

RAILROADS GIVE
EIGHT-NATIONCommission Receives Reply
to Excessive Freight
Rate Notice.

(By Journal Leased Wire.)
Salem, Or., April 27.—In reply to the notice sent out by the Oregon Railroad commission, to the effect that the increase in the transcontinental freight rates is considered excessive, unjust and unreasonable and that complaint would be made to the Interstate Commerce commission unless the rates in force prior to January 1, 1909, were reestablished, the attorneys for the Hill and Harriman lines intimate that the rates are not to be reduced without resistance.

In a letter from Mr. Cotton, legal counsel for Mr. Harriman in Oregon, it is stated that the members of the railroad commission "can assume that no action will be taken by the company in substituting for the present rates the rates which went into effect prior to January 1, 1909."

The attorneys for the Northern Pacific, the Spokane, Seattle and Portland and the Astoria and Columbia river railroads ask for a further statement of facts in connection with the notice and more specific advice as to which rates are regarded excessive as the Oregon commerce act provides:

In the franchise which gives the company the power to make repairs to bridges, streets or other public highways on which it may have a right of way, without consulting the city, and yet the people must pay three-fourths of the cost.

Following is the veto statement in full:

The Veto Message.

"To the Honorable City Council—Gentlemen—I return herewith ordinance No. 19176 not approved.

This is an ordinance which grants to the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, its successors and assigns, the right to construct, acquire and own and to maintain and use railways and street railways and poles and wires and underground conduits, cables and conductors in the city of Portland, Or., for a period of 25 years.

In respect to which I have to say, that it is seemingly not a simple grant to this company to operate a street railway but a grant which carries with it along through it reiterates the additional right to operate railways so long as steam is used in the operation of the same.

"What the object may have been in granting this additional right I do not know—at any rate, whether for the city or for the company, it is included in this grant.

"The grant covers portions of 40 streets in all. Thirty-nine of these are short streets scattered about the city and one is for a main trunk line, which connects and establishes communication between the central portion of the city and its northernmost limit.

"Under the terms prescribed the railway company is allowed three years to complete and install a street railway upon these 40 streets and is not required to give any bond that it will do so.

Option for Three Years.

"In this respect the grant to these streets is in the nature of an option upon them for three years, given by the city to the railway company, free of cost to it during which time no one else can be allowed to use any one of them for such purpose.

"The railway company is allowed five years in which to complete its connections with any depots which it now has and it may extend the same, if it so will, it can continue to use the public streets for such purposes.

"The grants for the shorter stretches of streets should have been considered and treated separately and each one upon its own merits.

"Many of them are much needed and the districts in which they are located are suffering for want of streetcar service and it would seem to be a wise and prudent thing to grant them for a period of three years, with which to lift the larger and more important grants which are contained in the franchise.

"It may be that there was need of haste in securing the grant at this time in order to forestall the danger which might arise in the event that the commission plan of a charter should be passed by the people at the next election, inasmuch as it contains provisions which would not allow grant of a franchise with such ill guarded provisions to become a law.

MISSIONARY AT
ADANA DESCRIBES
MASSACRE SCENES

(United Press Leased Wire.)

London, April 27.—Corpses are scattered throughout the city of Adana, capital of the province of Adana, in Asiatic Turkey, and it is impossible to estimate the number of dead as the result of the massacre of Christians here, according to a dispatch received here today from Rev. Herbert Adams Gibbons, a missionary.

Mr. Gibbons graphically describes the first five days of rioting and charges the authorities at Adana with giving arms to the rioters under the pretense that they were to be used in suppressing the massacre.

"An Armenian and a Turk were killed during that night and the following day," Mr. Gibbons says, "and the streets were covered with the bodies of the dead. Several minor clashes occurred during the early morning and by 11 o'clock the rioting was in full swing."

"Accompanied by William Chambers, field secretary of the Y. M. C. A., I went to the telegraph office to inform the British consul. The streets were literally covered with dead bodies and we witnessed horrible scenes."

"We were unable to communicate with the consul because the rioters had cut the wires."

Major Daugherty-Wylie, British vice consul at Mersina, is among the injured and his wounds are considered serious. He was shot while commanding the British troops at the railroad station. The troops were engaged in the task of preventing villagers from the surrounding country from coming to Adana to participate in the massacre.

FRESH MASSACRES
IN ASIA MINOR

Mersina, April 27.—Fresh outrages are reported today in dispatches from Adana and several other towns. Conditions are said to be rapidly growing worse, but the number of dead is not given. The situation at Mersina is still critical and fear is expressed for the safety of the foreign missionaries there.
