CANDIDATES ARE AFTER THE VOTE

Would Be Councilmen Hunt for Men Who Will Support Them.

Candidates for the Republican nomination for councilmen for the various wards are now making their last canvass prior to the primary election of Saturday next. On every hand the voters are being besieged by personal visit and literary effort in an endeavor to nail their votes down for some particular candidate.

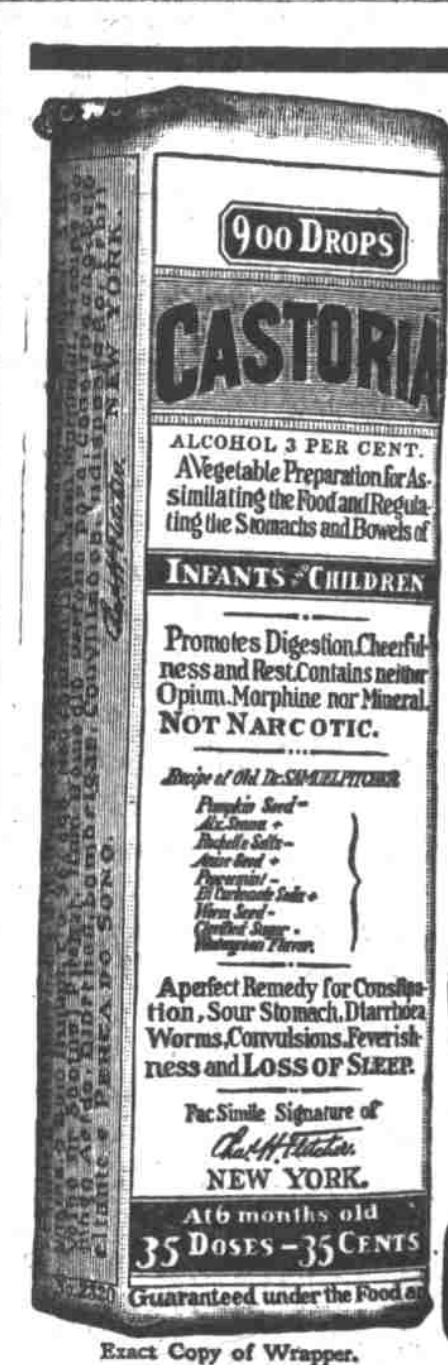


dates who are now trying for nomination. Wallace is a member of the present council. Banks is the nominee of the Baker theatre convention. He has figured in machine politics for several years in Oregon, having been elected to the legislature from Southern Oregon, and afterwards appointed deputy United States attorney as a reward for his attitude in the senatorial election during the one session he served in. He was always a close follower of the Mitchell faction, but has joined in the movement of the old machine men to get back into power.

In the Third ward G. D. Dunning and E. C. Mears are the two candidates. Dunning is a member of the present council. Mears is a nominee of the Baker theatre convention.
 Frank E. Watkins is the convention candidate in the Fifth ward. He is opposed by C. K. Zilly and Eugene Cohn. Ferdinand E. Reed, erstwhile political manager for T. C. Devin, secret agent of the Brewers' association and political ward politician from Chicago, is one of the candidates from the Ninth ward. He is conducting a mysterious campaign and is receiving the support of the liquor people in his campaign for the nomination. He is opposed by R. E. Menefee, present incumbent; Fred Tensing and Frank L. McCauley.

In the Tenth ward there are a large number of candidates. Dr. L. M. Davis, a member of the last legislature, who was elected on a Statement No. 1 platform and then protested his vote for United States senator, is one of the candidates.
 Scandinavians Remember Davis. Dr. Davis is also remembered by the Scandinavian voters of the city from his attitude towards them during his former term in the council during the term of Mayor Mason, about 1892. At that time a discussion arose over the street cleaning work, and who should do it. Davis in the course of his debate said in substance that he wanted the jobs to go to white men and not to Scandinavians, negroes and Chinamen.

This statement caused a great uproar among the Scandinavian voters who held a mass meeting which packed the old Tabernacle, now the Bungalow theatre, to the doors.
 Arthur Wilson, then Swedish vice consul, presided at the meeting and strong resolutions were passed and sent to the city council. Davis apologized, saying what he had said had been a slip of the tongue.
 Nevertheless the voters did not accept the explanation, and turned Davis down when he came up for reelection. They still remember the incident, as is shown by the present conversation of many of them regarding the Davis candidacy.
 C. H. Beard, a well known carpenter of good standing among his neighbors and acquaintances, is another candidate. M. F. Donahue, who was a detective at the Lewis and Clark exposition and afterward a Pinkerton employment, is also a candidate. J. J. Walpole, a retired estate man and a property holder of the district, is also a candidate. Ronald P. McDonald, who for a time sold photo buttons in the city, is a candidate for the council.
 W. H. Payne, a real estate dealer and one of the old residents of the ward, is trying for the nomination.
 Sam L. Woodward, who was a member of the well remembered "Malone crowd" of several years ago, also would like to go back to the city legislative body. Woodward is an old Simon machine man and was induced to run by a meeting of the machine faction held in the ward several weeks ago.

Brady is another of the Multnomah delegation to the legislature, elected on a Statement No. 1 platform, who protested his vote for senator. In spite of the protest he is again running on a direct primary platform and is fighting the machine leaders who secured his protest.
 J. J. Jennings, a well known real

estate dealer and property owner of the city, is the fifth candidate. He is an advocate of a straight business administration, the reduction of taxation burdens and the betterment of moral conditions.
