

FOOTS DIRECT PRIMARY MAN

Candidate for Municipal
Judge Did Not Indorse
Convention Plan.

Seneca Fouts, candidate for the Republican nomination for municipal judge, has prepared the following statement showing his attitude on the direct primary law:

"From the fact that my name was placed before the convention at the Baker theatre on the seventh day of April, as a candidate for municipal judge, my position in regard to the direct primary law has, perhaps, been misunderstood by a great many of the people.

"The facts of the matter are that about three weeks prior to the meeting of the said convention, I was approached by a prime mover and principal organizer thereof, and requested to lend my aid and support thereto. But, in the presence of a witness, I announced my attitude to him to be emphatically and unqualifiedly opposed to the calling of an assemblage, stating at the time that I believed such a movement was an effort to evade and nullify the provisions of the direct primary law, a law that had been passed by the sovereign people of the state of Oregon; and that a man who was aspiring for a judicial position, although one of a minor capacity, should be the last person in the world to even implicitly acquiesce in anything that savored of an attempt to subvert that law.

"From the time of the securing of the great Magna Charta from King John, every right and privilege secured by the people has been accomplished only after great sacrifice and exertion, and step by step the world has seen the usurped power of the ruling class returned to the people, to whom it rightfully belongs; and every advantage that the people have gained, they have jealously guarded and refused to surrender.

"I believe that the direct primary law, while it has, perhaps, some imperfections—and every law has them—has done more to give us pure and honest public officials, and just, fair, and impartial government, as between the common citizens and those of power, wealth and influence, than any law that has been enacted since the adoption of the Australian ballot system; and I therefore believe that the people should view with jealousy and suspicion a movement such as occurred in the Baker theatre on the seventh day of April, scrutinize the motive that impelled the calling of such an assemblage, and investigate the past record of every candidate indorsed at that time.

"As for myself, in my candidacy for municipal judge, I would rather go down to defeat, with my flag nailed to the mast for the principle which I believe to be of such great benefit to our citizens and our country, than to march to victory under a standard whose motto stands for principles that attempt to usurp the rights and liberties of the people.

RATE INCREASES DECLARED UNFAIR

R. R. Commission Takes
Initial Step in Fight on
Behalf of Shippers.

Salem, Or., April 23.—Formal notice has been given the railroad doing an interstate business out of the state of Oregon, including the Northern Pacific, Astoria & Columbia River railroad, the Spokane, Seattle & Portland railroad, the Oregon Short Line, the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company and the Southern Pacific, that the recent increase in eastbound transcontinental rates is considered unreasonable and without justification.

This action was decided upon by the railroad commission yesterday and marks the first step toward the fight to be taken up on behalf of the shippers against the increase that went into effect January 1. A request is made that the old rate be reinstated. If the railroad does not see fit to meet the requests of the railroad commission formal complaint will be filed with the interstate commerce commission.

The action taken yesterday is in line with the announcement of the day before of the order reducing materially railroad rates on the Northern Pacific between Portland and Goble and reducing slightly rates on less than carload lots.

Wool Rates Must Be Reduced.
Salem, Or., April 23.—The railroad commission yesterday formally notified the officials of the Oregon Short Line that a reduction in wool rates from Huntington, Ontario, Vale and other points on its line in the state of Oregon, to New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, and other eastern points common therewith, must be brought about immediately or a complaint will be made to the interstate commerce commission.

The Oregon railroad commission act provides that a request for the reduction of unreasonable interstate rates cannot be made by the Oregon commission which if not complied with, will give the state commission cause to complain to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute the cause before that body.

SMUDGE POTS IN WASHINGTON ORCHARDS

North Yakima, Wash., April 23.—In order to protect their orchards from frost, the ranchers in the vicinity of Granger have adopted some innovations which have excited much interest throughout the valley.

Electric frost alarm devices have been installed whereby a bell is set to ringing in the rancher's bedroom when the temperature in the orchard thermometer has reached the danger point. When the alarm is sounded, the rancher hurriedly dons his clothing, goes to the orchard and lights numerous firepots filled with petroleum and the atmosphere is thus warmed.

A carload of these firepots has been unloaded at Granger and three carloads of trade petroleum are expected Sunday hundreds of firepots have been kept burning in the orchards every night and the air is heavy with the smoke of the petroleum.

Many orchards have been saved from damage, through the use of the firepots.

SHANGHAIED BY FAKE OFFICERS

This the Theory to Account
for Disappearance of
Martin Oleson.

Seattle, April 23.—Dragged from his bed in a grader's tent near Ballard at midnight by two men representing themselves as officers of the law, handcuffed and led away in the darkness, Martin Oleson, 33 years old, cannot be found in the county jail nor in the jails of any neighboring county. Today Sheriff Hodge detailed deputies to conduct a search for the missing man, as well as for the alleged officers.

Oleson came from Bellingham two weeks ago and secured employment in a grading camp near Ballard. He slept in a tent with several other graders. On the night of April 12 two men entered the tent when all were sleeping, and after reading an alleged warrant to Oleson, handcuffed him and led him away.

The father of the boy is convinced that his son has been shanghaied to recruit the crew of some fishing vessel. He has requested United States Marshal C. E. Hopkins to assist in the search, and asks that one of the revenue cutters be detailed to search fishing craft along the bay. In the belief that the boy may be concealed aboard.

LEGISLATURE'S ERROR COSTS CLERK IN THE AUDITING DEPT. 73c

Salem, Or., April 23.—Through an error, the legislature failed to appropriate enough money by 73 cents, to cover the deficiency of the salaries of the circuit judges and interest thereon. Auditing Clerk Corey has therefore been compelled to make up this additional deficiency out of his own pocket.

On account of the lack of sufficient funds, certificates were issued the circuit judges for their last few months' pay of the biennial period ending just prior to the last session of the legislature. The certificates, similar to city warrants, drew interest.

The interest was computed and added to the salary deficiency which the legislature was asked to make up. In some way the figures were changed or copied wrongly, which caused the discrepancy and which has compelled the auditing clerk to appropriate out of his own private cigar fund.

Statewide Prohibition.

London, April 23.—The three hundred and forty-fifth anniversary of the natal day of Shakespeare was joyously observed at Stratford-on-Avon today, and although the celebration was scarcely on so lavish a scale as in some previous years, it was eminently successful. The old world town was gayly decorated in honor of the occasion. The anniversary also was commemorated with interesting services under the auspices of the Chapter of Southwark cathedral. The poet resided for many years, and wrote some of his finest works, within a few hundred yards of St. Saviour's church, by which name the cathedral was then known. Further, not only was his brother Edmund found buried there, but there is good reason to believe that he himself was a frequent attendant at the services, and acquired there some of that deep knowledge of holy scripture which Bishop Wordsworth proved him to possess.
