

## WILL TALK OVER TEMPLE PLANS

Al-Kader Masons Will Meet Saturday Night to Discuss Building.

A special meeting of Al-Kader Masons is called for Saturday evening at the Masonic temple, corner Park and Yamhill streets, to discuss the plans for building a handsome Al-Kader temple on Twenty-first and Washington streets. The property which is under consideration has a 120 foot front on Twenty-first street and 120 feet on Washington, and the temple if built according to the present intentions will be a handsome and imposing structure, to accommodate fully 4000 people, having a convention hall which will be available for large public gatherings.

It is thought that the need for such an assembly hall is greater than ever and that the location which is suggested for the new Al-Kader temple will be a suitable one for this enterprise.

Membership in this society has now reached the 1200 mark, and those interested in this matter feel that a suitable and fitting temple should be built, commensurate with the dignity and strength of the order.

If built according to present plans the temple will cost from \$100,000 to \$150,000, and will be a credit not only to the city, but to the entire state.

## POLICE DOUBT DUNN'S STORY

Think Hotelman Did Not Shoot Himself as He Maintains.

Jack Dunn, who is now at the Good Samaritan hospital with a revolver bullet in his left elbow, says the wound was accidentally self-inflicted while he was cleaning his revolver at an early hour this morning, but in this Officers Haney and Pressey, who reported the case, can not concur.

Dunn is the proprietor of the Dewey house, at the corner of Third and Burnside streets, and says that he accidentally shot himself at 2:15 this morning. His wife and the night clerk, H. E. Parmelee, as well as Mrs. Linn Hamilton, the chambermaid, corroborate Dunn's story. All claim that but one shot was fired.

The officers, however, say they have the statement of two passersby who claim that three shots were fired. Dunn refused to show his revolver to the officers, who say further that there were no powder marks visible on Dunn's arm. Both claim it would be practically impossible for a man to shoot himself in the left elbow without leaving burns and powder marks. Dr. J. Britton attended the injured man.

## STATE ENGINEER IS BACK FROM WYOMING

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)  
Salem, Or., April 13.—After a visit to Wyoming and back of a week, to examine the workings of the water laws in those states with F. M. Saxton, water commissioner, State Engineer Linn returned to Salem yesterday. He pronounces the new water code of this state better by far than any law in this country.

Wyoming has a law similar to the Oregon law, except that the water board in Wyoming is the final tribunal in the adjudication of water rights, while in this state the findings of the water board must be affirmed by the courts before they are final. Should the circuit court fail to affirm them they will, of course, in time become operative automatically.

The state water board will convene tomorrow to take up the first batch of petitions for the adjudication of rights that have been presented under the new law.

## \$10,000 FOR 10 ACRES IN HOOD RIVER

Hood River, Or., April 13.—The record price for orchard land in young trees was paid here today when A. L. Paddock of St. Louis, Mo., through the agency of the Briggs-Moent Land company, paid \$10,000 for 10 acres in 2 and 3-year-old Newtown trees, belonging to William Reew. The price purchased has no improvements on it and has strawberries set between the trees. The price was net, the commission being paid in addition. The orchard is situated on the west side of the valley, a few miles out of the city.

## UMATILLA LANDS UNDER NEW BOARD

Interior Department Makes Recognition in Water Users' Dispute.

Washington, April 13.—The controversy between two boards of directors of the Umatilla Water Users' association was settled today, so far as the government is concerned, when Secretary Ballinger instructed the reclamation service land office to recognize the so-called "new board," of which H. T. Irvin is president.

Hereafter the government will recognize only certificates of membership signed by this board, unless the matter is taken into court and decided otherwise.

## MERRILL MAN, ACROSS THE LINE, LAUGHS AT OREGON'S LIQUOR LAW

Merrill, Or., April 13.—This city is following the lead of Klamath Falls and other towns of the county in prosecuting violators of the local option law. Frank Bloomingcamp, who runs a soft drink stand, and his clerk, have been arrested, charged with selling whiskey. He was first arrested under the city ordinance and fined \$29 for conducting a public nuisance.

Sufficient evidence being obtained, the prosecuting attorney had complaints sworn out on three different counts and the two men were again arrested and at the preliminary hearing they were placed under \$3000 bonds. A search warrant was issued and two tons of "booze" were found in the cellar of the building.

Merrill has had a hard time fighting blind pigs. One of the former saloonmen moved his place just across the line in California, about two miles distant. As it was possible to easily procure whiskey, others in the soft drink business have felt that they would not get caught, as it was a difficult matter to prove where the liquor was produced.

## BUILDING INSPECTOR WANTS DEPUTIES

In a communication directed to the city council City Building Inspector Dobson applies for at least two more deputies. He says other cities of Portland's importance have from 12 to 25 men in the building inspection department. Portland has only four and each inspector has to take charge of the construction of 25 to 30 new buildings at a time.

It is impossible for inspectors to visit each one more than once in two or three weeks, says Mr. Dobson, and consequently many defects in construction must be permitted which would be corrected if there were inspectors enough.
