STOCKHOLDERS OF O. & C. MEET

Choose Directors Who Will Again Name Harriman for President.

E. H. Harriman hasn't been dropped from the board of directors of the Oregon & California and as he is the only candidate for the office of president of that railroad when the directors meet next Monday it is not believed that he has any intention of retiring from the active control of his various lines for the next year at least.

The stockholders of the Oregon & California held their annual meeting this morning. Proxies for 189,478 shares—a safe majority—were held in the meeting and were cast for the various directors named. The board for the year will consist of W. W. Cotton, W. E. Cotton, Peter F. Dunne, W. D. Featon, J. R. Fields, E. H. Harriman, H. E. Hamilton, E. Koehler, John McCracken, J. E. O'Brien and C. G. Sutherland. The majority of the directors are employees of the Southern Pacific company and usually reside in Portland to insure a quorum at most times.

Immediately upon the election blank forms were made out in Mr. Cotton's office and will be sent to the various directors to be filled out in order that they may qualify. Mr. Harriman will retire by mail and will have to take with him a notary properly to fill the office of director.

Owing to the absence from the city of several of the directors, including Mr. Cotton and Judge Featon the election of officers was postponed until Monday. Mr. Harriman will be president, Mr. O'Brien vice president and Mr. Koehler second vice president.

ANOTHER MEXICAN WAR VETERAN FOUND TO JOIN FESTIVAL PARADE

Thomas W. Sparks, of This City, Hale and Hearty at Age of 86.

Hale and hearty at the age of 86, Thomas W. Sparks living at 248 Forty-first street, a veteran of the Mexican war, promises to outlive many of a younger generation. Mr. Sparks was born in Clay county, Kentucky, October 15, 1822, afterward moving to Missouri where he enlisted in company I, Second regiment Missouri volunteers in 1846 and was honorably discharged at Fort Leavenworth October 5, 1847.

"There was some pretty hard fighting," said Mr. Sparks, "but marching through the snow was much worse, about the hardest fighting was at the Battle of Touse mountain, where we fought the Mexicans and Indians from sunrise until dark."

Few among the Mexican veterans have carried their years as well as Thomas Sparks, who spent his sturdy as a young man lives alone with no one to keep him company, but he is growing tired of this lonely life and has entered an application for admittance to the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg where he will once again be among his old comrades.

While he is of course anxious to go to Roseburg, Mr. Sparks says he is coming to Portland and marching with the boys in parade during the Rose Carnival if possible.

Although for the greater part of the week this old veteran works at home in his little shoe shop, seldom does a Sunday pass that he is not seen trudging to church. He is a member of the Christian church and attended much pleased upon learning there was a fine Christian church in Roseburg.

In 1859 Mr. Sparks contracted the gold fever and went with the general stampede to Pike Peak, but meeting

The entire office force of 200 men and women was moved from Washington to Portland with but a week's delay in the work. Joyce has a bad record and was thought so bad there that Lieutenant Robert Seaman of the Chicago police force was sent west to get him. He returned empty handed. According to a dispatch from Chicago Schluess was about to be tried by the police examining board for having once had Joyce in custody, and later ordering his release.

The hearing, it is stated, will probably be postponed owing to Joyce's capture by the Portland detectives.
