

FINE HORSES TO BE EXHIBITED

Thoroughbreds Will Be Put Through Paces Before Auction Sale.

Horses are arriving daily at the track of the Portland Livestock and Fair association, where the annual spring exhibition auction sale of the Portland Horse Sale company is to begin Monday morning. When the hammer falls for the first time, at the instance of Colonel R. L. Harrison almost all the stables in the grounds will be full of choice stock waiting to be sold.

Tomorrow and Sunday, the last two days before the sale, the aristocrats of the equine world will be on exhibition in the stable and many of them will be at work on the track. Visitors are welcome, and, in fact, it is hoped that many people will turn out to welcome dealers and their stock on their first appearances.

Arrivals this morning were the Klamath Falls horses, of which C. T. Oliver is the owner, and the Thompson horses. The Thompson horses are all race and matinee stock and are expected to bring high prices.

Leah Patch, the first of the offspring of the famous Dan Patch to come to Portland, is another horse bound to attract attention. She is a most beautiful animal, having the head of the famous Dan but a body very much like the equally famous Sweet Marie. Unlike her famous father, however, she is a trotter, and yesterday worked a quarter in 35 seconds.

The stock will be auctioned directly in front of the grandstand, so that everybody, whether a purchaser or not, can enjoy watching the horses put through their paces. The sales will commence each day at 10.

BROKEN TROLLEY WIRE DOES QUEER STUNTS

Just at the time this morning when the crowd hurrying to work from the east side was greatest, a broken trolley wire on Morrison street bridge caused complete suspension of traffic for more than an hour. By a remarkable coincidence a broken trolley wire on Burnside bridge stopped the horses put on Morrison street was accompanied by peculiar features.

The trolley wire broke about midway on the bridge, the cause unknown. The current waded the wire to one of the rails. This caused a short circuit which not only burned out the trolley wire used by east bound cars, but also the wire used by west bound cars, at the east end of the bridge. So great was the heat caused by the powerful current that the connections burst into a flame and the wire itself was rendered so soft that after it had cooled it could easily be cut with a penknife.

Repairs were not completed until nearly noon.

KLAMATH COUNCIL NAMES NEW MAYOR

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., April 22.—Councilman F. T. Sanderson has been elected mayor of this city by the council to succeed John E. Stitts, who is absent in the east. Mayor Stitts left last winter for a tour of the south and east, expecting to return within a month. He decided, however, to extend his visit and consequently the office became vacant. Mr. Sanderson, who will fill the office of mayor until after the election in May, will be a candidate. Judge George T. Baldwin has also announced himself a candidate. The position of mayor is an important one this year, as there are extensive improvements to be carried out. Among other innovations the people propose to build a sewer system and pave the business streets.

12-HOUR CUT IN LAKEVIEW TRIP

4 Car-Auto Line From Klamath Will Greatly Reduce Schedule.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., April 22.—Within a month there will be four large touring cars running between Klamath Falls and Bonanza for the accommodation of passengers and to carry the mail. At present stage coaches are used. A. P. Cross of the Western Stage company has left for San Francisco, where he expects to receive the passenger automobiles. They were ordered some time ago.

The distance between this city and Lakeview is 105 miles and the trip consumes a day and a night. As soon as the cars are put in service it is the intention to cover the distance in one day. There is already heavy travel to Lake county via Klamath Falls, and a great increase is expected as soon as the railroad reaches this city.

EXILED CASTRO LANDS IN FRANCE

Apparently a Very Sick Man—"Would Recover Power If Free."

(United Press Leased Wire.) Saint Nazaire, France, April 22.—With former President Castro of Venezuela as one of its passengers, the steamer Versailles arrived here at daybreak today. No attempt was made on the part of the government to prevent his landing. He was treated as an ordinary passenger, no favor being shown him. It was evident that the former dictator is a very sick man, as he could not walk without the assistance of a nurse. He declared his intention of leaving here for Paris, and thence for Spain.

In a statement after landing, Castro said: "The authorities say I am free. This is untrue, inasmuch as I am not permitted to return to Fort De France. If I had been free I would have returned to Venezuela and with my former army would have recovered power."

MUST VOTE A BLANK BALLOT

Democrats Will Have No Regular Ticket for the Primary Election.

Is there a Democratic ticket for the primary election? That is a question which is now agitating the mentalities of the Democratic leaders of the city. It is a fact that there are no Democratic candidates for nomination whose names will be printed on the Democratic ticket to be voted upon by the Democrats of Portland at the primaries.

