Rev. William Travis' Funeral.—The funeral of the late Rev. William Travis, for many years Sunday school missionary of the Presbyterian church, was conducted by Rev. Andrew Montgomery yesterday afternoon at the residence, 90 East Sixteenth street. He spoke of the long years of faithful service given by Mr. Travis and the wide usefulness in the growing northwest, telling of mission churches established by him which have been and are developing into strong self supporting churches. Rev. Edward M. Sharp spoke in behalf of the church and the Rev. Charles W. Hays, Rev. Henry Marcotte, Rev. Harry Pratt and Rev. Harry Leeds. Interment was at Riverview cemetery.

Chinese off to work.—Chinatown is almost depleted now. It is estimated that between 100 and 200 Chinese have left Portland during the last month to seek employment in the coast. This happens in Portland every year, the Chinese starting to leave about the first of April and going all month. As the Chinese are now practically deserted, the merchants and laundries being almost the only ones who have stayed in for the summer. The Bo On Tong, the Chinese support of aged and helpless Chinese, is said to have been dissolved in Portland and this is the reason for many of the Chinese leaving Portland. The fact that the society failed to secure the approval of Yee Ching for the murder of Lee Tai Hoi is said to have something to do with the dissolution of the Bo On Tong.

Death Follows Accident.—William McVoy, who was injured in a street car accident at Twelfth and Washington streets on March 21, died at 10:30 o'clock last night at the Good Samaritan hospital from blood poisoning resulting from the accident. Mr. McVoy was a musician. He had lost a leg and while alighting from a car last March he was thrown and sustained an injury to his knee, blood poisoning resulting. Mr. McVoy was 24 years of age and came from seven years ago from St. Cloud, Minn. The remains will be sent there for interment.

Funeral of A. J. Seaman.—The funeral of the late A. J. Seaman, who died Saturday, was held from the Holman chapel yesterday afternoon. Mr. Seaman was 75 years of age and had been prominent in this city as building contractor since he had formerly lived in Iowa, coming to Portland in 1885. He is survived by his wife and two sons, Dr. C. S. Seaman of this city and Fred Seaman of San Diego, Cal.

Citizen Captures Thief.—Joseph Burns was fined \$25 by Judge Van Zante in municipal court this morning for larceny. Burns found a blanket and coat hanging on a line behind a residence at Third and Pine streets and taking them, started to run when he was chased by Pete George, the owner of the property and captured at Fifth and Pine. He pleaded guilty to the charge, saying, however, that he thought the clothes and blanket had been thrown away.

Home Coming Day.—Home Coming Day of the Rose Festival will be discussed at the meeting of the committee in charge of the arrangements for that day in the office of the Rose Festival association this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Francis Fouts is chairman of the committee and has the plans well in hand. Invitations have been sent out to the members of the state asking them to come to Portland for that day. Many of them are expected to accept.

Tomorrow night at 8 p. m. at the First Presbyterian church, there will be given the regular quarterly post-communion social, under the auspices of the Ladies Aid society in behalf of the pastor and officers and members of the church to meet at 8 o'clock. The old members to receive the new and any friends and neighbors who will enjoy with a pleasant and profitable social hour.

Exhibit School Work.—In the rooms of the Holman school, the work prepared by the pupils for the educational exhibit of the Seattle fair will be on display tomorrow afternoon from 2 until 5. A reception will be held in that hour followed by the regular meeting of the Mothers and Teachers circle. Dr. Emma Welby will address the circle on "Bird Culture." Children will be taken care of in the kindergarten from 3 to 4.

Lamson's office this evening. Accused by Japanese.—Charles Goodman was arrested by Officers Gruber and Harris and Deputy Sheriff Laird yesterday on a charge of larceny. He was caught after a chase by a Japanese named I. Murata, who said that Goodman had entered his room and stolen a steel bridge and taken a watch and \$60. Goodman declares the Japanese is mistaken. The case was set for hearing for tomorrow.

First Charge Dismissed.—The charge of forgery by altering public records lodged against M. Reinhold and Sam Brenkauer, which has been on the docket of the municipal court for some time, was dismissed on motion of the district attorney today as the men have now been indicted by the grand jury on the same charge.

SECOND ANNUAL EFFECTS

"Stabat Mater" Well Rendered by Chorus and Chicago Orchestra.

