WINNING STREAK FINALLY ENDED

Beavers Drop Game to Oakland Before Bév of Fair Fans.

Oakland's comers batted their way into the hearts of the women yesterday afternoon at the Vaughn street grounds by getting away from McCredie's crew, in the neatest possible manner, with the long end of a 5-to-1 score.

Friday is always the day of baseball bargaining for the women, and the grandstand was sufficiently packed yesterday afternoon with the opposite sex to send consternation into the hearts of the shy beavers. Some features of the game were the twirling of Boles, Hogan's fast fielding on third base, Lewis' superb throw, though not spectacular work on the first station.
