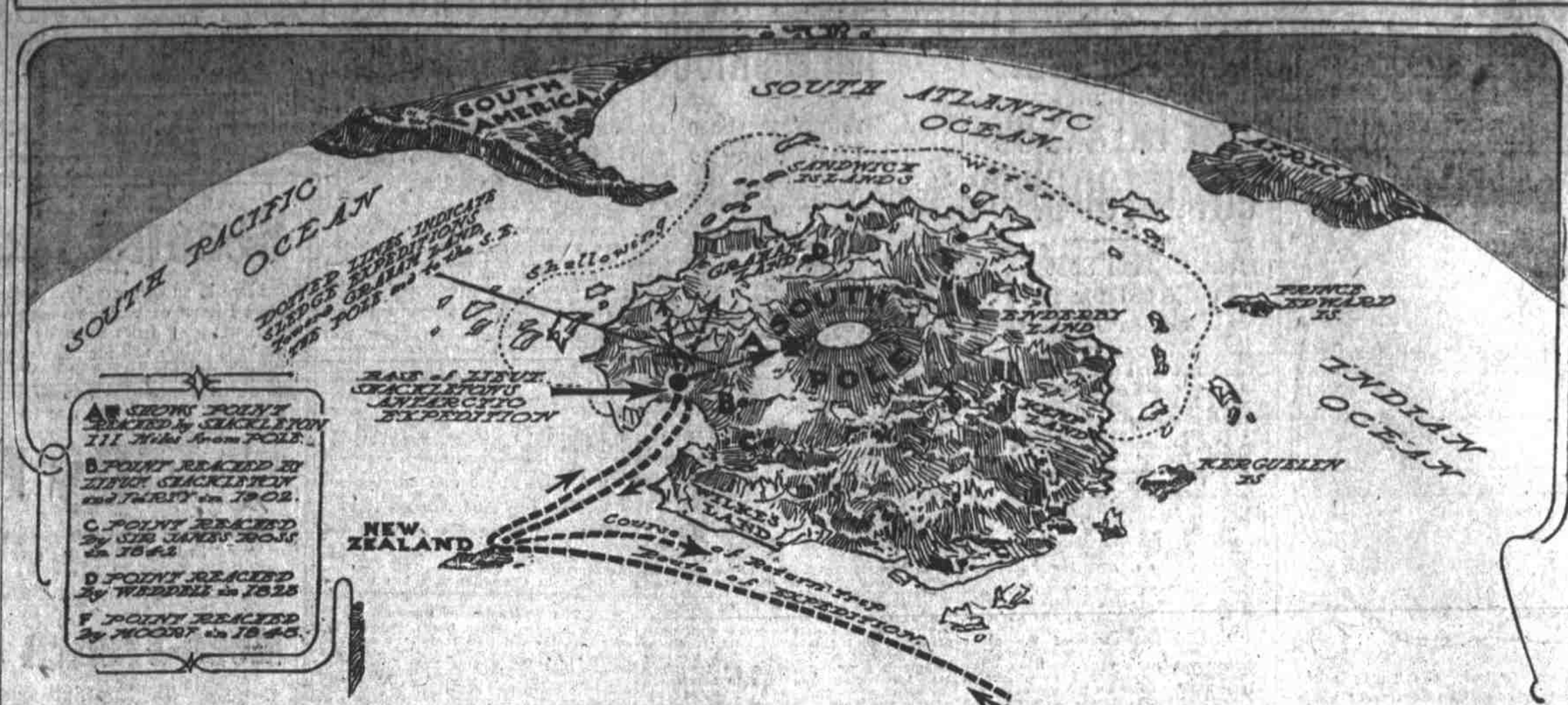

## Politics and Politicians

A. O. Oberhart, lieutenant governor of Minnesota, is spoken of as a possible candidate for governor next year.

Samuel L. Gilmore, Democrat, has been elected to Congress from the Second Louisiana district, succeeding the late Robert Davy.

