POOLROOM MAN LOSES INTEREST IN FIGHT

Sausalito, Cal., May 8.—Learning that he will not be allowed to reopen his poolrooms here even if the Walker anti-race track gambling bill is nullified, Frank Daroux lost interest today in the contest he was planning to make as soon as he could find a man willing to go to jail with him.

Owners of the property upon which the Daroux poolrooms were located announced today that they would never lease the tracts for the same purpose again. This determination is the result of a growing sentiment against making this place a gambling resort. Business men have discovered that since the anti-gambling law went into effect conditions have improved here steadily and that the income of \$2000 a year formerly collected from the poolrooms is not needed for the welfare of the town.

One of the buildings belongs to Harry Forrest, the other to Manuel Ygnacio and Manuel Flores. All three of these owners have agreed to allow their property to remain vacant rather than allow the reestablishment of the poolrooms.

JOHNSON SAYS HE FIGHTS KETCHEL

San Francisco, May 8.—Jack Johnson denied the report that he had called off his match with Stanley Ketchel, in a letter to Promoter Coffroth, made public today. The black champion wrote in reply to a letter from the promoter who made it plain that if the negro called off the fight, Ketchel and Coffroth would divide Johnson's \$5,000, posted as a forfeit. The letter from Johnson follows:

"Your letter received and will reply by saying that you must not mind all the newspaper talk about Ketchel and myself. I will most certainly be on hand in October for the match."

"I sail for England the 27th and will be back late in the summer. I am feeling fine, doing a little road work every day. Nothing much, so will close with kindest regards. Remember me kindly to all the boys. Yours very truly, Jack Johnson."

"I will keep in touch with you in the future letting you know where I am and what's doing."

Extensive preparations are being made to receive the Portland Colts upon their return from Vancouver next Tuesday for the opening of the home series with Tacoma. Admirers of the Northwestern League will try to outdo the reception given the Coast league team last month. Brown's band has been secured to lead the parade, which will start at 1:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon on Sixth street, between Washington and Stark streets. The automobile club has donated the service of its cars. The column will proceed south to Morrison street, down Morrison to Third, north on Third to Washington and west on Washington to Sixteenth, where the break will be made for the grounds.

The honorary participants in the game will consist of Judge George H. Williams, who will guard the bases; Judge George J. Cameron, who handles the indicator; J. F. Carroll, who pitches the first ball; and Sheriff Robert Stevens, who will try to catch it.

O'CONNELL TAKES TWO FROM LASALLE

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SPOKANE WINS BIG TRACK MEET

Lewiston Athlete Individual Star of Walla Walla Contests.

Walla Walla, Wash., May 8.—With a margin of 26 points beyond her nearest competitor, Spokane won the ninth interscholastic track meet here yesterday. Lewiston finished second with 23 points, and Walla Walla came third with 12. Ellensburg landed 13 and La Grande came fifth with 12. Pendleton and Baker City each made five. Boise landed three and North Yakima and Garfield tied for low point winner with a single point each.

Shaw of Lewiston was the bright individual star of the meet, taking 15 of the 23 points his school earned. Cook of Ellensburg and Englehorn of Spokane tied for second with 12 points each.

The day was ideal, and the warm sun brought out more than 3000 people, who were freed from business cares by the closing of stores, banks, city and county offices in the city. Excursions came from Lewiston, Pendleton, and parties came from nearby points. The track was fast and everything combined to make the day the most auspicious possible for the big event. From start to finish enthusiasm ran high, and the Spokane students of Whitman college yelled themselves hoarse as it early became evident that their high school would win the meet.

The most exciting race of the day was the mile, won by a local boy, Woods. The crowd followed him around the track with shouts of encouragement, swelling into a roar that could be heard in the city as he came down the home stretch a winner.
