

OREGON CITY FISH WAR ENDED

Union Wins Victory and Fishing Season Is Opened by Order of Clackamas Circuit Court—Wardens Decline to Make Arrests.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Oregon City, April 16.—The salmon war in Oregon City is ended. There appears to have been an unwritten understanding between the factions that the ruling of the court last night would stand. The union has won a victory. The fishermen fished all night and the king of fish was netted without disturbance of any sort over his capture.

The deputy fish wardens made no arrests but Secretary Aune of the Fishermen's union said that the matter must be settled at once and he instructed Ed Maroon, a union man, to obtain a warrant for the arrest of Baxter and Richardson, two union men who had been told by their officers to go ahead and fish in expectation of arrest by the wardens and a subsequent test case.

The cases of the two men were immediately brought before Circuit Judge Samson. The trial was held at 7 o'clock in the evening. George C. Brown, appearing for the fishermen, Assistant District Attorney Stipp moved that the case be dismissed and Judge Samson made an order to that effect. There was a big rush for the river and it was crowded with fish boats all night.

Planned Campaign.
The union carried out its campaign as planned yesterday but the state, represented by Water Bailiffs Lewis Ball, Bert Jewell and William Mack, made no move upon the enemy's works. The air had been thick with rumors that State Fish Warden McAllister would enforce the order of the fish commission, closing the Willamette river until May 1. Warden McAllister said that the state law opened the river on the 15th of April and they intended to fish.

Jim Baxter and Al Richardson, the two fishermen selected to act for the union, late in the day loaded their boats with fish net, and sailing down the stream, anchored opposite the foot of Eighteenth street, at Greenpoint. Here they set their net in the river. At the time the fisheries patrol launch was at Graham's dock, foot of Eighth street.

Many spectators gathered on the river bank at Greenpoint, to witness what they thought would be a fight.
Patrol Anchored.
The patrol boat swung out of the dock and bore down stream toward Greenpoint and the spectators, with bated breath, awaited the result. But instead of overhauling Captain Baxter and his crew, she anchored near the river bank in front of the sawmill, and her crew went ashore.

In the meantime Baxter and Richardson, hauled in their net and landed four fine specimens of the salmon family.
Crowd Meets Bailiffs.

A crowd had in the meantime gathered on the bank where the wardens had disembarked, mostly fishermen, but good order prevailed. Baxter and Richardson, having set their net again, now pulled over to where the bailiffs stood, threw the four fish out of the boat, saying, "More fries for McAllister," and pulled back to their nets, the wardens making no arrests.

TACOMA HAS COAST ARTILLERY COMPANY

Tacoma, April 16.—A full company of the coast artillery reserve has been mustered in at the armory here, with Lieutenant S. W. Ellison in command. The company is the first to be organized on the Pacific coast and has been recruited pursuant to the recent determination of the war department to place the coast states on a better war footing. All the members of the new organization are young men of excellent physique. Most of them are professional

men. The remainder are clerks and artists. Every summer the company will spend from 10 days to two weeks at one of the Puget sound forts, where actual war practice will be had. They will be assigned to one battery and will return to this battery year after year. Then in the event of war they would go to that particular battery, with the equipment of which they would have become perfectly familiar through long practice.

TRAIN DE LUXE OVER CANADIAN PACIFIC

The new Canadian Pacific-Soo train between Portland and St. Paul and Minneapolis will be known as the Spokane-Portland train de luxe, according to information received by F. R. Johnson, general agent for the C. P. R. and the Soo in Portland. The train will leave Portland at 7 p. m., allow an hour's stopover in Spokane and reach St. Paul at 1:30 p. m. on the third day. The running time will be 64 hours, which is considerably faster than any schedule now in effect. The west-bound train will reach Portland at 7 a. m. The new service will go in effect May 2.

The mountain hotel system of the Canadian Pacific is preparing to open its houses earlier than usual this season and they will probably be running by May 15. This is being planned because of the early spring being experienced in the Canadian Rockies.

WHIPPED HER BABY IS WIFE'S CHARGE

Wilbur Wright's Birthday.
Wilbur Wright, the elder of the two brothers who have achieved world wide fame as a result of their successful inventions and experiments with the aeroplane, was born near Millville, Ind., April 16, 1867. Both of the brothers received their education in the public schools of Dayton, Ohio, where their father was located as a bishop of the United Brethren in Christ. In early childhood the brothers are said to have been keenly interested in kite flying, but not until 1896 did they begin serious study of the subject of aviation. In 1900 they had perfected their plans for an aeroplane and soon after they settled down to real tests on the sand hills of eastern North Carolina. Their first machine was not up to expectation. By 1902 they had improved their machine so that they could remain up in the air a minute at a time. In 1903 they built the first heavier than air machine that had ever raised itself by its own power with a man in it. In 1906 they gave their first public exhibition. Last year Wilbur Wright went to France and at Le Mans he made a series of flights that easily beat all records in aviation.

Firemen Rescue Sewer Workers.

FIRST SURVEY FOR NEW ROAD

Fairview - Columbia Highway Awaits Decision of the County Court.

Cleone, Or., April 16.—The preliminary survey for the county road from Fairview to the Columbia river has been completed and the surveyors, together with County Road Viewers D. S. Dunbar and S. Scott, have submitted a report favorable to its construction. The matter now rests with the county court. It is thought that its decision will be in favor of the road.
The proposed route starts from the Sandy road, following the line between the Sun-Dial ranch and that owned by J. Luecher, and is in reality a continuation of the Fairview-Graham road. The viewers and surveyors, after going over the route expressed surprise at the ease with which the road could be put through, and declared that the cost of construction would be much less than was expected. The principal item of expense will be the driving of piling for two or three small and comparatively short distances, which, together with the cost of the survey, will make the total cost of the road above that ordinarily attained by high water.

