WILSON COLLAPSES
UNDER LIFE SENTENCE

San Francisco, April 27.—John Walter Wilson, under life sentence for the murder of Harry Boas, has suffered a nervous collapse at the county jail. Throughout the trial, in which Wilson was convicted upon circumstantial evidence, he faced the issue bravely, but when confronted with the prospect of spending the remainder of his days in the state penitentiary he broke down. He was taken to the county hospital in a pitiable condition. Wilson has no alternative but to accept the verdict of the jury. He is penniless and cannot appeal his case. His aged mother in Philadelphia, who is said to be almost blind, raised \$50 for him by paying her personal effects. A brother, his only other relative, is an invalid. At the hospital he cried again and again, "God knows I am not guilty of that awful crime."

TWO OPINIONS ON
GIRL DETECTIVEMrs. Muir Says Fay Ruined
Muir—Fay Says She
Only Caught Him.

San Francisco, April 27.—Fay Wilson, a girl detective who formerly lived at Denver, is the center of interest in the case of Broker W. A. Muir, accused of embezzling \$20,000. Mrs. Muir, the broker's wife, has asked the police to investigate the relations of her husband with Miss Wilson, and has intimated that she believes there was blackmail connected with the case.

After having been constantly in the company of Muir, going to dinner with him and being seen in public with him many times, Miss Wilson admits having betrayed him to the police when he was a fugitive at Los Angeles. She asserts that her relations with the broker were of a "purely business" nature and intimates that she may have suspected him of the crimes of which he is now accused.

Mrs. Muir evidently did not believe the "purely business" explanation, as she stated to the police last night that her husband's ruin was brought about by the money he lavished upon the woman detective. In support of her statement that she had no personal regard for Muir, Miss Wilson produced a letter which was signed with the broker's initials. The letter reads:

"Dear Fay—I am in Los Angeles and leave for El Paso tomorrow. Send me all the money you can in care of general delivery at El Paso. W. A. Muir."

The girl calmly stated that she had turned the letter over to the police, who followed Muir through the south and later caught him at Denver.

Mystery surrounds Miss Wilson's connection with the local police, but it is rumored that under Chief Biggs she was employed as one of the "liver circle" detectives, handling cases of which nothing was known in police circles generally.

BULLET AND BONE
DUG FROM BRAINOperation Without Prece-
dent Performed on a
Would-Be Suicide.

San Francisco, April 27.—Eugene Moore, son of a capitalist of Plainfield, N. J., who shot himself through the eye in Golden Gate park Wednesday, is alive at the University of California hospital, after one of the most remarkable surgical operations in history. According to Dr. Harold Bruhn, who performed the operation, Moore will live, but will never again regain his sight.

The bullet entered the right temple and crashed through the eyeball, lodging in the brain behind the nose. To perform the operation it was necessary to remove the right eyeball, and to split the bone that had been forced into the brain. A silver plate was inserted to replace the shattered bone, and by wearing a glass eye Moore can hide all traces of the wound.

Dr. Bruhn and his assistants state that the operation is unique in surgical history.

COLONEL IRISH WILL
RETIRE NEXT YEAR

Washington, April 27.—That Colonel Irish will remain naval officer of the port of San Francisco for another year is the current belief here. Despite the recommendation in favor of General George Stone for the post, by Senators Flint and Perkins, President Taft is said to have stated that Irish will not be removed until January. Irish was appointed naval officer of the port of San Francisco during Cleveland's second administration and has held the post for 16 years. During subsequent Republican administrations efforts have been made to oust him, but with no success. Irish is a Democrat and great pressure has been brought to bear to secure the appointment of a Republican officer. Stone has been named generally for the post. It was rumored here today that Irish had consented to resign in December and it is generally thought a compromise may be effected providing that the change be made in the summer of 1939.

ON BEING MA-IN-LAW

Tette is said to have covered Mrs. Corning's mouth with his hand, and upon this act the charges of assault may be based. Mrs. Tette, according to her parents, is but 17. She insists that she has passed her twentieth birthday. A lawyer said to be coming to her is believed to be largely the cause of her troubles.
