Keep Feet Off Seats—At various points along the interurban lines controlled by the O. W. P. company, a considerable quantity of grease has been distributed. It has been the convenient custom of men who walked along the tracks and got their grease on their boots to board the cars, put their feet on the seats in front and so peacefully sleep. The grease would always be left on the seats to stain the dresses of the women who boarded the cars. The company has paid for the dresses. Recently P. D. Hunt, traffic manager of the street car company, resuscitated the rule compelling conductors to keep passengers from occupying the seats in front of them with their feet. Notices have been posted, therefore, that this old rule must be enforced, particularly on the interurban, Mt. Scott and Seaside lines.

Bus Saw to Hit Faculty—Faculty trustees, inadvertently and with malice aforethought, will be the principal subject for discussion in the next number of the Interurban High School Bus. Saw, it is understood on good authority. In this number the anonymous editors propose to charge the members of the faculty with undue leniency toward the fraternities and will even go so far as to declare that members of the faculty show this favoritism for the purpose of gaining favor from the "rich papers" of the fraternity members. Emboldened by their success to keep the authorship of the interurban sheet a secret, it is said the indictments to be made this week will be more fiery than ever.

Marionette Opera Church—The new church of the Marionettes will be at East Seventh and East Couch streets, and will be opened Friday night with the first of a series of revival services, which will extend to and including May 2, with services each afternoon at 2:30 and each evening at 7:30. The speaker will be Will Hitt, who has been associated with Bud Robinson, the cowboy preacher. The members of the church of the Marionettes will gather for an evening at 7 o'clock at the old church, 438 Burnside street, where a short farewell service will be held. The members will then march to the new church, accompanied by a band.

Court Expenses Heavy—Expenses for the quarter just closed were the largest ever recorded in the office of United States Marshal Redwood. Accounts were approved in federal court this morning totaling \$25,000, and an order for their payment authorized by Judge McCallum. The expense of running the marshal's office for three months has been greatly increased by the service of two federal grand juries and the large expense occasioned by witness fees and subpoenas. In some instances witnesses have been sent half across the continent. One woman came from Missouri, another from Kansas, to testify before the grand jury.

Plan Another Booklet—District Freight Agent Charles A. Aldrich of the Southern Pacific has had the various photographs of the Southern Oregon farming community taken during the trip bound in book form and arranged that a complete history of the trip in picture form is shown. The photographs show the trip from its start at Ashland to its completion at Drain. The book will be used to illustrate the industrial work being done by the freight department of the Southern Pacific.

Resigns as Receiver—W. C. Benbow this morning resigned as receiver of the Novelty Manufacturing company, an old proceeding brought by James T. Alton, and Mr. Alton was substituted as receiver by appointment of Presiding Judge Gutenberg in the circuit court. Mr. Benbow resigned because of pressure of other business, he stated. He submitted a report showing assets of \$3414 and claims pending amounting to \$617, not including other claims from eastern firms yet filed.

Charged With Bad Language—Edward Bailey was arrested on a warrant by Frank Patten yesterday afternoon, charging him with using abusive language. Bailey was taken to the police station and Alameda street and is said to have been having trouble with Patten for some time. Patten claims that Bailey endeavored to prove a quarrel by calling him vile names and had him arrested forthwith. The case was set for hearing for next Tuesday.