SQUATTEES SECURE BEST VALLEY LAND

Burns, Or., April 16.—The secretary of the interior having denied the application of the Harney Valley Improvement company for 50,000 acres of land in Harney valley to be reclaimed under the Carey act, the citizens feel that the general public should have an idea of what the refusal means. ROLLERS RANTED AND SHAW DIED

San Jose People Have Had About Enough of These Howling Fanatics.

San Jose, Cal., April 16.—John Shaw, a civil war veteran, is dead at the Holy Rollers' home here, and because of the circumstances an investigation is in progress. Residents in the vicinity of the home are preparing evidence for District Attorney Fess, which will show that Shaw suffered from grip for four days and that the Rollers, with whom he was sleeping, refused to permit him medical aid.

According to the statement of John Buck, a friend of the old man, Shaw had 380, which the Roller elders endeavored to persuade him to give to the sect. He was counseled by Buck to keep his money.

Buck further stated that when Shaw became seriously ill he attempted to secure him medical attendance. This was not permitted by the elders, who gathered around the deathbed and ranted and prayed in their peculiar manner for the purification of the dying man's soul.

BENEFIT PERFORMANCE FOR CLARA MORRIS

New York, April 16.—One of the greatest aggregations of noted players that New York has had an opportunity to see in a long time appeared on the stage of the New York Theatre this afternoon at a big testimonial performance given for the benefit of Miss Clara Morris, whom the older players remember as one of the famous actresses of her day. The "Twelfth Night" club or-

ganized the benefit for Miss Morris, who of late has been ill and pressed with debts.
Among the well known actors and actresses who contributed their services to the performance were E. J. Southern, Wilton Lackaye, Frank Worthing, Edwin Arden, Henry Miller, Chauncey Olcott, Lawrence D'Ossy, Virginia Harney, Grace George, Frances Starr, Elsie Janis, Elmer Fossell and Elita Proctor Otis. Miss Morris herself appeared in a short scene from "Macbeth" and was given an enthusiastic reception.
Clara Morris, who is now in her sixtieth year, retired from the stage about 10 years ago on account of ill health. She is a native of Toronto, but was educated in Cleveland and made her first stage appearance at the Academy of Music in that city in 1861. She advanced rapidly in the profession and in 1869 became leading woman at Wood's theatre in Cincinnati. The following year she joined Augustin Daly's company at the Fifth Avenue theatre and here she became famous in her national roles. Probably her most famous portrayal was that of "Camille," in which she was seen in all of the principal cities of America.

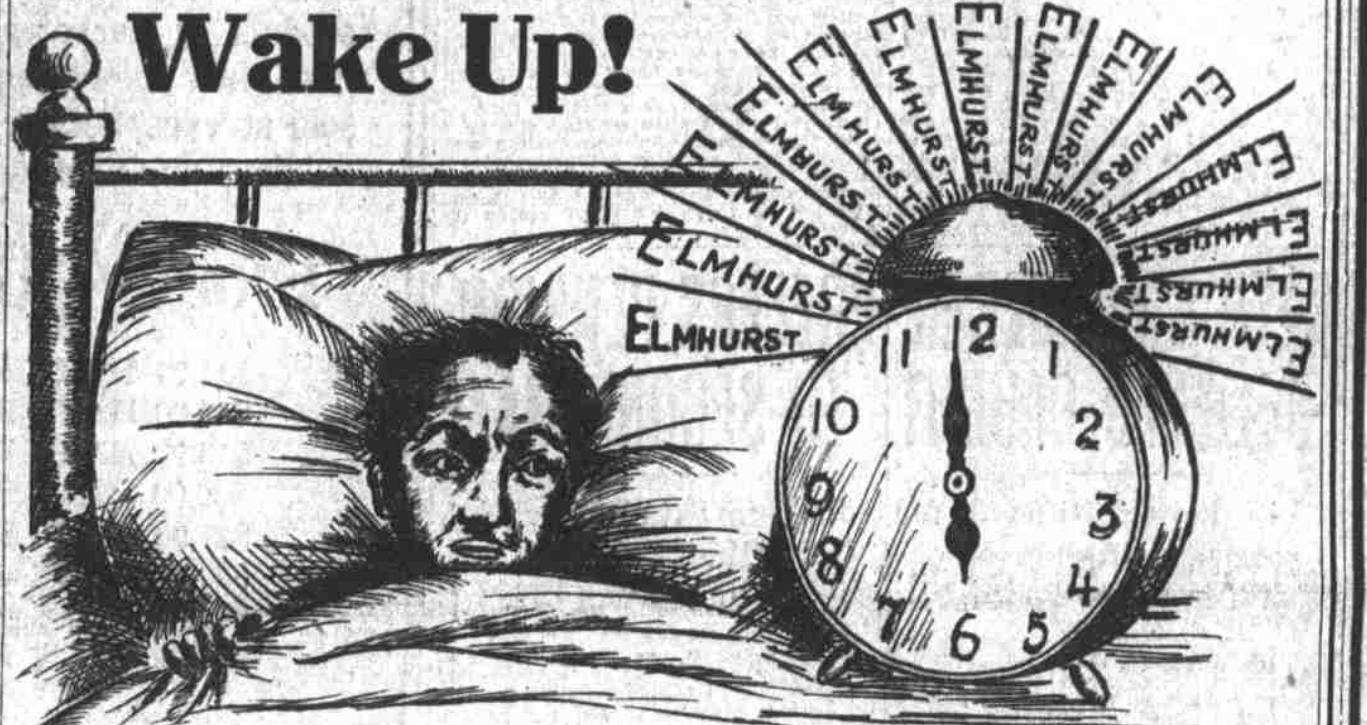
