

WOOL SIGNS BRING JOY TO STATE

An Exceptionally Favorable Winter Results in Much Cleaner and Finer Staple; Good Yield and High Prices.

Reports from the wool producing centers throughout the state indicate that the wool clip this year will in most cases exceed that of last year. "Better quality; longer fleeces; higher prices," are the tenor of the reports. It is said that growers generally are holding out for 2 1/2 cents and it is believed at Condon that this figure will be reached before the season is over.

Shaniko, Or., May 5.—Wool generally in this territory is of a much cleaner and finer quality than last season, the past winter having been exceptionally favorable for sheep. The output from present indications, will be considerably larger than last year.

It is estimated that there will be marketed at Shaniko approximately 4,000,000 pounds during the three scheduled sales, June 1, 15 and 29. The growers' opinions vary considerably as to the probable price to be paid this season. Contractors returning here report having met with poor success, and as far as known not a clip has been contracted throughout central Oregon.

Heavier Clip in Umatilla.

Pendleton, Or., May 5.—Many quiet sales of wool are being made in this section, though it is expected that the larger part of this year's clip will be held until the first sales day, on May 24. In general prices are much in advance of last year, the ruling price being around 20 cents for the better grades. This is a general average of several cents in advance of the ruling prices of last year.

The largest advance in wool is in the sand qualities, some of this selling for almost twice as much as it commanded last year. This advance is due to the fact that the early season was especially favorable towards keeping wool clean. Few of the wool contractors have been hit hard, however, for the severe winter storms came to many of the sections after the wool had been sold in advance of the clipping. By this fact the woolgrower will not only be receiving an especially high price for what would now be called a poorer grade of wool, but the weight will be greatly added by the sand.

The total wool clip for Umatilla county will be some greater than that of last year, due to the fact that fleeces are averaging heavier than last year. The number of sheep to be sheared

Pend d'Oreille Lake, Idaho, Near Which Mines Are Located.

Frank Ansley, vice president of the Oriole Mining & Milling company, which owns properties in the Metaline mining district of Stevens county, Wash., has placed on display at the Hovenden-Soule piano house, what is considered to be one of the most complete collections of ore in the northwest.

The exhibit contains a number of

pieces of crude ore, showing the different grades of concentrates, a bar of silver and lead and a quantity of lead solution. Also there is on show a scenic view of Grandview canyon, and the town of Metaline, which is to be the terminal of the Idaho, Washington & Northern railway, now building into that district.

Mr. Ansley will keep the exhibit on display in Portland for some time and will then take it to Seattle, where it will be shown at the A-Y-P exposition.

The Oriole mine, from which a greater part of the ore on exhibition came, is large owned by Portland and Spokane capitalists.

FINE LOT OF DOGS AT KENNEL SHOW

Judging of Pedigreed Canines Will Be Begun This Afternoon.

Two hundred and thirty-one of the classic dogs ever entered in any of the shows of the Portland Kennel club are today on exhibition in the hall over the Washington Street Public market, corner of First and Washington streets. Judging will start at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

With the terriers and small dogs yapping, the bulldogs and hunters barking and the hounds many of them baying, at the top of their voices, the dogs raise an awful din. The noise grows even louder every time a new comer is brought into the show rooms, as the aristocrats of the canine world evidently believe in giving the new comer at least a noisy reception.

The big hall has been admirably fitted up. No gorgeous decorations have been put up, but instead the aisles have been made wide and are free from any obstructions. The stalls for the dogs are new and clean and in their new coats of paint look very neat. The stalls are separated by means of wire screening and plenty of fresh straw is at hand. On the whole it looks as though this should be the best show yet for both breeder and visitor.

Practically all of the wool has been sold and the wool sales will be done away with for this year. The wool sold in the county has been sold at an average of 20 cents. This is about 5 cents above the highest price reached last year.

The total clip will be about 2,125,000 pounds, somewhat less than last year's clip. The number of sheep to be sheared delivered with the wool on Sheep are in good condition and the wool is of a better grade than common.

