

GREAT OUTBURST OF MUSIC AT SPRING FESTIVAL AT THE ARMORY

Preparations have all been completed and the management expects this to be the biggest musical event ever known in Portland. Seats are selling rapidly and almost everything is already gone. The program tonight will offer some of the best bits of the entire season of five concerts. Three of the soloists will be presented, the chorus will sing and the orchestra will give several numbers. The orchestra's best work will probably be in the splendid C Minor Symphony of Beethoven tonight, which is often pronounced the most popular of all that master's beautiful symphonies. The "Tannhauser" overture, that most inspiring of compositions, will open the program by request. Mr. Rosenbecker, the conductor, feels that his orchestra is superior even to that of last year.

Soloists a Portland Favorite.
The soloists for tonight are Alda Hemmi, soprano; Myrtle Elvyn, pianist, and Guy Woodard, violinist. Madame Hemmi is an old favorite with Portland and her reappearance here is looked forward to with greatest interest, because her voice is said to have grown in beauty and strength since she left here and has been doing grand opera work. Miss Elvyn's appearance will be one

of the most interesting points of the entire season, for she has come so widely heralded. Ever since the left Godowsky's instruction two years ago she has been greeted with praise in her concert work. Chicago loudly clamors for the honor of calling her a Chicago girl, though she is a Texan by birth. However, she was reared in Chicago and there got her early training before she was sent abroad to study. She is pronounced an extremely brilliant pianist, with masterly technique and fine temperament. Her playing of the Grieg concerto tonight will be looked forward to with much interest.

Violinist Highly Praised.
Mr. Woodard, the violinist, is new to Portland, but the press notices promise something good. Of experience with the best masters and the best orchestras counts for aught, he should certainly give a finished performance tonight. He has recently returned from several years abroad, during which he played with many important organizations. The Portland Festival chorus can be counted on to do itself and the city proud. For the past few weeks its rehearsals have shown excellently finished work and its success of last year's festival will doubtless be duplicated. Following is the program for the entire season:

EXPRESS COMPANY'S RATES ARE SLASHED

The express company, in view of the fact that it would be almost a physical impossibility for the express company to arrange for the reduction within 20 days from today the order will not be served on the company until about May 20, allowing until about June 10 for the company to arrange its reductions. It is believed that if the express company regards the new order reasonable, it will not resist, but if it finds the reduction greater than anticipated an injunction against the enforcement of the order will probably be procured.

The rates on coin, currency, and similar classes will not be affected, there being no evidence during the investigation indicated by the railroad commission to the effect that those rates were excessive. The "special and general class" rates are included, however, as they are made proportional to the general "merchandise" rates. The "special and general rates" include the rates on fruit, vegetables and commodities of a like nature. A similar investigation is being conducted by the railroad commission in regard to the Wells Fargo company's rates, which operates on the Southern Pacific and other lines in Oregon. The last hearing a motion was made by the company's attorneys to dismiss the investigation, but the commission yesterday made an order overruling the motion and final testimony will be taken June 1.
