

JAIL SENTENCE FOR WEMME

Judges Find Real Estate Man Guilty of Contempt on Three Counts.

E. Henry Wemme was declared thrice guilty of contempt of court by Judge Gantenbein yesterday, the question of his conduct in refusing to obey orders of the court having been considered by all five judges of the circuit court in bank. The opinion of the judges was unanimous.

In one case Wemme was sentenced to 30 days in jail and a fine of \$100. In another he was ordered to go to jail and stay until he is ready to deliver certain sales contracts of the Overlook Land company into the custody of the court, and find another in a third case of contempt he was fined \$100 straight. In the aggregate he is fined \$200 and sentenced to 30 days, plus the time he spends in jail before delivering over the contracts, which might be one day or a lifetime.

Wemme will not go to jail at once, however. An appeal was allowed to the supreme court in each case and Wemme is at liberty on \$3,000 bond. Wemme's trouble grew out of a suit begun against the Overlook Land company by A. F. Swenson several months ago, in which the claimant alleges a commission on sales. Wemme asserted that the sums claimed were not due, as he had made large advances to the company from his own purse, and was to be repaid before Swenson received any payments beyond what he had already received.

Judge Gantenbein finally appointed E. Shelley Morgan as receiver for the company, and directed Wemme to turn over certain records to him. Wemme's failure to do this caused him to be cited for contempt. While the hearing on this matter was in progress, Wemme was called to the stand and refused to bring into court certain sales contracts he was ordered to produce.

Repeated orders being these papers into court were ignored by Wemme, who told Judge Gantenbein that the court might as well tell him to go and jump in the river.

Tuesday afternoon Judge Gantenbein called in all the other judges to sit with him in a final hearing on Wemme's conduct. Argument lasting all the afternoon was made by Dan J. Maloney, acting as the relation of the state, and by Thomas O'Day, representing Wemme. O'Day contended that Judge Gantenbein exceeded his jurisdiction in appointing a receiver and in directing Wemme to produce contracts that were his own personal property.

S. S. CO. BLUNDERS; GERMAN LANDS IN OREGON; HE'S HAPPY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., April 16.—Believing that he had arrived at Baker, Mont., a German boy, fresh from the old country, stepped off of an O. R. & N. train yesterday and handed a slip of paper to Bob Bettner, the cab man. On the paper was a request for information leading to the whereabouts of one Theodore Brown. Bettner asked the boy a few questions but could get no intelligible answer, and then he realized that the lad was a newly arrived foreigner. Bettner has been in Baker for many years and knows every man and every man's dog, but he could not place Theodore Brown.

The German boy was taken to the Baden hotel and was unable to converse with those who spoke his language. It was learned that the steamship company had made a mistake in routing him, and instead of selling him a ticket to Baker, Mont., his destination, he had been ticketed to Baker City, Or. As a result the boy is here stranded, but he seems to like this part of the country, and he knows how to work. He will probably go to work for a rancher as soon as he can speak the English language he will have saved several hundred dollars, and be in possession of a good Powder valley ranch.

Japs in a Knife Duel.

Their faces and bodies covered with scratches and running with blood, the belligerents were taken to the emergency hospital. Nakashima, it is said, signed Sumi to go on a whaling voyage and advanced him \$25. Sumi's refusal to embark is said to have caused the fight. A loaded revolver was found in Nakashima's pocket. He was charged with assault to commit murder. Sumi was charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

BATH'S MURDERER BELIEVED CAUGHT

\$1500 Reward Offered for Summers' Capture May Go to Baker Police.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., April 16.—That the suspect being held by the police of this city is the notorious George Summers, who murdered Sheriff Alfred H. Bath of that county on May 29, 1908, is still the belief of the authorities. Telegraphic communication has been opened with Laramie, county seat of Albany. There is a standing reward of \$1500 for Summers' capture.

Laramie, Wyo., April 16.—George Summers assaulted a hotel man in Colorado last night and fled to the mountains in Wyoming. Sheriff Bath undertook his arrest. On horseback he followed Summers' track in the snow to near Bath's place. There Summers, from behind a telephone post, fired two shots at Bath. Instantly he dragged the body 20 feet from the trail and hid it. He then took Bath's horse and escaped. Summers is 32 years old and weighs about 150 pounds.

COLONEL BABCOCK FACES INVESTIGATION

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, April 16.—Colonel Babcock, quartermaster on the transport Sheridan, faces an official investigation for taking a prisoner from the United States Marshall at Honolulu, when the transport stopped at that port on the way to this city. The prisoner was returned to the island on a trial on a charge of smuggling. The soldier was arrested by Deputy United States Marshal Holt while the Sheridan was at the dock at Honolulu. When Holt attempted to take the soldier from the steamer, Colonel Babcock, backed by his command of 400 soldiers on the ship, said to have refused to allow the deputy to take the prisoner ashore. The deputy was forced to retire without his man and the Sheridan sailed away on her voyage to this city.

When the Sheridan was two days out Babcock sent a wireless to Marshal Hendry saying he would hold the soldier, and asking what disposition he wanted made of him. The marshal was angry at Babcock's alleged overstepping of his authority and said he would report the matter to Washington. The soldier is being held here until he can be sent back to Honolulu.

HUBBY A LONG TIME MAKING UP HIS MIND

(United Press Leased Wire.) Springfield, Ohio, April 15.—The startling allegation that 23 years ago his wife sat on the knee of a visitor at their home is contained in a divorce brought by Paris W. Burnham pending in the superior court. The defendant is Abigail Burnham and the alleged misconduct occurred in 1886. Burnham swears in his complaint that he saw his wife sitting on the knee of a man named Duffy at their home in Syracuse, N. Y. He alleges that he ordered Duffy from his home but his wife refused to let the intruder depart. Thereupon, Burnham avers, he himself left the house and never returned. After a separation which has lasted since that time, Burnham now wants a legal separation.

BRINGS SUIT OVER APPLE LAND DEAL

Suit for \$1000 damages for alleged failure to carry out a contract for planting a tract of apple land in Waco county has been begun in the circuit court by John B. Kelly against E. T. Phillips. He says he was to invest \$1000 on condition that a certain amount of work was done by the defendant and that Phillips planted only 200 trees. He wants back \$1100 that he paid.

Prominent Chinese on Visit. Charles Yip Yen, Chinese agent for the Canadian Pacific railway at Vancouver, B. C., and three prominent Chinese have been seen in the city today, the guests of Mayor Backus. The Chinese consul here, The Hongkong Chinese have been visiting the United States and Canada, and will sail for Canton the Empress of India April 21.