Virginia Republicans are becoming active in anticipation of the state campaign soon to begin. At present a suitable candidate for governor is being sought.

Edward W. Durant, whom President Taft has appointed collector of customs at Charleston, S. C., is forty-five years old and a native of Minnesota. He is a graduate of the Sheffield Scientific school.

The prohibition national committee, displeased at the action of the Iowa legislature in defeating the proposed prohibition constitutional amendment, proposes to make the Hawkeye state the chief battleground for the anti-saloon fight next year.

Mayor D. W. Lawler of St. Paul proposes to create a city cabinet by appointing an advisory committee of prominent business and professional men to act as advisors in the administration of municipal affairs.

Hon. Horace Chilton, former United States senator from Texas, has been asked to accept the place on the State Railroad commission left vacant by the recent death of Judge Leonidas J. Storey.

Governor Hadley of Missouri expressed the opinion that one of the political possibilities of the near future will be a titanic struggle between the Democratic and Republican parties for the control of the South's electoral votes.

A well defined movement is said to be under way to dislodge Col. Cecil Lyne from the leadership of the Republican organization in Texas. A conference of the opposition leaders is to be held soon to take definite action in the matter.

George H. Moses, who has been appointed minister to Greece and Montenegro, has been a prominent figure for many years in New Hampshire political life. He was a delegate to the last national Republican convention at Chicago, and was an ardent supporter of Vice President Fairbanks for the presidential nomination.

Representative Hughes of New Jersey has been appointed as the "whip" of the Democratic party by Champ Clark, the Democratic leader in the House. Representative O'Connell of Massachusetts. The party "whip" has a lot to do. It is his duty to ascertain as nearly as possible the sentiment of the members of his party on all pending legislation depending on party action, and to see that the entire membership of his party is present when the vote is taken on the question.

R. A. Taft, son of the President, was chosen head of the Intercollegiate Civic League at its recent meeting in New York. The league is an organization which plans to interest colleges in politics, to show them what their civic duty is, and to inspire them to perform it. Thirty of the leading colleges of the country are embraced in the membership of the league. Young Mr. Taft is a student at Yale and represented that institution at the league convention.

**Charles S. Sherrill's Birthday.**  
Charles Sherrill Hitchcock, the new United States minister to the Argentine Republic, was born in Washington, D. C., April 12, 1867. After graduating from the Yale Law School in 1892 he began the practice of law in New York City, where he soon established a reputation as an able corporation lawyer. He became active in Republican politics, and in the two McKinley campaigns he organized the Lawyers' Round Money club, and was one of the committee of five that conducted the monster business parade of those two campaigns. Mr. Sherrill was a noted athlete in his college days and after his graduation he continued his interest in athletic sports. He was the originator of the idea of international inter-university track athletic meetings, having arranged the Yale-Oxford match in London in 1894, and the Yale-Cambridge match in New York the following year.

## CRAZY SNAKE READY TO YIELD

But Not to Oklahoma Authorities and Uncle Sam Doesn't Know Him.

Tulsa, Okla., April 12.—Because the United States has not declared war on anybody, Federal District Attorney Gregg was today forced to refuse an offer of surrender made by Crazy Snake, the outlaw Indian chief, and his little handful of followers.

A courier came down from the hills today and brought Crazy Snake a message from Uncle Sam. He told him that if he would give himself up to the government and get the state of Oklahoma to accept his capitulation and guarantee him protection, the matter was referred to Gregg, who finally decided he had no authority to accept the chief's surrender.

## Blames Defective Platform.

Alleging that a defective platform on the Oregon Electric is responsible for a sprained ankle and the loss of two months' work, F. N. Myers has begun suit in the circuit court for \$2500 damages. He says the accident took place at the Beaverton platform on February 24, when he alighted after riding from Portland.

