HUMESALMON INDUSTRY IS THREATENED

Squabble Among Heirs May Result in Paralyzation of Curry County's Principal Source of Revenue—Expenses Curtailed.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Gold Beach, Or., April 23.—Thousands of salmon will pass up the Rogue river unmolested this season, as far as the Hume industry is concerned. If the present misunderstanding among the heirs of the deceased southern Oregon salmon king's estate is not adjusted.

Already the death of the man who contributed one sixth of the taxes in Curry county has resulted in the suspension of publication of the Wedderburn Radium, the closing of the doors of the principal hotel—both of which belonged to R. D. Hume—and the reduction of work to a minimum at the store and on the Hume ranch, which comprises hundreds of acres of Curry county's richest land.

continued, many people will be deprived of a means of subsistence. The southern Oregon industry has been robbed of its most lucrative source of income, and the financial condition of the county will be placed in a precarious state.

Unwilling to Share Loss.
Mrs. R. D. Hume was named as sole administratrix. A brother, Mr. Duncan, was acting as her manager. The property was divided according to the terms of the will, among several heirs. The present controversy, which threatens to paralyze the fishing and canning business if the other heirs would consent to share any loss, as they would the profits. They refused to shoulder the "loss" part of the proposition, and thus the matter stands.

At present Mrs. Hume is at San Francisco. She is expected to return to Gold Beach within a few days, when definite action will be taken regarding the salmon industry.

SHIP LINES FREE TO REDUCE RATES

San Francisco, April 22.—Interstate commerce regulations do not apply to ocean carriers operating in foreign countries, according to opinions handed down by United States District Judge De Haven in the Japanese matting cases, involving the Southern Pacific railroad and the Pacific Mail Steamship company. The court yesterday sustained the demurrers to an indictment charging rebating so far as the steamship company was concerned, but held that an infraction of the federal law was clearly stated with reference to the railroad.

The indictments charge that a rebate was paid to the defendant corporations on a shipment of matting from Kobe, Japan, direct to Springfield, Ohio. A joint rate for this was entered into by the companies, which took the business at a rate less than legal quotation. Judge De Haven held that the steamship company was privileged to do as it saw fit in making and remarking its rates, but that the joint rate was a legal rate so far as the railroad was concerned, and the latter placed itself in peril by violations of the laws which are enforced by the indictment, which was declared sufficient.

STATE SCORES IN ROOT-GORDON

Court Refuses to Hold Deputy Prosecutor Ballester for Contempt.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Spokane, April 22.—The prosecution scored its first victory in the Root-Gordon grand jury investigation when the court refused to hold Deputy Prosecutor Ballester for contempt, on the charge of taking stenographic notes of the evidence.
Attorneys for Gordon had been appointed by the court to prosecute the prosecuting attorney for contempt, but Prosecutor Pugh defeated this action by showing the Gordon affidavit insufficient. The affidavit was held insufficient on the ground that it failed to state a motion to quash the indictment returned yesterday.

Politics and Politicians

W. C. Davis of Jasper, Ala., has announced his candidacy to succeed Congressman Richmond P. Hobson of the Sixth Alabama district.
Mrs. Alma V. Lafferty, the only woman member of the Colorado legislature, has introduced 12 bills, all of which have passed the house.
In the recent elections in Connecticut the city of Hartford went Democratic by an overwhelming majority, greeting the surprise and disappointment of the prohibitionists.
Friends of ex-Governor J. Frank Hanly of Indiana say that formal announcement will be made soon of his candidacy for United States senator.

against Albert J. Beveridge. Mr. Hanly, it is asserted, believes his bid for temperance will give him a good lead.

Former Vice President Fairbanks plans to sail from San Francisco on May 16 for a trip of one year's duration, to include in his itinerary Hawaii, Japan, China, the Philippines, Australia, Africa and a large section of Europe. His family will accompany him.

The Republican state convention of Pennsylvania will meet at Harrisburg June 16, but with quite a reduction in its representation. The number of delegates is based upon the vote polled at the last presidential election, when there was apparently much less padding of the ballot boxes than in 1904.

Thomas Rudolph is still a practicing lawyer and local judge at the age of 98, in Shippenburg, Pa. He was recently nominated for his judicial position by the Democrats and so popular was he that no candidate was put up against him by the Republicans. If he finishes his term he will be 99 years old.

James R. Mann, who prevented the introduction in the house of representatives of the petition of Chicago women for a reduction of the duties on leather gloves and cotton hosiery, has represented the Second Illinois district in congress since 1897, and for several years has been conspicuous in Illinois politics. He has served as chairman of the Illinois state Republican convention, and for four years he was a member of the Chicago city council.

There seems to be a very general impression in the inner circles of Tammany hall that the organization should nominate next fall William T. Jerome for district attorney. Four years ago Jerome, single handed and alone, won a reelection to the district attorney's office by over 18,000 plurality, defeating the Tammany, Independence League, Republican and Socialist candidates. It has been frequently said that had Jerome been renominated in 1905 at Tammany's hands there would have been no Democratic state convention nominating Hearst in 1906.