From mayor to the smallest city hall job, the Democratic ticket is as blank as a slate. The Democratic voters at the primaries of May 3? If there is no Democratic ticket, how are the Democrats going to write any names on the ballot and thus put Democrats in nomination for the various offices? In the opinion of the city attorney, unofficially expressed, should the law be pared down to its last analysis, there would be no ticket, no ballots and consequently no Democratic nominees.

Both the city attorney and the city auditor, however, take the ground that every qualified voter has a right to cast his ballot at every election. If a voter has no candidate for office on the ballot he can write the name of his choice in the proper vacant line and put the paper in the ballot box.

The city auditor, therefore, will order a Democratic ballot printed for the primaries. It will perhaps be the most novel ballot ever printed, in that it will have no names on it from top to bottom. It will say "Candidate for mayor, vote for one," "Candidate for city auditor, vote for one," and so on down the line. The rest of it will be just blank lines.

Every Democratic voter who visits the polls on primary day, when he asks for the Democratic ballot will be handed this practically blank sheet of paper and will be given the task of framing up his ticket to suit his own sweet will.

In that case every Democratic ballot cast will be an individual slate. Every man will be his own convention, will make his own nominations and will be the chairman, secretary and sergeant at arms of the meeting. Out of it is expected to come a multitude of suggestions, which will cause swearing and much work and long hours on the part of the judges and clerks of election. This year they will earn their pay by much burning of midnight oil.

WHITE SLAVER LET OUT OF IDAHO PEN

(United Press Leased Wire.) Boise, Idaho, April 22.—As a result of the recent United States supreme court decision in a white slave case, Judge Dietrich of the United States district court has ordered the release of Louis Maraninchi from the Idaho penitentiary.

Maraninchi was sentenced to two years for harboring alien women.

The court ordered Maraninchi deported to France, his native country.

SITE IS CHOSEN FOR PULP AND PAPER MILL

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lewiston, Idaho, April 22.—From Koonika, on the Clearwater Short line, comes the news that the eastern syndicate, which has been negotiating with the Nez Perce Indians for a site near Koonika for the location of a paper and pulp mill, has wired government officials to have a notary ready to close the deal, as a representative of the syndicate is en route, and the company is anxious to close up all details.

Indian Agent O. H. Lipps, at the Goodfellowship dinner here last night, announced that the department had passed favorably on the matter and had granted the Indians authority to sell. The

land comprises 100 acres and the price offered is \$40 per acre. The site is on the middle fork of the Clearwater river, adjoining the townsite of Koonika. The plans of the company call for the erection of a plant worth \$1,000,000 and for a pulp and paper mill. The timber to be utilized for the purpose of manufacture is white fir, great quantities of which lie in the immediate vicinity of the proposed site, and can be purchased from the government for a nominal cost.

TWO WILLS FILED IN PROBATE COURT

By the will of Olea J. Haynes, filed for probate in the county court, four children will share equally in an estate worth \$5000. The heirs and devisees are Walter Haynes, Homer Haynes, Mrs. Lela Oby and Orley Haynes. The will of P. R. Crosswell, already probated at Tacoma, Wash., has been cast in the county court, there being \$5000 worth of property in Multnomah county. J. D. McCleary has petitioned for letters to settle the estate here.

MODEL VESSELS SAIL IN COURT

Used to Enlighten Federal Judge in Admiralty Damage Case.

Two miniature ships with hulls of conventional red are navigating today an imaginary Willamette on the long table used by lawyers in the federal court room. One is the Cascades, the other the Lurline. The only thing not reproduced in the toy which enveloped both vessels when they collided near Kalama on the night of November 22, 1908.

That the position of the boats at the time of the collision, the vexing point

upon which attorneys and judge are alike uncertain, may be determined the boats are made to approach each other in many ways, keeping as close to a painted channel as possible. The captains who were in the collision are directing the movements of the models.

The Lurline was the one which suffered most, being crushed amidships so that she sank in 18 feet of water, and the subsequent repairs cost \$11,721. While the damage to the bow of the Cascades was only \$469. One or the other of the boats was crosswise on the

channel. Both masters aver that they were headed respectively up and down stream. As the whole case and its results in damages for either of the boats hinges on this point, the attorneys, together with Judge Wolverton, seem likely to become experts in theoretical navigation before the case ends.
