Both the Snake and Columbia Rivers.

To further assist in forecasting the stage of water in the rivers during flood seasons, the weather bureau will on May I establish four new river reading station in the Pacific northwest. One will be located at Bonner's ferry, on the Kootenai river; one at Newport. On the Pend' d'Oreille river; one at Northport; on the Columbia river, near international boundary, and one at Weiser, on the Snake.

These stations will furnish daily reports on the rise or fall of the respective rivers, and as they are near the sources of supply the readings will be of vital interest and great assistance in keeping tab on the flood crest.

High water is looked for this season as a result of the cool weather that has prevailed all spring, unless warm weather comes in short spells, in which event the meliting snow will have time to pour into the ocean without overflowing the river banks. That the snow in the Blue mountains has disappeared was indicated by a dispatch to the weather bureau this morning from Kalema on the O. R. & N. line. This station is located on the summit of the Blue mountain range, and the report states that practically all the snow has melted and flowed away. It is, however, customary for the Blue mountain snow to disappear before the snow begins to melt extensively at the headwaters of the Columbia and Snake rivers and its disappearance by this time will therefore not have much effect upon the situation later on.

While prospects for a flood are considered good, it will not necessarily follow, as continuation of cool weather interspersed with brief hot spells will give the waters a chance to run away gradually.
