

RUNAWAY GIVES AUTO HOT CHASE

Collides With Italian Vendor's Wagon and Mix Up Follows.

A horse and delivery wagon belonging to the Vienna Steam Cleaning & Dye Works, 224 Third street, turned the corner of Third to go up Oak this noon just as the 12 o'clock whistle of a day engine tolled out its shrill message. The sound started the horse and he started to run up Oak.

At the corner of Fourth he encountered the vegetable wagon of Tony Vazza, a vendor. Vazza's horse was knocked down and the tongue and front wheels of his cart continued up the street with the dye works outfit, to the accompaniment of Latin-American imprecations from Tony, who landed on the sidewalk before the Board of Trade building.

Just as the dye works horse had successfully vanquished the Italian and his steed, a touring car and driver wheeled into Oak from Fourth street and started a job of its own. This gave the runaway a new idea. He would tackle this new enemy and treat it as he had the Italian. He started after the automobile with a snort and had nearly reached it when the chauffeur awoke to the situation. With a yell he threw on top speed and the chase was on. In front of the C. K. Henry building at Fourth and Oak there is a good sized hill. As the car was calling "Stop him! Stop him!" made for this sand with the horse fast at his rear wheels. As the two hit the sandpile the boy driving the dye works wagon jumped for his life and landed without hurting himself. The automobile stuck in the sand a minute, the wheels flew around like mad and "bang" a tire punctured with a report like a cannon. Punctures are expensive luxuries, but this one threw the attacking horse back on his haunches and gave the chauffeur time to get on his feet, get out of the sand heap and hit the pavement again up Oak. The chase continued up to the sixth street but the punctured report had cooled the horse's enthusiasm and it was caught by some workmen at Sixth and Oak. The chauffeur and automobile made an ignominious retreat into the refuge of one of the Seventh street garages. The steam dye works outfit stated that the horse had been lame a little by his automobile hunt but otherwise had escaped unhurt. His wagon will have to be rebuilt. No figures were given as to the extent of the damage to the machine.

ATTORNEY ARRAIGNS PRIVATE DETECTIVES

Detectives were arraigned as "defamers and debaseurs of the reputations of girls, as of greed of gold," by Claude Strahan, an attorney, in the case of Essie Swearingen against the Meier & Frank company, being tried in circuit court today.

Essie Swearingen is suing the department store company for \$5000, which she asks as damages for the severe shock and consequent illness which she alleges followed an accusation of shoplifting being placed against her.

Julius Meier, manager of the department store, was making the plea to the jury when he attacked the plaintiff in general. He made several other statements regarding the sleuth class almost as strong as the first.

CIRCUS PAYS WAGES AND THEN DISCHARGES

Discharged yesterday by the Norris & Rowe circus for taking legal action to recover \$150 of back salaries, three negroes, J. Harrison, W. Robinson and M. Robinson, musicians in the employ of the circus, found no trouble in securing an offer of a position in Portland.

The Norris & Rowe circus had to pay out \$540 in back salaries in order to leave town. A number of the employees who had not been paid according to contract, brought legal action yesterday and threatened to close the show. Instead they were all paid off, but were promptly discharged by the management. Deputies from the sheriff's office and the constables' office served attachment papers on the circus management, but all the claims were paid yesterday, and the show went on its way.

County Court Meets.

Oregon City, May 5.—The county court met at 10 o'clock this morning. Present, Judge Dimick and Commissioners Lewellen and Mattoon. Most of the time so far has been taken up by road matters. This will be a busy session, it being quarterly meeting. Already a large number are in from the outlying precincts for and against road petitions.

PROPOSED LAW AFFECTS SHOWS

An ordinance drafted by the fire committee of the executive board, and filed in the office of the city auditor today will, if passed by the council, materially reduce the number of nickelodeons and other moving picture shows in Portland.

No shows of this character may be conducted, according to the ordinance, in buildings other than brick or wood with metal lath and plaster. There must be at least two exits for every 250 seating capacity in all such places, and one of these must be at the side or the rear of the room and must connect with the street directly or by means of a walled-in passage way at least four feet wide running along the side of the room and completely shut off from it by a brick partition. Other regulatory clauses of a drastic nature are inserted in the proposed ordinance.

TWELVE MEN ARE AFTER FRANCHISE

Referendum Petitions Started in Opposition to Street Railway's Grant.

Twelve men started at noon today circulating petitions for signatures to invoke the referendum on the blanket franchise ordinance passed by the council last week over the veto of Mayor Lane. The committee named by the federated labor unions and the Building Trades' alliance met this morning and completed all arrangements for carrying out the instructions of the unions to put the franchise up to the people.

"We have been overwhelmed with offers from good citizens to circulate these petitions," said H. J. Parkinson, of the committee. "Substantial business men have volunteered to secured signatures to the petitions; well known labor men have come forward and voluntarily offered to lay off from their work and help us out with the campaign for the signatures of voters."

Beyond the cost of printing the head on the petitions and some small expenses for postage, Mr. Parkinson says that not a dollar will be expended in invoking the referendum on the street railway franchise ordinance. It is the intention of the committee to secure between 5000 and 6000 signatures between now and next Saturday night, the bulk of the work to be done Saturday while the primary election is in progress. The committee intends to exercise great care in selecting men to circulate petitions and will take no chances in losing the campaign because of careless or crooked circulators.

OCULAR PROOF OF PORTLAND'S NEED

Photographs of Burdened Mail Carriers Effective at Headquarters.

Washington, May 5.—"Postmaster Young of Portland has left no ground for doubt of that city's need of increased postal facilities," an official of the postoffice department said today. "He has sent us photographs showing his carriers departing on their regular morning delivery trips, laden beneath the burdens of immense masses of mail matter, as ocular demonstration of conditions existing in that office."

Young's pictures, so the official said, may turn the scale in favor of Portland's gaining approximately adequate facilities. He shows 100 per cent increase in business in five years, with only 30 per cent increase in workers. Young's showing made an impression on the department, where the Oregon delegation is making strong efforts to procure what is needed.

SENATE POLLED AS TO LUMBER

For Free Lumber, 26; for \$1.50 Rate, 42; for \$1 Rate, All the Rest.
