Arrested with Sack of Chickens.—Charles Meyer was arrested last night at 3 a. m. by Officer Hennessey, in a chicken coop, at Sullivan's gulch, on a charge of keeping late hours. Meyer was in company with four other men, had a sack containing several plump chickens which were thought to have been taken from the coop. His case was continued for investigation while the four men with him were turned free.

Boy Hit by Automobile.—An automobile, number 457, belonging to H. Wittenberg, struck Morris Rogaway, a lad of 14, of 612 Front street, last evening, but beyond rolling him in the dirt did no serious damage. The accident happened at the corner of Third and Washington street. The machine was not going fast at the time and the driver, seeing the boy in the road started to slow up before striking him.

St. Johns School Fumigated.—Precautionary measures towards the stopping of the smallpox epidemic in St. Johns were taken today when at the instance of the city physician of St. Johns the school children were sent home and the building thoroughly fumigated. Four cases have developed in the city of late and rather than let the disease get the upper hand, the fumigating of the school was undertaken.

The celebration will consist of a concert in Arion hall in the evening, to be followed by dancing. The concert part of the program is being given special attention by the arrangement committee.
