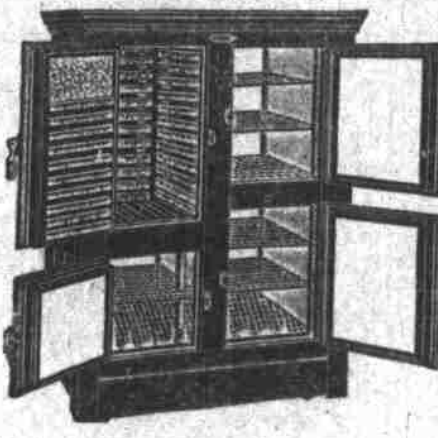

DRUG ADVOCATE OF BOSS RULE

C. W. Nottingham and Other Speakers Best T. C. Devlin in Debate.

State Senator C. W. Nottingham and two other speakers but T. C. Devlin, convention candidate for congressman at large, so far in the hole before the People's Forum yesterday that the members of that body now say no man who has yet spoken at one of their meetings ever before received a verbal drubbing so complete.

that because of this the late Baker theatre convention at which he was nominated, was within the letter and the spirit of the primary law. Senator Nottingham took issue with Devlin. He admitted that gatherings of voters for the purpose of suggesting candidates for office were within the law but he contended that such meetings should be in the nature of mass meetings, called by universal demand, spontaneous, not bound to any state or designated and controlled by any one interest or set of men.

intent of the primary law, the speaker contended, was a mass meeting of voters, similar to the old town meeting, at which members of a party should gather irrespective of faction and untrammelled by slates and machine dictation, and there pick out the man best fitted to stand for public office. The Baker theatre convention, Senator Nottingham argued, was directly opposed to this idea, both in theory and in practice. It had been packed in the interests of one set of candidates, slated for nomination, and no one had been allowed a seat in it who would not be sure to stand for the whole slate as mapped out by five machineists.

man for mayor, what would the people of San Francisco expect after his election, the speaker wanted to know. That condition was confronting Portland at the present time to the nomination of Simon for mayor, together with his benchman for other city offices, the speaker argued—and Devlin could not answer or refute the argument. J. B. Zigler called Devlin's attention to the fact that the administration of the city under former regimes had been in the interest of the corporations for the most part, and cited a continual nonobservance of the charter provisions by Devlin during his service as city auditor. Zigler said that the charter required the auditor to keep a separate account with each public service corporation in the city, showing its business as transacted between it and the city. Devlin denied that there was such a charter provision and Zigler read it to him from the charter. Altogether Devlin had a very bad session with the opposing speakers at the meeting. He read his entire speech from the proof sheets of the Oregonian, showing that he had prepared it for publication in support of the anti-direct primary campaign now being waged by the backers of the Simon campaign.

CHURCH MEN FORM BASEBALL LEAGUE

Congregational young men of Portland have been organized into a club which makes a specialty of religious, athletic and social features. The program for the summer includes the organization of a Congregational baseball league. Six teams from various Portland churches of that denomination will compose the league. They will play a series of games for the championship. The organization of the Congregational Young Men's club was made permanent at a banquet held last Friday night at Hasseulo street church. The charter membership is 60. During the winter members of the club expect to play basketball. The meeting Friday night was enlivened by an interesting basketball game by teams from Pilgrim and Hasseulo churches. The victory was for Hasseulo, the score being 19-22. A constitution was adopted Friday night and by-laws framed. Officers will be elected at the next meeting to be held on the night of May 24. The excellent gymnasium maintained in connection with Hasseulo church is a great aid to the work of the club. It is the purpose of the club organizers to induce young men to become members of the Barona Bible school classes which have been organized in connection with the Sunday school work of the various churches.