## PROTEST AGAINST MOVING BRIDGE

Containing that the moving of the new steel bridge from Holladay to Oregon street would be a detriment to the city in many ways, a determined body of men forming the Steel Bridge Push club last night appointed a committee of five prominent east side men to confer with the Port of Portland and the city council in order to find out what could be done to keep the location of the bridge as it is. The club has and eight petitions out for some time and has several thousand signatures which it intends to send to the secretary of war protesting against the removal of the bridge.

The argument advanced is that the moving of the bridge would injure the anchorage on the south side of the steel bridge and that business, already grown to large proportions at the east end of the steel bridge would be greatly damaged. It is also pointed out that Oregon street, where it is planned to locate the new bridge, is only 50 feet wide and that when two 12-foot sidewalks are put in there would be but 26 feet of street left. The committee appointed consisted of Francis Clarno, H. C. Kluge, J. H. Rankin, Sam Ruby and Henry Blackman.

## MORRISON BRIDGE TOLLS RUN HIGH

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company turned in \$1826.21 in tolls for the use of Morrison street bridge during March. This is the largest amount ever received by the city in a single month for similar tolls. The average amount of tolls before the Madison street span went out of commission was \$1200 for the Morrison bridge.

## URGES LAYING PIPES DEEPER

The trustees of the chamber of commerce this noon passed a resolution requesting the city water board to lower the pipes for carrying Bull Run water under the Willamette river to at least 30 feet below the surface of the water at all points. This precaution is urged so that vessels in the river will be able to pass over the pipes without danger of injuring them.

It was decided by the trustees to spend about \$6000 for a new book on Portland, to be profusely illustrated and to contain several handsome colored plates. These books will be issued in an edition of 50,000 and Secretary Giltner was instructed to find out what another 50,000 can be procured for. The books are to be got out by the Home-seekers' bureau of Sunset, and are for distribution by the chamber over the entire country.

A resolution was adopted requesting the attendance of the members of the river and harbor committee of congress at a hearing in Portland on April 29, when a proposal to extend the harbor limits to the mouth of the Willamette river will be made.

## Fined for Fighting.

S. E. Golvin was fined \$20 and costs by Municipal Judge A. Zante in police court this morning for fighting with J. L. Young, foreman of the construction work of the new warehouse being built at Thirteenth and Everett streets. John

Roberts, arrested on the same charge, was dismissed and the case against H. Thomas, will also be dropped. Golvin appeared to be the aggressor in the fight. He had been discharged by Young last Saturday and on this account went out on a trouble hunt.

## WALTHAM FOOTBALL MEN ARE HEROES

Boston, April 12.—Two star members of the Waltham High school football team today are heroes of the school because of their daring in stopping a runaway horse, saving a woman who was an occupant of the carriage the animal was drawing and saving the lives of several persons on the street. "Fire Horse" Smith, a Waltham tackle, saw the horse as it ran headlong toward a crowd that was watching a baseball game. Smith leaped for the animal's neck for a flying tackle, while his companion, Robert Downing, jumped into the buggy, seized Mrs. James Collins and sprang with her to the ground unhurt. Smith brought the horse to the ground within a few feet of the crowd and many persons who saw the running quickly aided him in subduing the frightened animal.

## HARRIMAN BOATS MUST CUT RATES

Otherwise Open River Line Will Get Grain Shipment, Say Dealers.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Spokane, Wash., April 12.—The O. R. & N. must meet the Open River Transportation company's rates at Lewiston, Idaho, or loose a gigantic tonnage of grain after harvest this year. The reduction must affect both rail and river transportation, as the river can handle the grain tonnage as it did before the Lewiston and Riparia branch of the O. R. & N. was built.

The Open River Transportation company's rates are considerably lower than the Harriman line's now, and as the Harriman steamers will handle nothing that is reached by rail, Lewiston merchants declare the Open River company will get a 1,000,000 bushel grain shipment this fall, unless sharp competitive rates are quoted by Harriman. Several more boats will be required then and Harriman steamers will float at empty docks.
