

22 MURDERED; TRIAL MAY CLEAR UP

Peter Bradovich Is Charged With Having Killed Angelo Stennich, Twenty-Second Man to Die in the Taft Tunnel.

Twenty-two murders occurred during the construction of the Taft tunnel, on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, in Idaho. It was not until about four months ago, when an investigation resulted in the finding of 17 corpses, in various stages of decomposition, that evidence of an apparently well organized murder gang was brought to light. Despite the efforts of railroad detectives and county authorities, no direct clues were secured. Peter Bradovich's trial is expected to result in sensational revelations.

Wallace, Idaho, April 17.—Peter Bradovich was placed on trial in the district court of Shoshone county today, charged with the murder of Angelo Stennich, at the Taft tunnel in February. Stennich was last seen with Bradovich, the latter being a boss of the construction work. He ordered the other men to the surface and told Stennich to remain, claiming witnesses who testified at the preliminary hearing.

Bradovich had been drinking with Stennich several times during the afternoon. Early the next morning Stennich's body was found in the tunnel partially concealed, having been dragged several hundred feet. The head had been crushed with a piece of railroad iron about 30 inches in length. The iron was found where it is thought the crime was committed.

The next morning Bradovich appeared in Taft and had several checks cashed, which had been made out to Stennich. When the body was found and Bradovich arrested he stated that Stennich being unable to read, had given him the checks to get them cashed. He had cashed several and was preparing to leave when he was arrested.

Twenty-second Victim of Murders. Stennich was the twenty-second victim of murders in the construction work on the Taft tunnel and the near vicinity. Of this number not one of the murderers ever paid the death penalty, and but two ever paid any penalty.

At the October term of court two foreigners with several aliases, whose real names were never discovered, pleaded guilty to murder in the district court, and were sentenced to 40 to 50 years respectively in the penitentiary.

Friends of Bradovich have raised funds for his defense, and he will make a hard fight. Prosecuting Attorney James Wayne outlined his case and showed what the state would try to prove. John Wourms has been retained to defend Bradovich. At 2 o'clock the jury had not been completed.

LAW AND ORDER LEAGUE POSSIBLE

Councilman Wills Says Citizens Are Behind Move to Close Gambling.

Following upon the successful gambling raids made Friday night, when 21 accused gamblers were taken into the city, Councilman A. N. Wills and his faithful band of adherents will attempt the organization of what will be known as the Law and Order League. Prosecution of gamblers and eradication of games of chance will be its principal objects.

With the utmost candor, Councilman Wills admitted last night that it was not from his pockets came the money which he is planning to form a strong organization which will be known as the Law and Order League, with branches all over the city. We will have the dues paid perhaps only about \$2 a year, just enough to keep the organization together.

"We are going to see that the law is enforced and that gambling games, now running wide open, are put out of business. Mr. Wills declared that he had been informed by Friday night's raiders that several policemen had been found watching gambling games and drinking at the bar.

"One of the men heard a stranger ask a certain policeman to have a drink," asserted he, "telling of one instance. The policeman replied: 'I believe I'll take a smoke on you, and by way of much lately.'"

"We have reports on all these policemen," said Mr. Wills, "and we are not going to let the matter drop. It looks to me as if either the police are standing in with the gamblers, or that they are inefficient."

Only two of the 21 arrested Friday night on a felony charge of gambling remain in the county jail tonight. They are C. J. Stevens and John Anderson, both young men who apparently have no means of raising the \$100 bail required.

Ten of the men arrested furnished bail Friday night and the remainder gave bond in the justice court. Before Judge Olson 12 of the boys caught, two forfeiting their bail by not appearing in person, were arraigned on a charge of felony yesterday. Counsel for the defense, composed of Seneca Follis, Roger Sinnott, Max Cohen and Alex Bernstein, contended that gambling was simply a misdemeanor, but the court decided to allow the felony charges to stand.

Two o'clock Thursday afternoon was set as the time for a hearing.

REHEARSAL FOR TRIAL OF HAINES

State Witnesses Meet and Reproduce a Gory Scene—Trial Monday.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Flushing, L. I., April 17.—The final details of the defense of Captain Peter C. Haines who will be placed on trial here Monday for the killing of William H. Annis at the Bayside Yacht club last summer, will be arranged tomorrow at a conference to be held in the Long Island city jail, where Captain Haines has spent the last seven months. General Peter C. Haines, the captain's father, and Major Haines, his brother, and their lawyers will visit the prison tomorrow afternoon for the last time before he faces Judge Garretson on Monday.

District Attorney Frederick Dewitt, who has charge of the prosecution, has had detectives at work for weeks, both at Fort Hamilton, where Haines was stationed, and at other points where he served, searching every feature of his life. Officers from Fort Hamilton will take the stand, testifying as to the relations between Captain Haines and his wife, Claudia. Before the captain's departure for the Philippines, the defense will contend that the friendship of Claudia and Annis was known before he left. This will be used to controvert the contrary testimony of the defense that Peter C. Haines was driven insane by his wife's alleged confession to him.

On the development of this testimony the attorneys expect sensational revelations.

Murder Scene Reproduced.

Today in the office of District Attorney Dewitt an exact reproduction of the scene on the float at Bayside when Annis was shot was effected by witnesses.

Mrs. Annis, widow of Haines' victim, was one of the actors in the dramatic scene, as she is expected to be one of the most telling witnesses for the prosecution.

District Attorney Dewitt announced today that he had retained former District Attorney George A. Greene to assist in the prosecution. It is expected that Greene, who is a brilliant lawyer, will conduct the cross-examination of the witnesses for the defense.

McIntyre to Lead Defense.

The defense will be conducted by John McIntyre, who succeeded in freeing J. Jenkins Haines, and Daniel O'Reilly, who was connected with the defense of Harry Thaw. McIntyre has announced that he will not call alienists to prove Haines is insane, but will rely on the testimony of about 50 lay witnesses, who will tell of alleged abnormal actions on the part of Captain Haines, some of them dating back to the Spanish-American war.

District Attorney Dewitt will call among his alienists Dr. Austin Flint and Dr. George Foster.

Alienists on the Job.

It has been declared that Captain Haines has been constantly under the supervision of alienists during his confinement in the Queens county jail, when he did not suspect that he was being watched.

Both sides expect considerable difficulty in securing a jury, owing to the great publicity which has been given the case. Both are confident, however, that the trial will not last nearly so long as that of Thornton Haines, which occupied six weeks.

Sheriff Harvey has summoned a special panel of taleymen for service Monday at Judge Garretson, who is noted for speed trials, can be relied on to curtail any unnecessary legal squabbles or other matters that would delay action.

On May 15 the blue pennant of Rear Admiral Swinburne will be hauled down on the West Virginia and he will formally retire from the navy, having reached the age limit. Advices have been received here that following the reception to the Japanese training squadron in this harbor the entire Pacific fleet will proceed to Puget sound to participate in the opening ceremony of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle.

BRUTAL MURDERERS SURE OF SENTENCE

Chicago, April 17.—Oscar Jacobs and Herman Nelson were convicted of manslaughter today and will be sentenced after the argument on a motion for a new trial.

They are charged with having beaten to death William Winters, a member of the Lake Seaman's union. Because he tried to leave his room in the Vestibule lodging house at midnight, Winters was buried as a victim of alcoholism. The union had his body disinterred. It was found his jaw was broken, his skull fractured and he had sustained many blows.

Prosecution of the lodging house watchman followed.
