VAILLE'S MERIT IS RECOGNIZED
Portland Man Made Superintendent of New Railway Mail Division.

Confirmation of the news of Frank W. Vaillie's appointment as superintendent of the new thirteenth division of the railway mail service reached Portland today. It occasioned no particular surprise to Mr. Vaillie's friends here. It was expected that he would receive the appointment, not only because he is the oldest in point of service among the Pacific coast railway mail officers, but because of a fine record that he has made for himself.
Mr. Vaillie has been occupying the position of assistant superintendent of the eighth railway mail service district. His promotion gives him charge of the railway mail service in Alaska, and in

the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. The position carries with it a salary of \$3000 a year.
Thirty-five years ago Mr. Vaillie secured a position as railway postal clerk on a run out of Cincinnati. His first promotion made him chief clerk of the railway mail service in Indianapolis. Later he was promoted to the position of assistant superintendent of the railway mail service in Oregon and Washington. When the Philippine islands were taken in charge by the United States, Mr. Vaillie was made director general of the mail service. He has the honor of organizing the mail service as it stands today in every island of the Philippine group.
Although mistakes and inaccuracies were made in other of the new island possessions, no such shortcomings were ever recorded against Mr. Vaillie. After he had completed the organization of the mail service in the Philippines, he resumed his old position in Portland.
It is not known yet who will be Mr. Vaillie's successor.

FRIGHTFULLY INJURED WHEN CHAIN BREAKS
F. L. Emerson, an employee of the Willamette Pulp & Paper company, who was injured at St. Johns Thursday, was probably recovered. Emerson was working on a raft hoisting logs when a chain broke and the log struck him on the back of the head, inflicting severe scalp wounds and crushing the skull. He was attended by Dr. Tucker and taken to the Good Samaritan hospital.

GREAT SHOW OF ROSES PLANNED
Rosarians Meet Tuesday Night to Arrange for June Exhibit.

Arrangements for the biggest rose show in the history of the city of Portland will be made Tuesday night at the meeting of the Portland Rose society in the Chamber of Commerce hall on the second floor of the Chamber of Commerce building. Mrs. John W. Minto, president of the society, has called the meeting and asks that every member of the society be present. Among other things that will come up will be the selection of the judges for the contests and the appointment of the various committees to have charge of the work. It is practically decided that Rev. Spencer S. Sullivan, D. D., who was selected as one of the judges last year, but who was forced

to decline, will be one of the judges, but as to the others no definite plans have been made. Dr. Sullivan is at present at Vancouver, Wash., and has promised to assist.
The society plans offering a prize for the best exhibit made by any one district or suburb and expects to have a large number of entrants. North Albina and Sunnyside are already planning entering, while a number of other suburbs and Multnomah county towns are possibilities. Only Multnomah county cities are allowed to enter.
The Union Republican club has decided to give a dinner in honor of Senator Fulton, Saturday, April 24, at the Commercial club. A committee of arrangements will be appointed by President Plar.
HYDE DENIES USING TSCHABOLD ROUGHLY
In an answer filed in the circuit court to the \$5000 damage suit brought by Edward Tschabold against him, William H. Hyde denies that he used any force or that he was necessary to exert as an officer of the law when he com-

ducted Tschabold to the city prison on the night of April 8. He says that the plaintiff was disorderly and intoxicated in talk calculated to incite a riot. Tschabold is a farmhand and was one of a crowd of spectators which was watching the arrest of a drunken man who was resisting. Hyde denies that he kicked Tschabold or assaulted him in any way.
HARRIMAN AGENT GOES EAST AGAIN
General Freight Agent R. B. Miller of the Harriman lines in this territory, has gone to Chicago, where he will again go into details of the Spokane rate case matter with traffic officials of the Union Pacific. Mr. Miller recently spent five weeks in Chicago on business connected with the freight department of the lines here.
Charged With Embezzlement
W. L. Van Alstyne was arrested on a warrant by A. E. Mortrud this afternoon, charging him with larceny by embezzlement. Van Alstyne has been conducting a butcher shop at 122 1/2nd person street and is charged with the embezzlement of \$125 for old bills payable to Mortrud who had sold the shop to parties who in turn sold it to Van Alstyne. A civil action is now

pending in which Mortrud is seeking to recover the \$125. Seneca Fouts, Mr. Van Alstyne's attorney, states that his client, rather than embezzling, has himself been defrauded in the transactions.
