The meeting will open at 9 o'clock. This will afford an opportunity for the friends and public to hear the latest figures relative to the results of the army's slum work.

Gas Leak Starts Fire.—An explosion of gas in the residence of E. E. Skinner, 413 Everett street last evening caused a disastrous fire. Mr. Skinner smelled gas in the kitchen and went to investigate. He found that the gas stove had been left open and lighted a match with the result that an explosion followed, setting fire to the kitchen. It was a piece of hurry up work for Mr. Skinner to remove his children from the burning dwelling. The fire broke through the wall and also set fire to the residence of J. H. Campbell, 410 Everett street. The damage to the Skinner home is estimated at \$1000 and to that of Mr. Campbell, \$150.

Charged With Polygamy.—Bertha Atwood was arrested yesterday by Constable Lou Wagner and Deputy Renwick at Merrill's hall and is held under \$1000 bail to answer to a charge of polygamy. The complaint is brought by Garnett Hyde, a young man of good family living on the east side, who married the Atwood woman last month at Vancouver. He claims that she has a husband, Jesse Atwood, living. The constable alleges that a chauffeur, Ray Foote, had been living with the woman at 225 North Fifteenth street, and Foote has been held on a statutory charge. The woman works at the Model theatre, where she is employed as cashier.

Implicated "Spot" Smith.—Detectives Coleman and Price have discovered what appears to be strong evidence in the case against "Spot" Smith, who was held on the charge of having broken into and robbed the Garretts' safe on March 24. Fred Norman was arrested yesterday by Detectives Coleman and Price for having had a watch case and a rifle, which were stolen from the store. Norman states and offers to testify that these articles were secured by him from "Spot" Smith. The watch was found by Coleman yesterday at Oswego.

Irish Case Under Adjudication.—Judge Cleland concluded the taking of testimony in the divorce case of V. F. Irish against Cora Irish yesterday afternoon, but deferred his decision. Much bitterness was displayed between the warring husband and wife. Irish was especially anxious that his mother-in-law should not secure the custody of their baby, as he charged that she fed the baby with a spoon. His complaint was based on statutory grounds while his wife also seeks a divorce on charges of cruel treatment.

Business Men Pleased.—Much to the delight of the East Side Business Men's club work has been started on the remodeling of East Morrison street. Grand avenue with every prospect of the work being completed in time for the Rose Festival parade. At tonight's meeting of the club plans for the coming rose festival will assume recognizable shape. Man Miraculously Escapes.—John Billings, a workman in the employ of the Thompson-Starrett company, fell from the fifth floor of the construction work of the Hotel Oregon annex yesterday and by some miracle escaped with a few bruises and a badly sprained ankle, possibly broken. The Billings slipped and fell from the roof, struck an adjoining building and was but slightly injured. He is at St. Vincent's hospital.

Husband Takes Revenge.—Herman Rasmussen and his wife, who were arrested last night by Officers Lamm on complaint of John Rozenka, the woman's husband. The couple were found in Mrs. Rozenka's room. The husband

had been locked out and said he was afraid to go in, as he would be thrown out if he did. He called the officer, who found him in the room. The woman was held under a city charge of drunkenness and immorality, while the man was held under \$3000 bail to answer a state charge brought by the husband. The case was continued until tomorrow.

Check Forger Bound Over.—Walter Smith, known to the local detectives as "Red" check man, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Officers Coleman and Price on a charge of passing a forged check on Jacob Hahn for \$12, and today a new charge of uttering a forged check on William Silsinger was placed against him. Smith waived examination in police court this morning and was bound over to the grand jury under \$500 bail on each charge.

Takes Employer's Cash.—Tom Parkinson, a young boy barely out of his teens, was arrested this morning on a charge of larceny by receiving. Detectives Coleman and Price, Parkinson worked for the Marquand Hill butcher shop conducted by E. J. Givonnet and had taken all the money, \$50 in all, that he had been sent out to collect and was about to leave for Salem when he was arrested. He admitted the theft of the money.
