**Farwell and Welcome Meetings.**—Major and Mrs. J. F. Foulkes, who for nearly three years assisted by Captain Apeis, have been in charge of the local work of the Volunteers of America, will hold their last public meeting Sunday next. Major Foulkes and co-workers have been transferred to Seattle, where they will take charge of the work of the Volunteers of America, June 1. Staff Captain Starks, with Captain Quarles, and Phillips, have been appointed to command the work in Portland and will be in the city this week. The service next Sunday will be the farwell of Major and Mrs. Foulkes, and Captain Apeis, and the welcome of Staff Captain Starks and her assistants.

**Offices Forestry Jobs.**—The United States civil service commission has announced an examination on June 15 to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill existing vacancies, at \$840 per annum, in the position of clerk in the forest service, and vacancies requiring similar qualifications as they may occur at salaries of \$900 to \$1200 per annum depending upon conditions of service and location. Eligibles will be subject to appointment for service in forest superintendence at various points throughout the west. Further information can be obtained from Z. A. Leigh at the post-office.

**Alleges Patent Infringement.**—Suit was filed in federal court yesterday afternoon by R. E. Levan against C. W. Read, asking an injunction and damages in the sum of \$2500 because of an alleged infringement of patent rights. The suit of complaint reads that several years ago Sherman Ansel of Portland invented an awl to be used by shoemakers. He took William Hinkins as partner, January 9, 1909. Levan bought the interest of Ansel and Hinkins and alleges that he has manufactured many thousands of the awls and sold them without any legal right.

**Telephone Faster Than Automobile.**—William Boyd, driving a big automobile for Emmons and Emmons, was arrested here yesterday on a charge of speeding. Oregon City on a charge of speeding. Chief of Police Burns of Oregon City notified a party passing through that town at high rate of speed and that the number of the car, Oregon 989, notified the Portland police with the result that the party was arrested and released on \$500 bail to guarantee his appearance in court at Oregon City today.

**Crash Drives Away Thieves.**—A crash of a big pile of fruit jars in the Tannery and Higgins store at 485 East Morrison street, saved that place from being looted last evening. Two men drove up to that place in a wagon last night and effected an entrance with keys. The women sleeping in the adjoining house heard a crash and went to investigate and found the men, frightened by the noise, driving away hurriedly. The doors were left open but apparently nothing was taken.

## RUSSELL HEADS ORPHEUM BILL

When something old and overworked is made really funny there is a sense of satisfaction, for you feel that your previous discontent has after all not been entirely your own fault. Men's impersonations of women have been employed since time immemorial because the idea itself is supposed to be funny without the aid of any clever acting. When the actors are clever such a turn becomes a scream. The Russell brothers have been "singing" long enough to know all the female arts and graces, and in their turn "Our Servant Girls" at the Orpheum this week they give two types of these present day problems that delight the audience. John Russell would be funny in any dress, male or female. It is not what he says, but the way he says it, with the slightest of giggles, and all the patting and preening of the set, that gives him a real K. M. Coquette. The brother in the older woman's role is of the simple, unpretentious type and with less opportunity to win applause shows a true portrait.

Andy Rice gives some exceptionally good Yiddish impersonations as a "plain clothes man." His rap is hard, but the turn is good because of the absolute ease and truthfulness of his imitations and the exceptionally realistic Hebrew twang.

The color photography is an exceptionally interesting turn and the pictures shown on slides are so vivid and real that one is struck anew with the marvel of this latest advance in science. The views of western scenery are beautiful.

The closing turn is given by Chloona and Page and presents two exceptionally clever fellows in several stunts each. Rapid fire somersaults, tumbling over chairs, hand walking, acrobatics, spinning on the head, juggling, and musical stunts are brought in in such rapid succession that one has hardly time to wonder over one feat before the next is done. One fellow does clever freak work with the concertina, playing two at a time and turning a somersault while playing a single one. At the xylophone he copies the antics of "Paderewski" and yet gets more than the usual amount of music from it in the "Wilhelm Tell" overture, played with a grand flourish.

The first turn is a juggling act by five men and boys and presents some novelties. The three high juggling commands admiration. The little fellow so evidently enjoys his work that it puts to rout all the child labor theories.

The Frederick Allen company presents an idyl, "His Phantom Sweetheart," written by Mr. Allen. It presents a new phase of the Wall street millionaire. The Klugea Drucio and Delmore give the only commonplace turn on the bill, but a few pretty settings keep it from being utterly commonplace. The moving pictures and the orchestra complete the bill.
