At yesterday afternoon's session Miss Julia Fraser, Pacific coast field secretary, addressed her audience with an account of the work in Sitka and of the tumble-down condition of the buildings. She said that there is imperative need for new and sanitary buildings in which to house the rapidly growing work of the training school and suggested that if the start is made with subscriptions on this coast it would meet with aid in the east. She asked that \$5000 be raised in Oregon and Washington for this work and promised that the societies in California would do as much. Miss Helen Clark told of the work at Nesh Bay among the Indians. Last evening Mrs. Charles Hays gave an interesting talk on the mission stations supported by the North Pacific board with stereopticon pictures showing the work at Sitka, and among the Indians of the Unalakleet reservation, at Ferron, Utah, among the Mormons, at Frankington, N. C. among the colored people and also in Persia, India, Korea and China.

An interesting feature of yesterday morning's session was the report of Mrs. Campbell, recording secretary, showing that the year just closed has been a prosperous one in all departments and outlining the new work for the coming year, which includes a gift of \$5000 for new buildings for the Presbyterian industrial school at Sitka, Alaska, and \$1000 for the work in Korea. The Woman's society is also undertaking the salary of a new medical missionary, Mrs. Lucy Campbell, who has been commissioned as trained nurse in the Caroline Ladd hospital at Pyeong Yang, Korea. WILL ESTABLISH
MARBLE PLANTSan Francisco Man Plans to
Invest \$100,000 in Port-
land Factory.

R. F. Eastman, formerly of San Francisco, has come to Portland with the intention of investing \$100,000 in a marble plant here. He is now engaged in looking for a suitable location and announced this morning that he expected to begin actual construction work in the near future. Mr. Eastman expects to prepare marble decorations for hotels and fine residences. He has been promised a large amount of local work, as well as from other cities on the coast.

Marble, tiling and other articles of like nature have heretofore been manufactured in the east. The freight rates have made their cost excessive to Portland and other Pacific coast dealers, while the danger of breakage has also been very great. Mr. Eastman expects to have the marble in the rough shipped to him in large quantities, from the quarries.

"I am satisfied that there is a large field for the business here," he said this morning, "and my assurance of local support have made me certain that the investment I intend to make will be profitable."

Societies are to be asked to assist in a gift of \$3000 for one of the college buildings at Hangchow, China. The home mission board has been asked to approve a gift of \$100 of the fund for freedmen to furnish a Caroline Strong memorial room in the school at Frankington, N. C.

The treasurer, Mrs. J. W. Goss, reported receipts for the year \$14,477 and disbursements as follows: To home missions, \$5162; to foreign missions, \$7097; freedmen, \$1308; contingent fund, \$530; Chinese home, \$86. Committees were appointed and reports heard from Mrs. M. R. Andrews for the traveling library committee;

magazine secretary, Mrs. C. R. Templeton; secretary for study clubs, Miss Mabel Goss. A reception to delegates was held last night. The convention closes this afternoon.