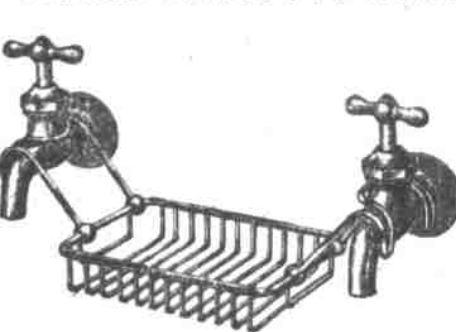
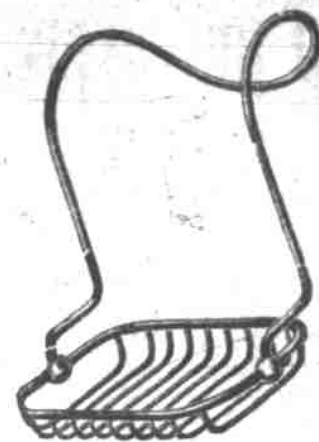
Plans to Convert the Presidio.

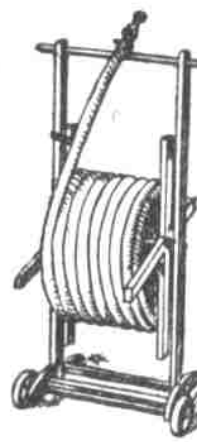

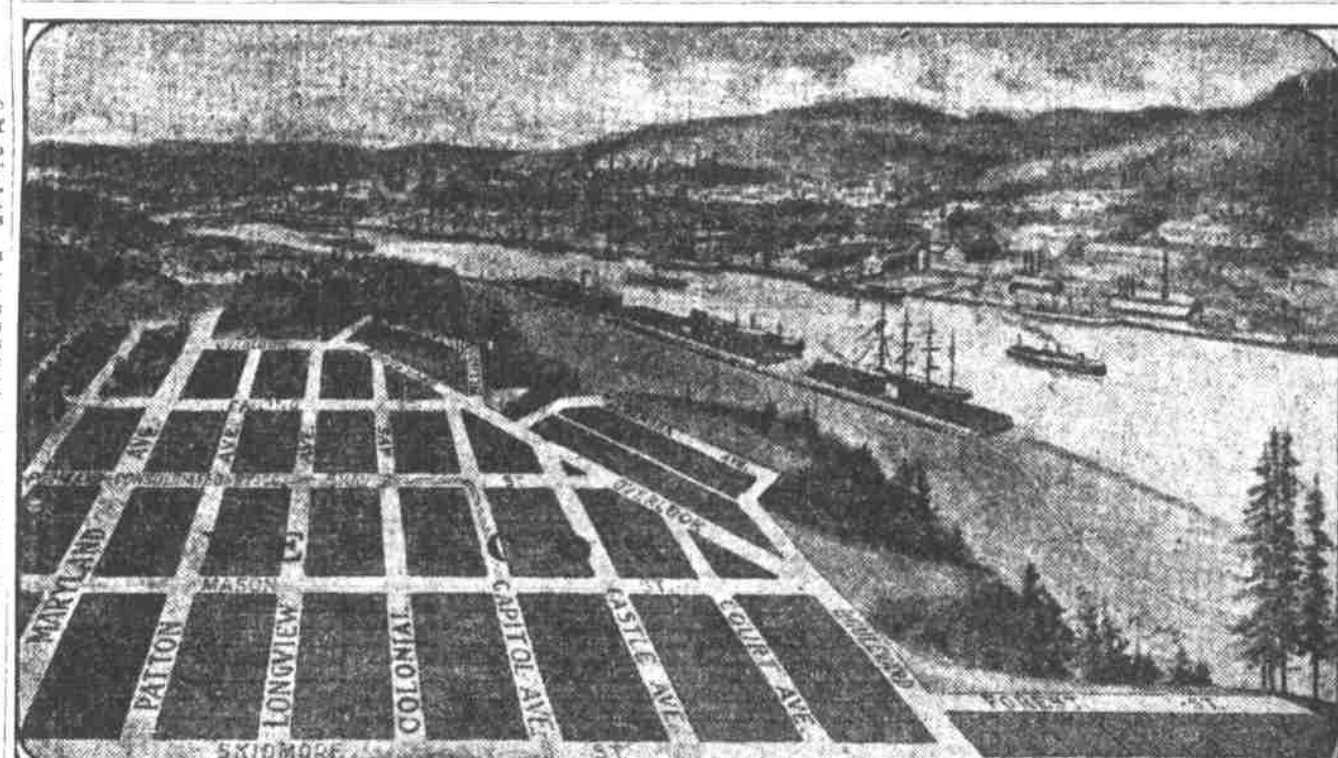


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