The closing concert of the second annual musical festival last night was a splendid one. An orchestral program opened the evening's work until the singers had gathered from their various church choirs to assist in "Stabat Mater." The orchestral numbers though all rather hackneyed and decidedly of the popular variety, were played well. The "Merry Wives" overture was played by him which has been and are developing into strong self supporting churches. Rev. Edward M. Sharp spoke in behalf of the church and the Rev. Charles W. The ballet music from "Gloconda" was charming, though the light parts might have been played with a little more sprightliness. The march and hymn from "Aida" were entirely satisfactory. Mr. Duggan and Mr. Frolich were the soloists and redeemed themselves. By far Mr. Duggan's best work of the entire season was his Celeste Aida aria and his notes were actually sure. Confidence and acquaintance with the score took away the uncertainty, feeling-for-the-note quality and left his voice quite pleasant.

Mr. Frolich sang the well known "Paganini" with good vocal effect of feeling and showed his high notes to be surprisingly good for a basso. He too, sang out as if he were not aware of his music and acquired the admirers that the quality of his voice should have given him earlier.

Miss Elvyn, by request, played again, and gave the useful Liszt concerto in E flat. Mrs. Dierks's work on this concerto had more than one note in it and it was hugely enjoyed. Miss Elvyn is an artist of uncommon caliber and the stories of applause that greeted her work showed that the public appreciate her worth. A left hand study of a Chopin nocturne was given and was well received. The suppleness of her fingers, gave a really beautiful and complete sounding composition. So many left hand studies sound left handed.

"Stabat Mater" was distinctly a success, although people chose the usual inopportune moments to leave the hall. Why does the decision to leave almost always reach crystallization in the middle of a song, not before or after? The program seemed a little long, to be sure, but the soloists were more satisfactory than the night before. Miss Hemmi was again the star. It is a pleasure to follow the score and note that she sings her notes and hits each one square and clean. There is no "faking" to get the general effect with the soloist. Her landing on the right note at the end of the passage. That is the chief fault with Mr. Duggan, that he started in the middle of the finest in all oratorios, by his "stoppy" work. Such indecision is not tolerated in a pianist or violinist; why in a singer? Mr. Frolich in the little work accorded him was satisfactory. Miss Frolich again showed the insufficiency of her voice, which in duets was almost entirely lost. It is of pleasing quality, a charming parlor voice.

"The Holy City" in the afternoon was much enjoyed. The Sanctus sung by the choir, consisting of Mrs. May Dearborne Schwab, Miss Eva Wells, Mrs. Hammond, Miss Petronella Connelly, Mrs. E. E. Bushong, Mrs. Preston, Fred S. Pierce, John D. Carson, Frederick T. Crowther and Gustav Cramer, called for much applause.

The effect of the music from the afternoon was good. Mr. Boyer conducted afternoon and evening, the choral work, and added new laurels to his wreath. His work is entirely satisfactory, for he puts so much spirit into it that it cannot lag.

The orchestral work in the afternoon included Wagner numbers. "Meister-singer," "Tannhauser" and "Walkure" numbers were given. Mr. Woodward, violinist, added a number not originally on the program and again proved his sincerity and skill as a musician.

The festival has indeed been a great success and all the concerts were largely attended. The choral work, however, are a good many "at one stretch" and the programs were all made too long. The audience was disappointed that people left by the hundreds before the close of each concert. It would probably be much better if the programs were made shorter. Five concerts, each lasting two and a half hours, are a strain on the most hard music lovers.

TELLS ROSE GROWERS TO PRUNE DEAD WOOD

◆ "Much trouble and loss of roses will be saved the rose growers of the city if they will only take the trouble to cut back the dead stems on their bushes," said Dr. Emmett Drake, one of the most prominent members of the Rose Festival association today. "As I came down to the office this morning I noticed any number of bushes with dead stalks still on them. "Although one critic did say that the bushes were not hurt any by the cold snap last winter, the large amount of dead stalks found on the bushes this spring testifies that they were in some measure injured. This injury can be turned into benefit, however, by doing the proper cutting back. Later in the year much of the good atached to this will be lost, as now is the time to trim. "New life from the new slips will make the roses much firmer and more beautiful, but if the old stalks are left the flowers will lack their usual color and firmness. Every slip should be cut back until the pith shows a clear white. Whenever a brown streak runs through the pith the stalk is dead."
