Trouble Over Tug Buckle.—Ten years of litigation over a tug buckle have ended in a criminal indictment found by the federal grand jury against Captain A. Patterson. Patterson was brought into federal court this morning and made a temporary plea of not guilty. His attorney, W. H. Fowler, asked until Monday to determine whether it would be desirable to file a demurrer to the indictment. After that, the day will be allowed for a final plea. P. A. Van Emon, of the Pacific Boat Company, is the prosecuting witness. "The whole trouble is the outgrowth of jealousy," declared Mr. Fowler. "Van Emon and Fowler worked side by side. Patterson invented and perfected the improved buckle which is intended to be used on the tugs of a horse's harness. Van Emon produced a buckle of similar nature, but the same. Each claims to be the inventor of the idea. I feel sure that Patterson will be acquitted when the case is given a hearing."
