

SIMON FOES SILENCERS MAKES HIS LAST STAND CAN'T FIND MOSES

No New Candidate Appears to Fill Void Left by Dr. A. C. Smith's Refusal to Run—Lane's Friends Are Very Busy.

Anti-Simon forces are still up in the air regarding the majority situation. No new candidate has appeared above the horizon and things are in an unsettled state as before the refusal of Dr. Andrew C. Smith to enter the contest.

The latest phase of the situation seems to be an inclination on the part of the candidates now in the field to come together in some united plan of opposition to Simon. No details of this have been worked out and it does not appear that there is much likelihood of an agreement for the reason that at least one of the candidates has refused definitely to discuss the matter unless he should be selected as the candidate upon which all the opposition forces should be consolidated.

Various names have been mentioned in connection with the majority campaign, but those who have been considered strong men have refused to get into the fight, thus leaving the question open and without any immediate settlement in sight.

In the meantime the Simon forces are making hay and working earnestly to perfect their organization beyond the breaking point. Every precinct is being supplied with Simon workers who are laboring early and late in the work of lining up the voters to the support of Senator Simon.

There is a rumor current that 8000 names have been secured to a petition calling upon Mayor Lane to get into the race for reelection, in opposition to Simon. If this is so, however, the men behind the petition are keeping their work well covered and waiting for the opportune moment in which to spring it.

Tonight the South Portland Republican club will hold a meeting, limited to the membership of the club, at which time it will be decided whether to endorse or oppose the candidacy of Senator Simon and the rest of the convention ticket. It is understood that the membership of the club holds a large majority of men who are opposed to the convention scheme and will vote to repudiate it and to take no part in the support of its nominees.

PROMISE SUPPLY CHEAP COAL

Claims Property Seized by Portland-Seattle Company Is Reorganized to Work Castlerock Mines.

George Sollers, who was ordered to pay A. J. Noyes \$5000 damages for winning the affection of Mrs. Noyes, is making a last stand in an effort to save his property from sale by the sheriff. He is claiming a homestead exemption on his home at Klamath Falls and John C. Shillock, his attorney, has warned the sheriff not to sell his lot because Shillock holds a mortgage for \$1000 on them.

Sheriff Stevens has declined to proceed with the sale until the exemption claim is settled. Therefore Westbrook & Westbrook, representing Noyes, have filed a motion in the circuit court asking that the court declare the homestead claim invalid because Sollers is an unmarried man, and not entitled to claim a homestead. The court is also asked to direct the sheriff to sell Sollers' lot, subject to the mortgage of Shillock.

Sollers has four lots and household furniture, that were levied on by the sheriff on April 9. Apparently nothing escaped the eagle eye of the deputy who inventoried the property for Sollers' claim. Among the things inventoried were water pitchers and a table spread, which are among the things to be sold if the motion made today is granted.

JURY SECURED IN GUN CASE
Eleven jurors for the trial of Yee Gueng for murder had been secured by Judge Brough in the circuit court this morning when adjournment was taken until afternoon. This afternoon the opening statements will be made and the first testimony taken in what promises to be a long drawn case.

Reorganization of the Portland-Seattle Coal company with the infusion of new capital will be accomplished this week. A. B. Dam, promoter of the enterprise whose purpose is to supply the people of Portland with lignite coal from Castlerock, will sail the price now paid, arrived in Portland this morning and is a guest at the Imperial. Steps looking forward to immediate shipment of coal to Portland will be taken as soon as the reorganization is effected, he said.

Two of the original incorporators of the coal company have died since the project was first launched. C. W. Hest died in Portland about two years ago, and William Thompson died in the Philippine islands. The deaths of these men have caused the delay in operation of the Castlerock mines.

Deposits of coal near Castlerock, which is only about 50 miles from Portland, are well sight and inexhaustible. Mr. Dam this morning. The active operation of these mines means that the coal troubles of Portland will be disposed of in some places the coal is so rich in carbon as to be almost anthracite. UNITED TO BE GIVEN PERMIT
If the city attorney can prepare the necessary papers to give the United Railways a temporary permit to operate its uncompleted line of road, the council will this afternoon pass an ordinance giving to the company that permission. The city's legal adviser says he can arrange matters satisfactorily both to the company and to the city so that 13 miles of track built to Burlington may be used to convey passengers to and from the city.

New Railway Company Will Be Allowed to Operate Line.
Herbert Wittenberg, backed by a strong delegation of business men, appeared before the council this morning and promised to carry out the provisions of the franchise granted to his company as faithfully as he would if obliged to wait until the line is completed to Hillsboro. If the council would allow him to begin operations now.

Wittenberg objected to the matter being referred to the street committee, as was suggested by Councilman Rushlight, as he said he was going to leave for New York city tonight to enlist capital for the enterprise and he wants to be able to say that the company has 15 miles of road in operation.

Wittenberg's views were supported by Hugh McGuire, and a number of other influential Portland citizens who are interested in securing all the transportation facilities possible for the city and surrounding country.

The chief objections to the granting of the temporary permit were made by property owners who want to see the streetcar line built to Mount Calvary. The United Railways agrees to construct a line to the cemetery by July 1, but not to say that to do so within that time will be a physical impossibility. Wittenberg promised, however, that his company would build this line as soon as possible. He asked only for a temporary permit to operate the line already constructed, so that the company will have a revenue coming in to offset the heavy expenditures, \$750,000, he says, having already been spent.

Attorney Petrain, for the defense, raised the point that according to the city ordinance which were construed to keep women from soliciting on the streets and annoying passersby, this woman's act was not illegal inasmuch as the officer had entered the cigar store for the very purpose of being solicited. Judge Van Zante took the case under advisement yesterday with the result that the case was this morning ordered dismissed.
