Wellthi Oatmealman Arrested—United States Deputy Marshal Thomas Hamerly returned this morning from eastern Oregon where he arrested William Jones, one of the wealthiest cattlemen in that section of the state, on a charge of fencing. Jones was taken from his home in Juntura, Malheur county, to Ontario, where he pleaded not guilty to the charge and was committed to federal court for trial, his bond being fixed at \$5000. The deputy also served subpoenas in a civil action undertaken by the government against John Jones, Ed Denny and Hiram Howard, living at Sumpter. These men are alleged to have taken up a mining claim which they have not developed according to requirements.

Grand Is Alleged—Bankruptcy proceedings have been instituted in federal court against Jacob Roesser, a saw mill man, living at Rainier, by Fred Wilson and others. It is alleged that Roesser contracted obligations which he was unable to meet, and that, anticipating a bankruptcy proceeding against him, turned all his property over to two brothers in payment of some alleged fictitious bills. Subpoenas commanding appearance before federal court in Portland were served yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal William Griffith.

Open After Hours—James Mota, proprietor of the Model cafe, arrested last night for keeping his saloon open after hours. He was taken to the station shortly after 1 o'clock in the morning and entered a plea of guilty before Judge Van Zante this morning. He was fined \$25.

Charged With Fencing—John Boyd, a rancher from Union county, was arraigned in federal court this morning on a charge of fencing public lands. He pleaded not guilty to the charge and gave bond for his appearance for trial before the court in the sum of \$500.

Asks for Dismissal—A petition for the dismissal of the pending suit for \$32 damages brought by G. C. Roush against J. M. Wallace, has been filed in circuit court. The suit has been settled out of court.

she was placed on the suspicious list. Time after time she was besieged by creditors, men who had sold her diamonds, gowns and other materials, but on these occasions would extricate herself from difficulty by producing, after an interval, drafts and checks for large amounts, and in many instances by Ortils Hamilton.

The last record of the woman at the Imperial was on December 14, 1927, at which time she attempted to cash a check for a large sum at the hotel, but was refused and asked to leave the place. She then went to another large hotel and afterwards left the city.

During this time, as it afterwards appeared, the woman had fitted up a large establishment near Astoria. She purchased the furniture and fittings for this place from local merchants and when she fled from the town these men began to search for her. At last she had the report circulated from Victoria, B. C., that she had died of kidney trouble. Since that time she has not again appeared.

Not Mrs. Moore. This woman, however, is not the "Mrs. Hazel Moore," the more recent affiant of the Washington adjutant general. Hotel men of the city who have seen the picture of the present woman in the case are unanimous in their statements that the woman with whom they had dealings was nothing but an individual. It is certain, however, that the Mrs. N. Hamilton, as she called herself, was one of the affiliates of the adjutant general, and that she was often in his company.

It is said that she had a brother and sister living in the town these men fled from at the hotel. What her real name was, however, is unknown, and it was not until her flight from the city that the discovery was made that she was not the wife of Ortils Hamilton.
